20th CENTURY WORLD HISTORY

At the Department of History at the University of Zagreb, history of Croatia/Yugoslavia and South Eastern European countries is covered by two separate courses (Croatia in 20th Century and Central and South-Eastern Europe in 20th Century). Therefore, 20th Century World History is envisaged as a course that focuses on Western Europe, USA, USSR, Asia and the Middle East. This syllabus reflects such an approach. Special stress will be given to the events in which Yugoslavia had influence on and was influenced by major global developments, *e.g.* the Balkan wars, the London Treaty of 1915, the rise of Fascism, D'Annunzio and Rijeka, the assassination of King Alexander in 1934, the Yugoslav Partisans and Tito, Tito-Stalin split, the Trieste crisis, the Non-aligned Movement, the break-up of Yugoslavia, *etc.* The goal of this syllabus is to tackle all major events of 20th century history, whilst dealing with cultural and social history along with the diplomatic and political events. The syllabus suggests numerous fiction works from the period as well as documentaries, films and music. This course is a lecture-based type. It is complemented by a seminar taught separately.
