



Symposium in Honour of Professor Christopher Hill

Professor Christopher Hill FBA worked at LSE for thirty years. He began as a lecturer in 1974, and from 1991 to 2004 he was the Montague Burton Professor of International Relations. In 2004 Christopher joined Cambridge University as the Sir Patrick Sheehy Professor of International Relations. Since 2016, he has been Professor Emeritus at Cambridge.

Christopher has written extensively on European foreign policy, and has had a significant impact on the community of scholars working on foreign policy, European foreign policy, and international relations. His most recent books include: *Foreign Policy in the Twenty-First Century*, 2nd edition (Palgrave Macmillan, 2015); The *National Interest in Question: Foreign Policy in Multicultural Societies* (Oxford University Press, 2013); and *National and European Foreign Policies: Towards Europeanization,* edited with Reuben Wong (Routledge, 2011). At the LSE he founded the European Foreign Policy Unit. This symposium explores the contribution his work has made to the study of European foreign policy and foreign policy more generally.
