Be aware, though, that this list remains provisional and occasionally a course may be withdrawn at a late stage.

You do not need to apply for specific Economic History (EH4xx) courses until after you arrive. Course choices will be made via our online systems, but please *do not* attempt to register for courses until you have attended the induction events and been to a class to get a sense of whether this is the right option for you. We strongly recommend that you consult with your mentor before making your choices. You will have until the **end of Week 1** to decide on your Economic History optional courses.

International Development course choice runs slightly differently, so you should keep an eye on their advice and attend their welcome sessions (see above).

Please note that although we do everything we can to ensure that all students receive a place on their preferred options, sometimes unexpected peaks in demand and teaching and timetabling constraints prevent us from accepting every student who applies for a specific course. To help us in these situations, when you request a place you will be asked to complete a <u>statement of intent</u> in the online application system. Use this to outline why you want to take a particular course. You will also be asked to <u>rank your choices</u> to enable us to offer places accordingly.

Teaching begins on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> September.
