Why health reforms in SEE?

- Concern with deteriorating population health indicators in 1990s due to effects of war and transition
- Two different systems in SEE – central planning and Yugoslav self-management - provide a contrast in the study of reforms
- Multiple issues overlapping with current concerns for health reforms throughout Europe



The study of health reforms in SEE

- Health reforms in SEE have followed different but converging paths
- The book investigates reform at primary and secondary level as well as reforms of health financing
- The evidence suggests that reform paths are strongly influenced by the legacy of the past



Effects

- Reforms were popular in Bulgaria and Romania, but far less so in Croatia
- Outcomes: falling life expectancy in 1990s; but improvements during the boom period in 2000s
- Current crisis calls into question the sustainability of reforms and expenditure patterns
