2. Successful completion of degree programme.

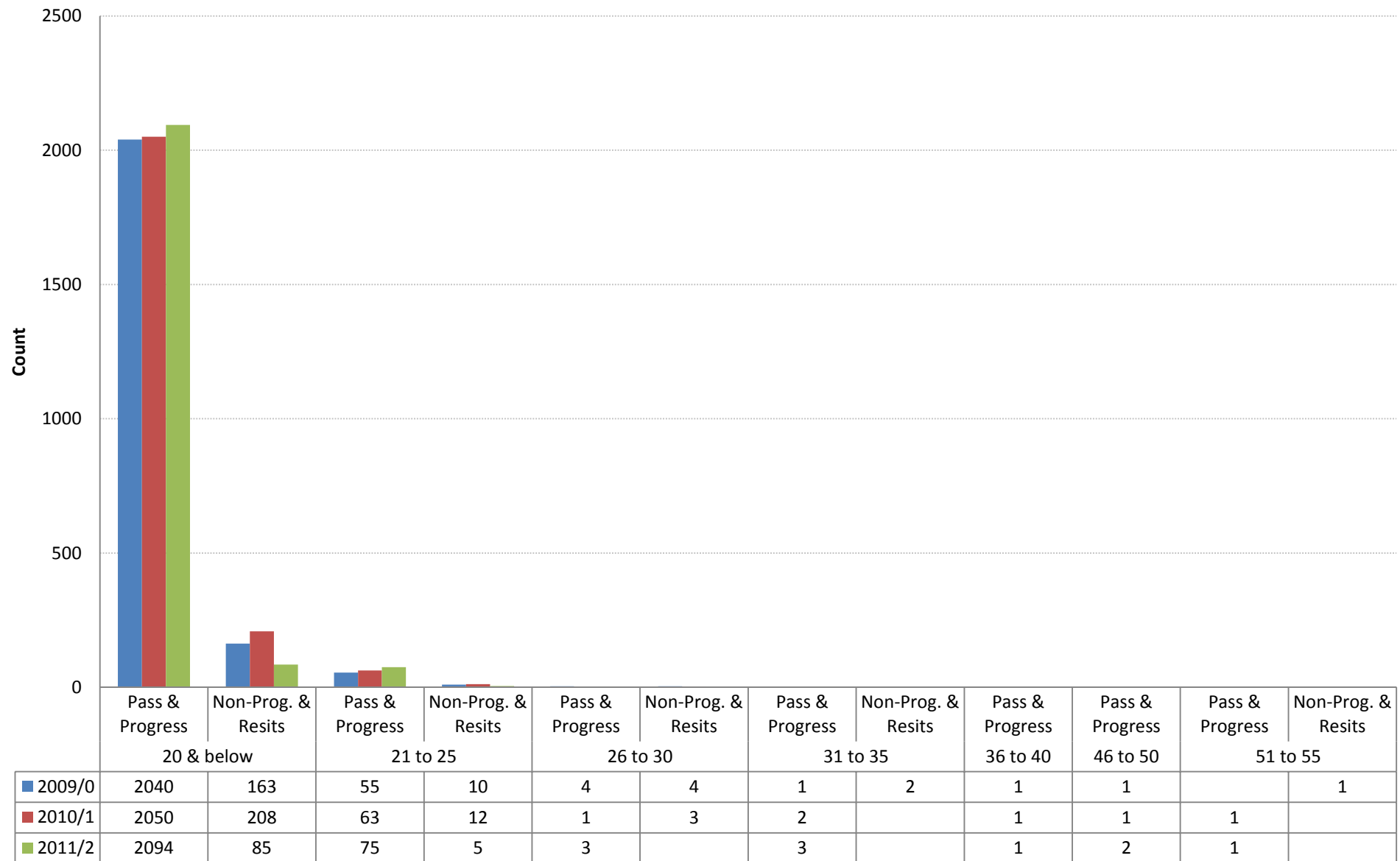
Non-Progression defined broadly as:

1. Those not progressing to the next year of study on their degree programme, or
2. Those who withdraw, required to take summer resits or go before the Student Progression Panel (SPP) to get permission to progress while carrying courses to resit.

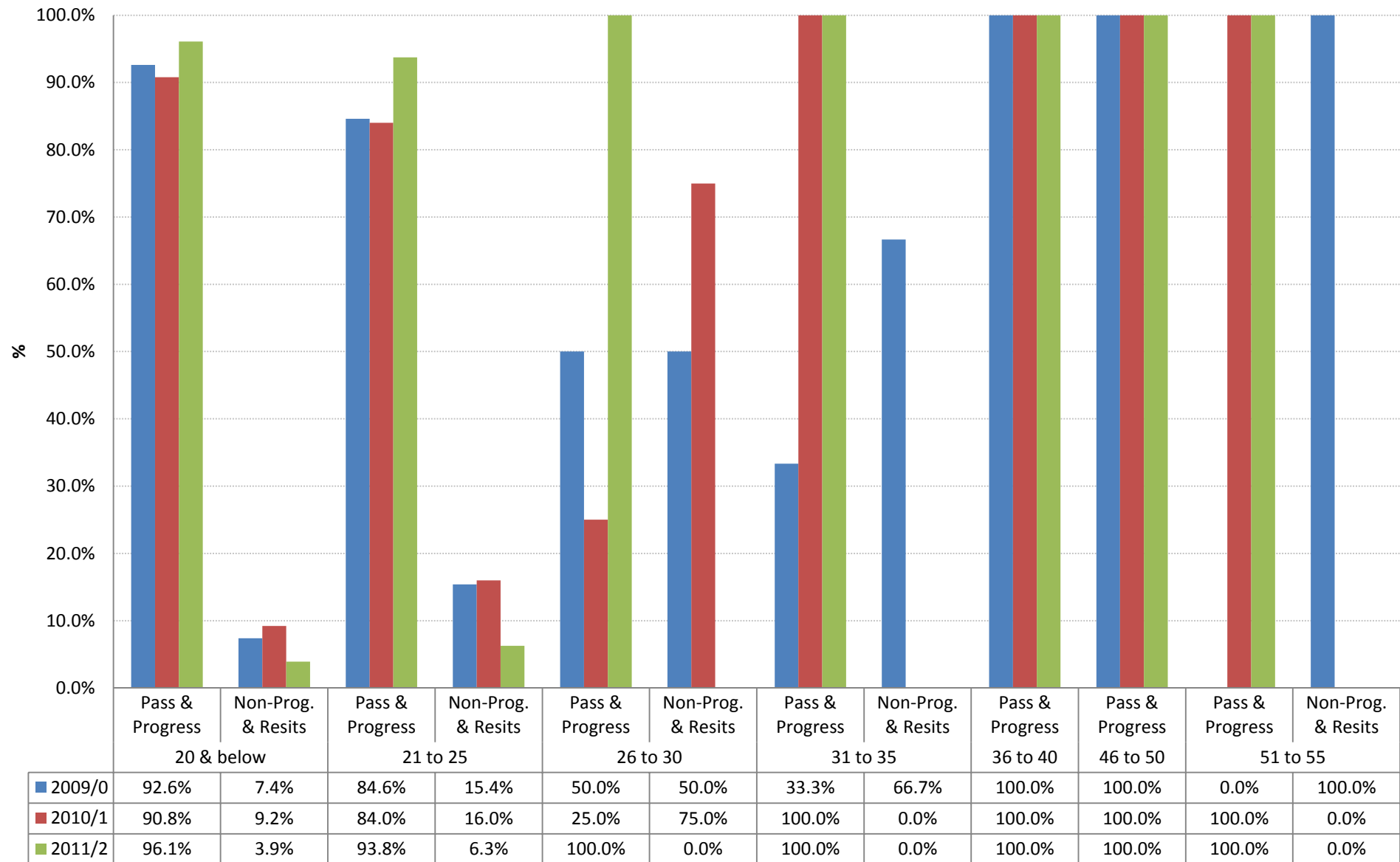
The data is displayed in tables and graphs as raw counts and percentages. There is also no attempt to identify where a difference is statistically significant.

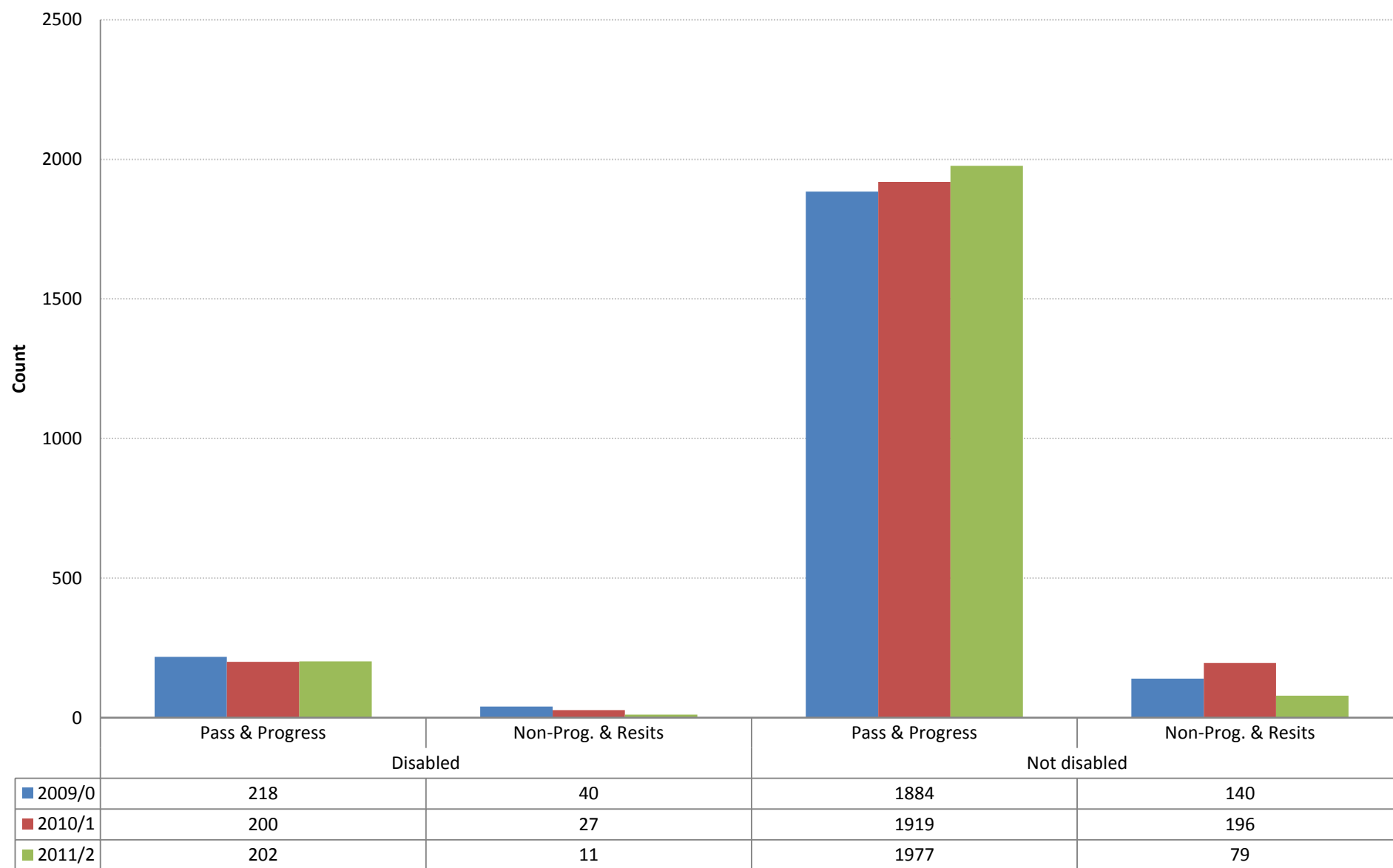

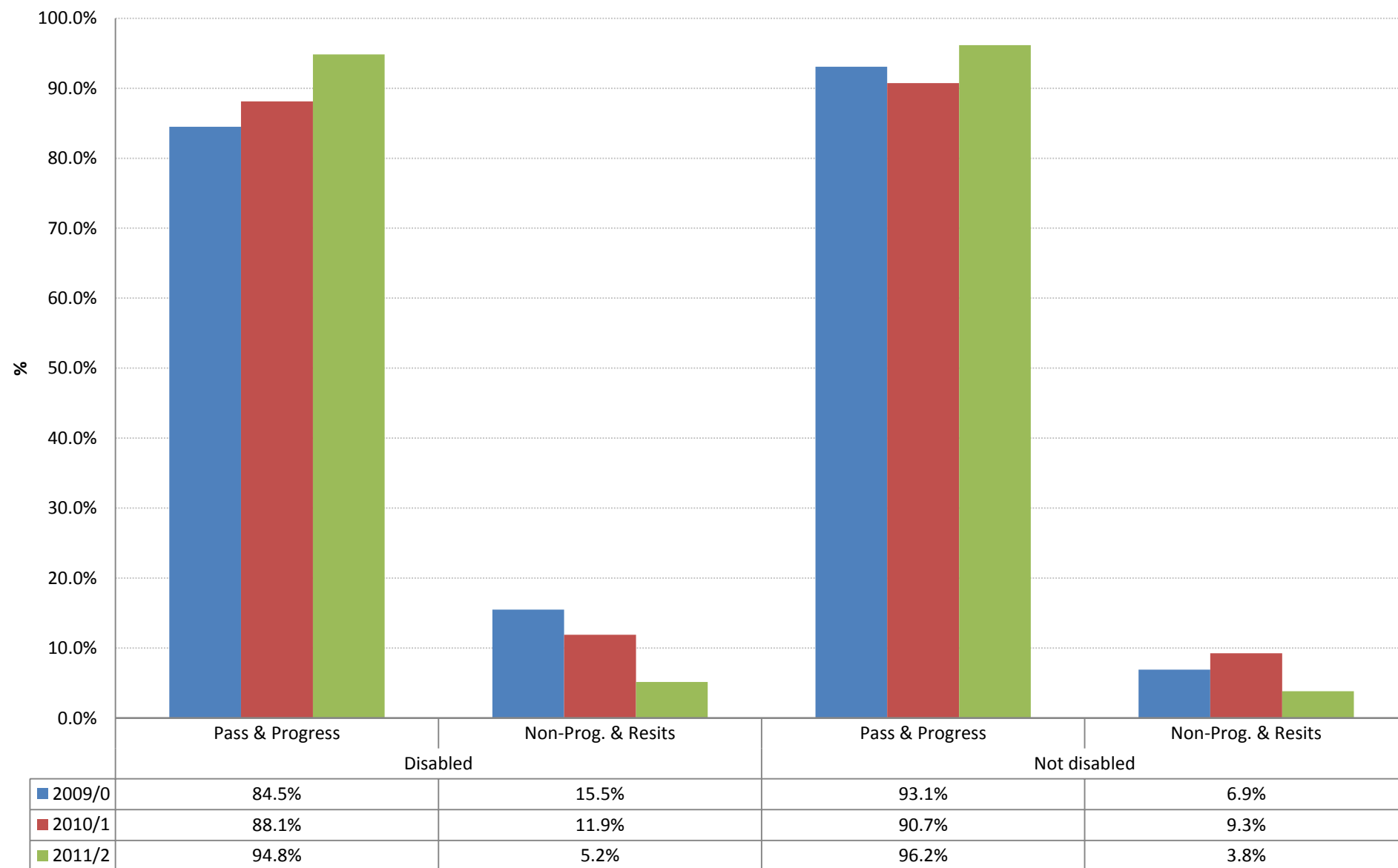
Progression: Age Group, UK Undergraduates (%)



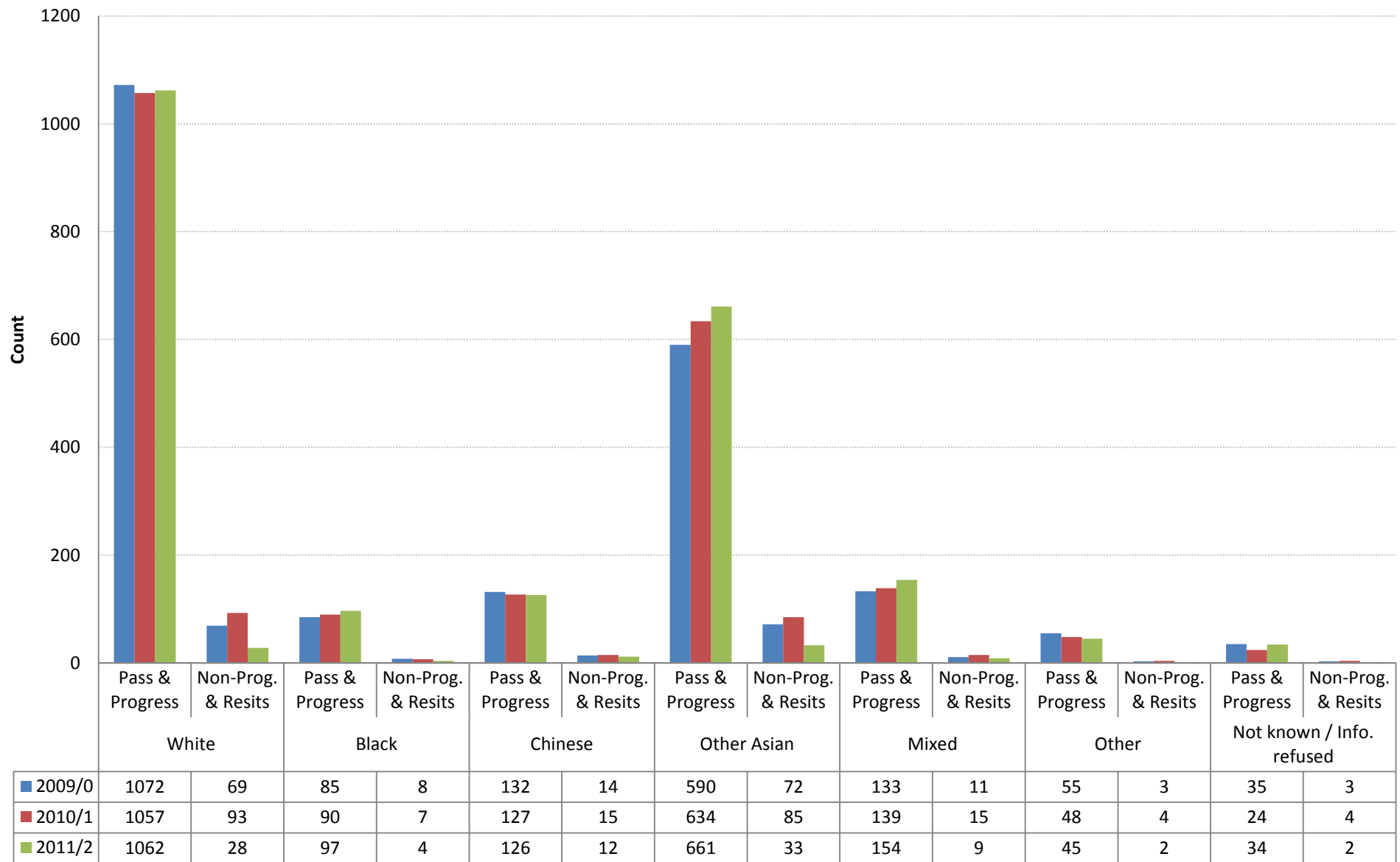

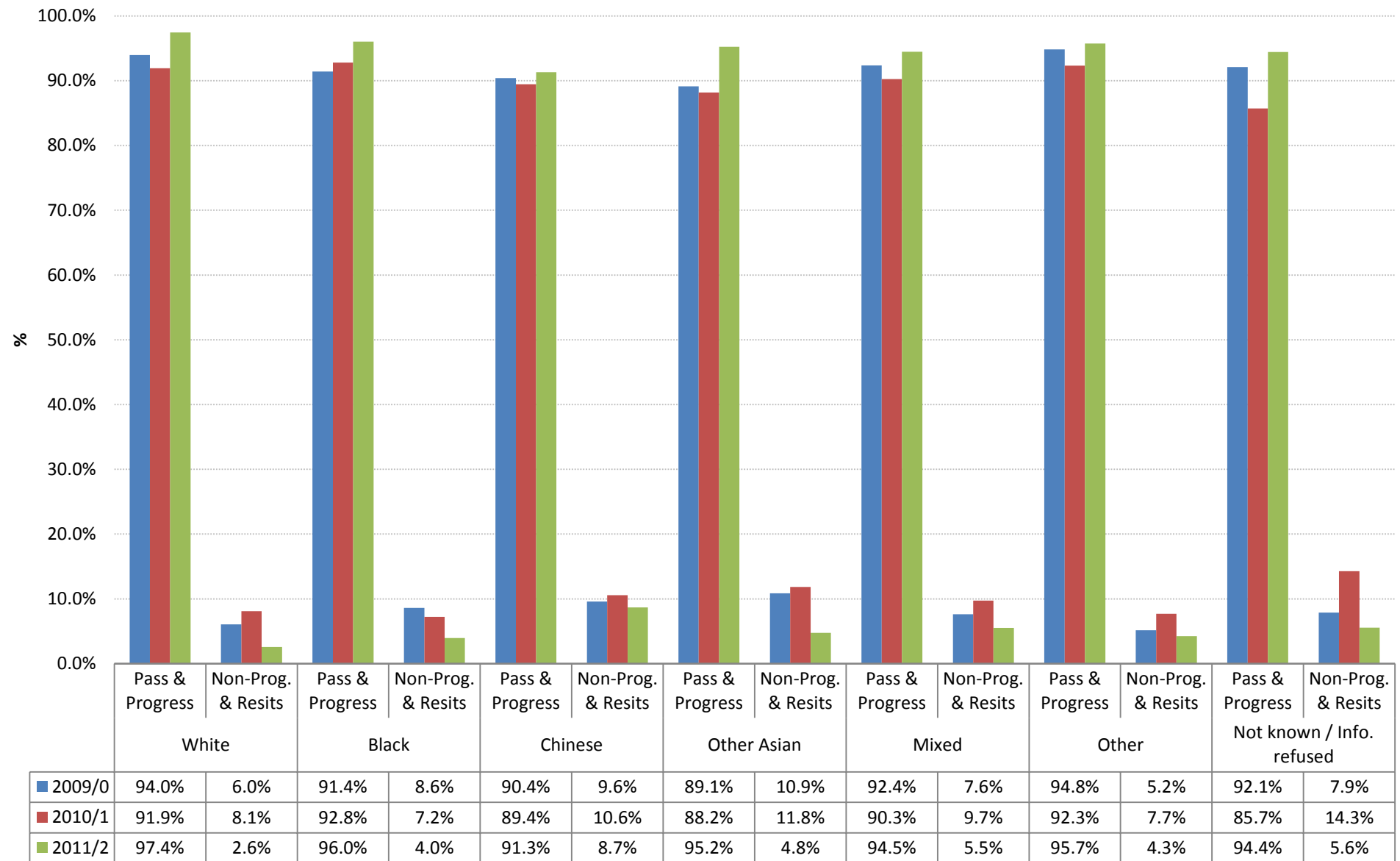

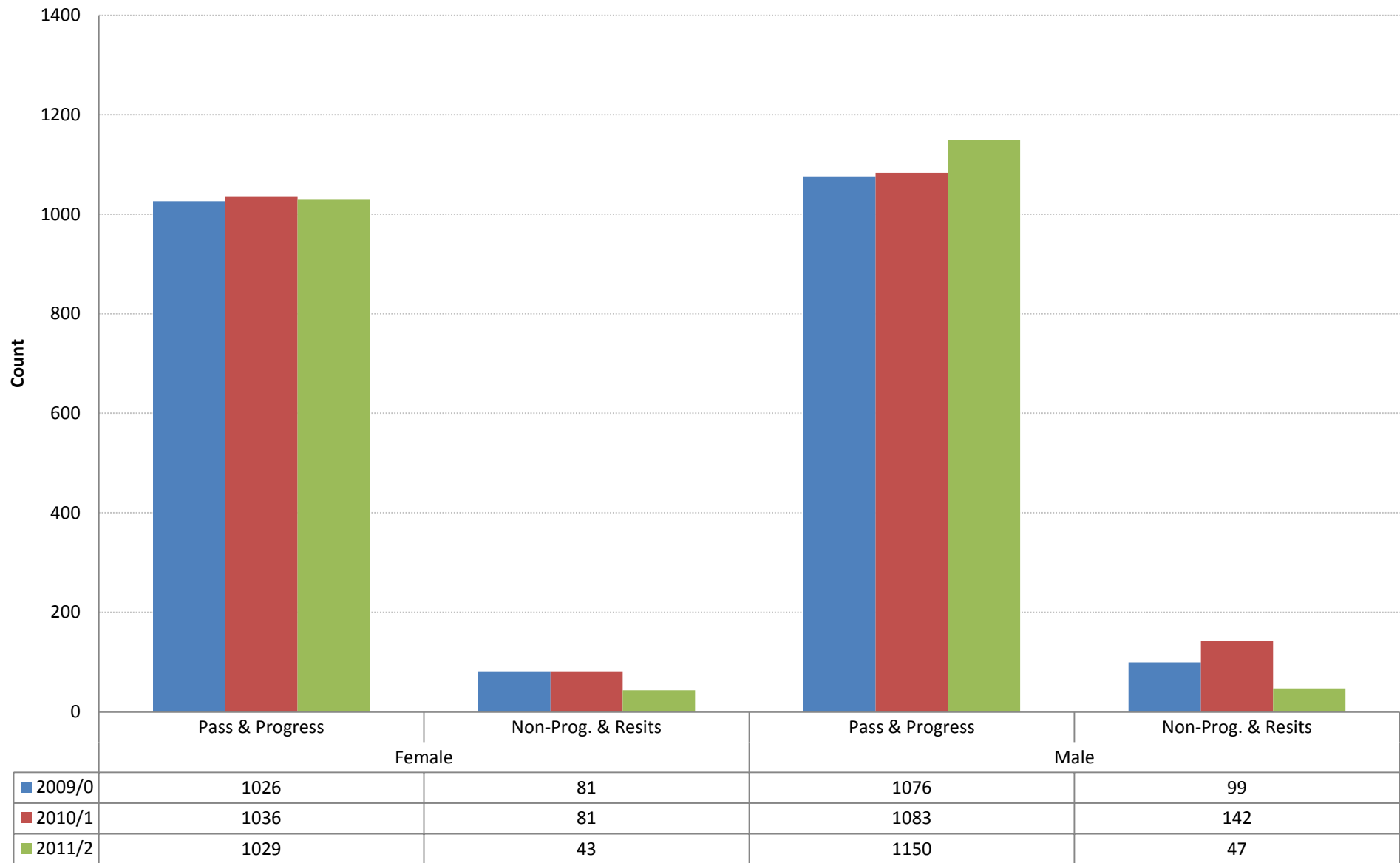

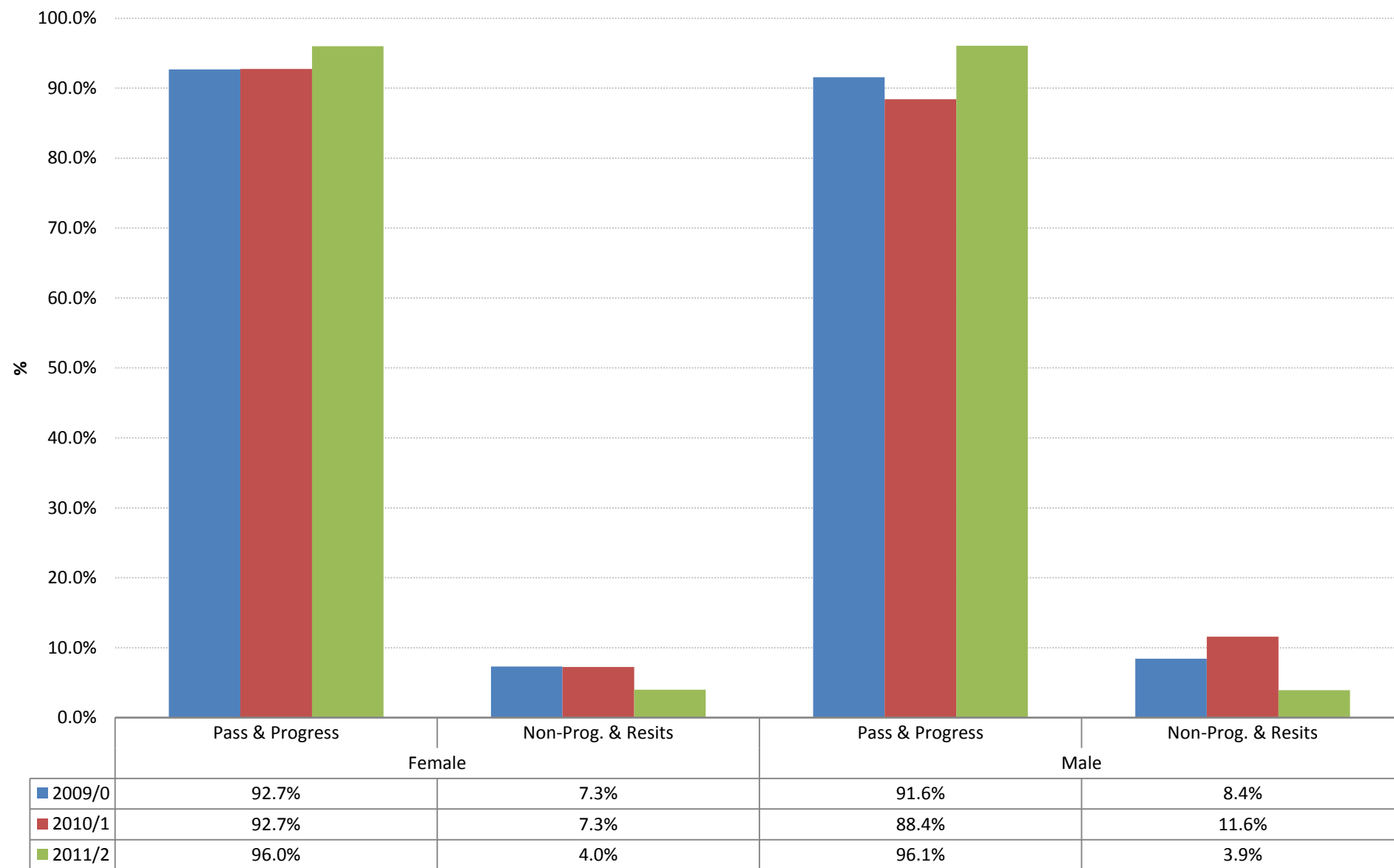

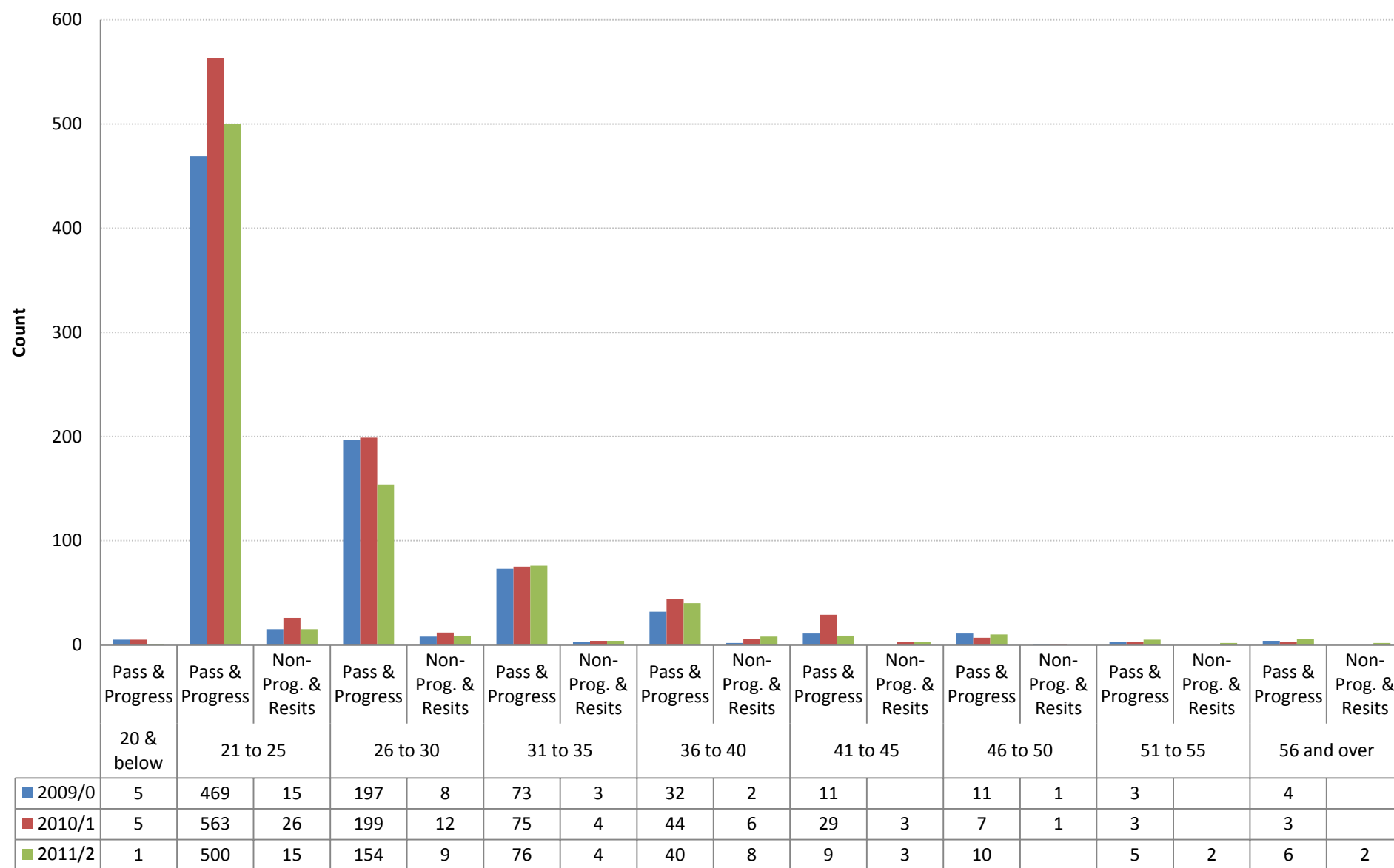

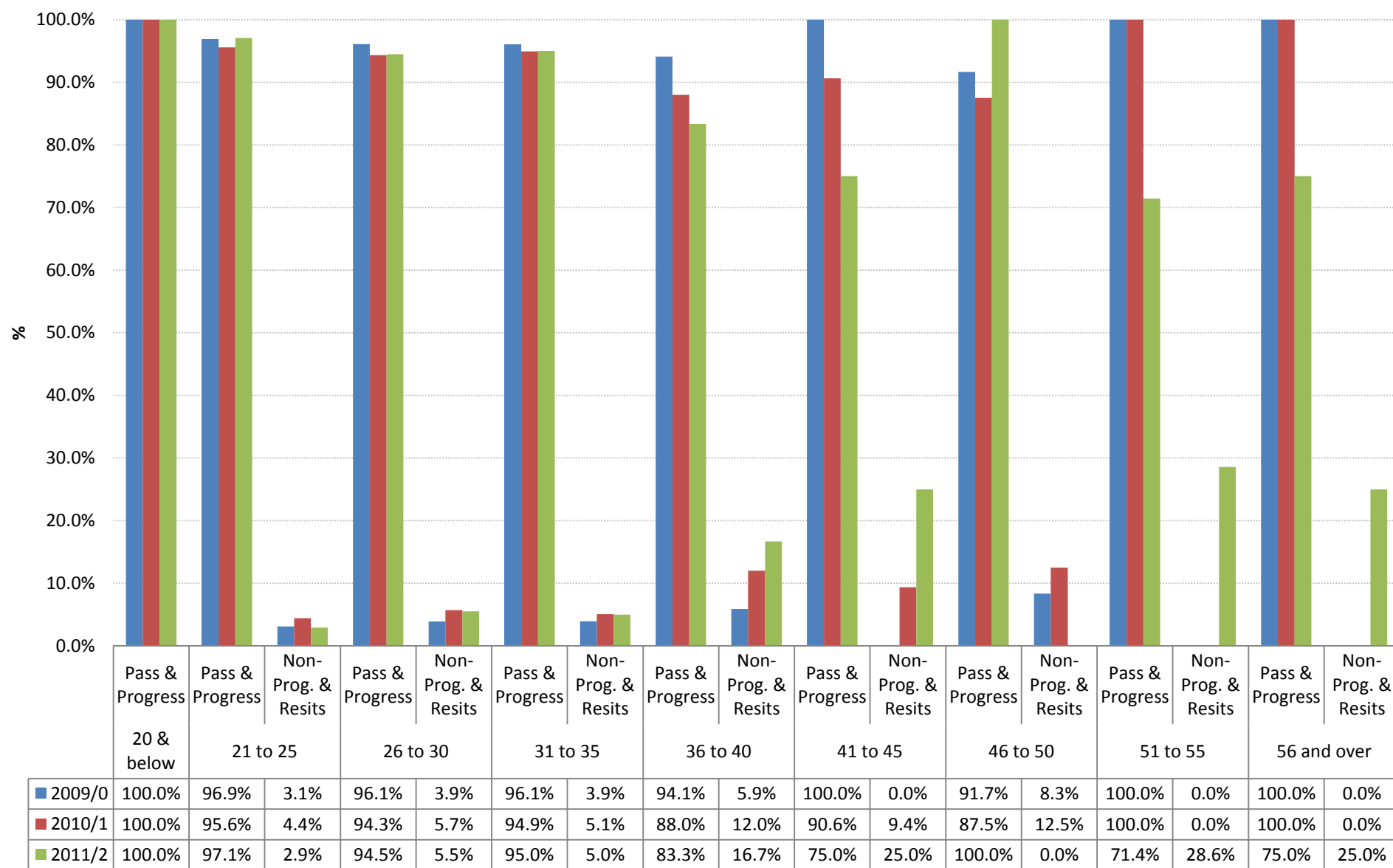

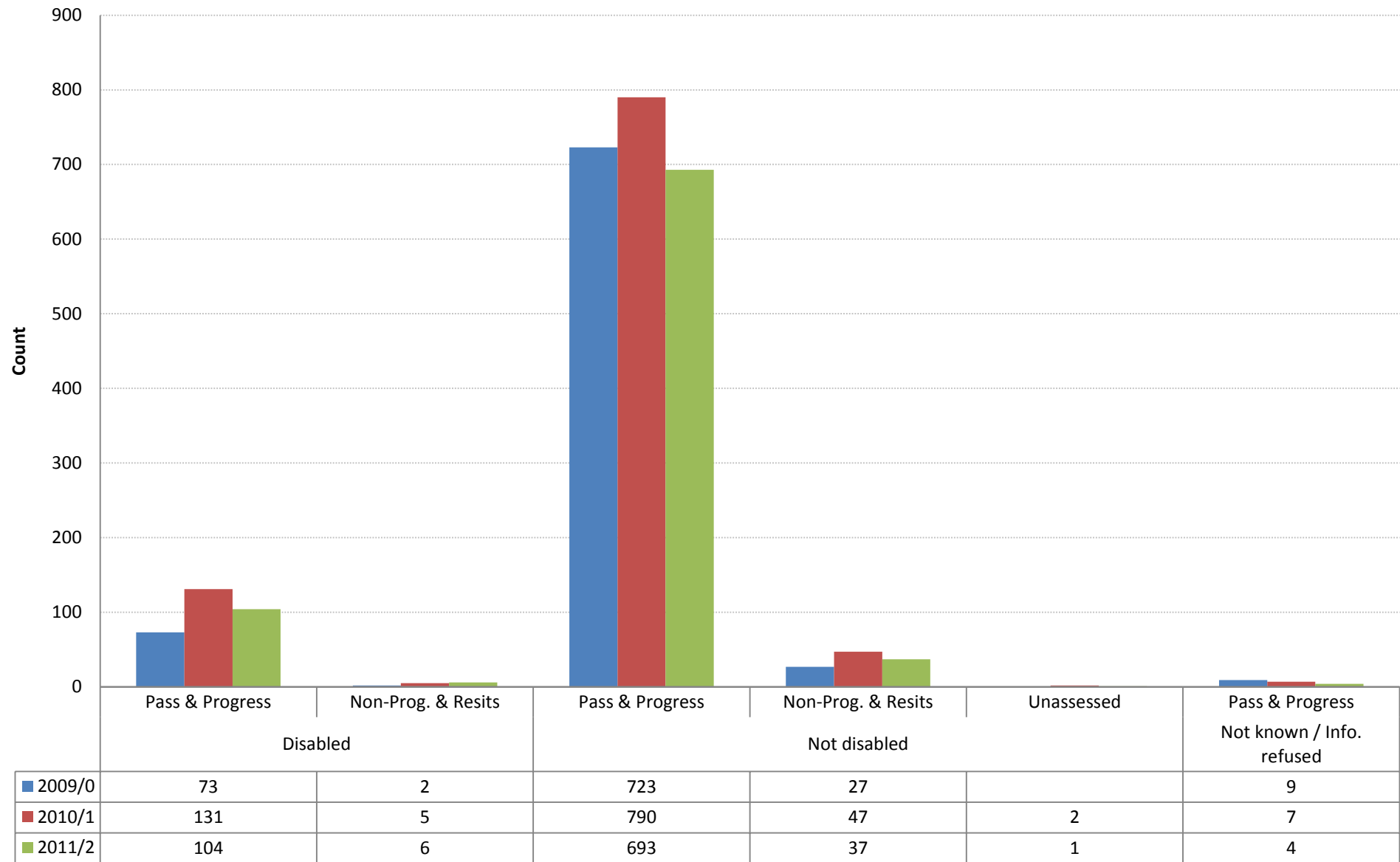

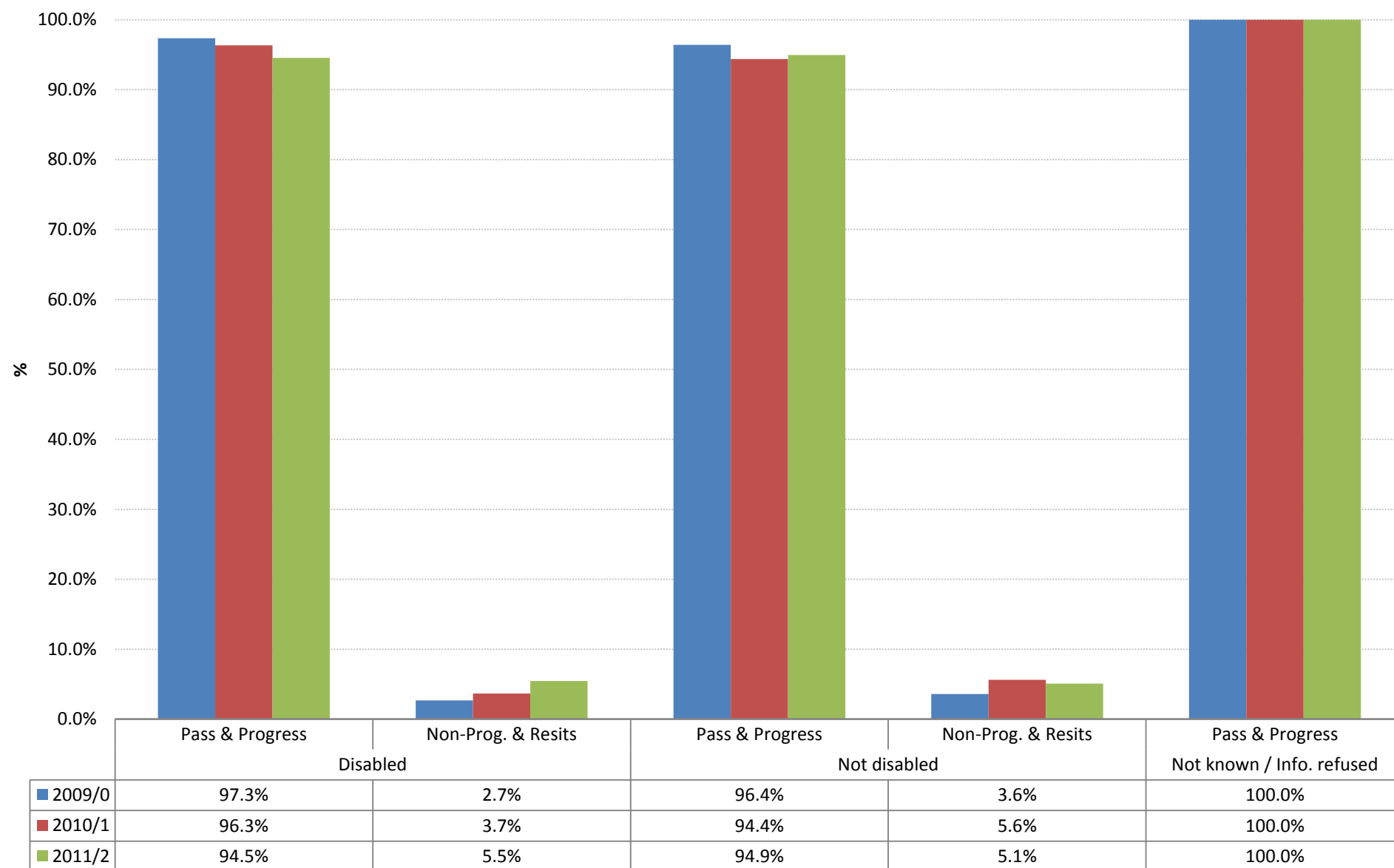
Progression: Age Group, UK Taught Postgraduates (%)



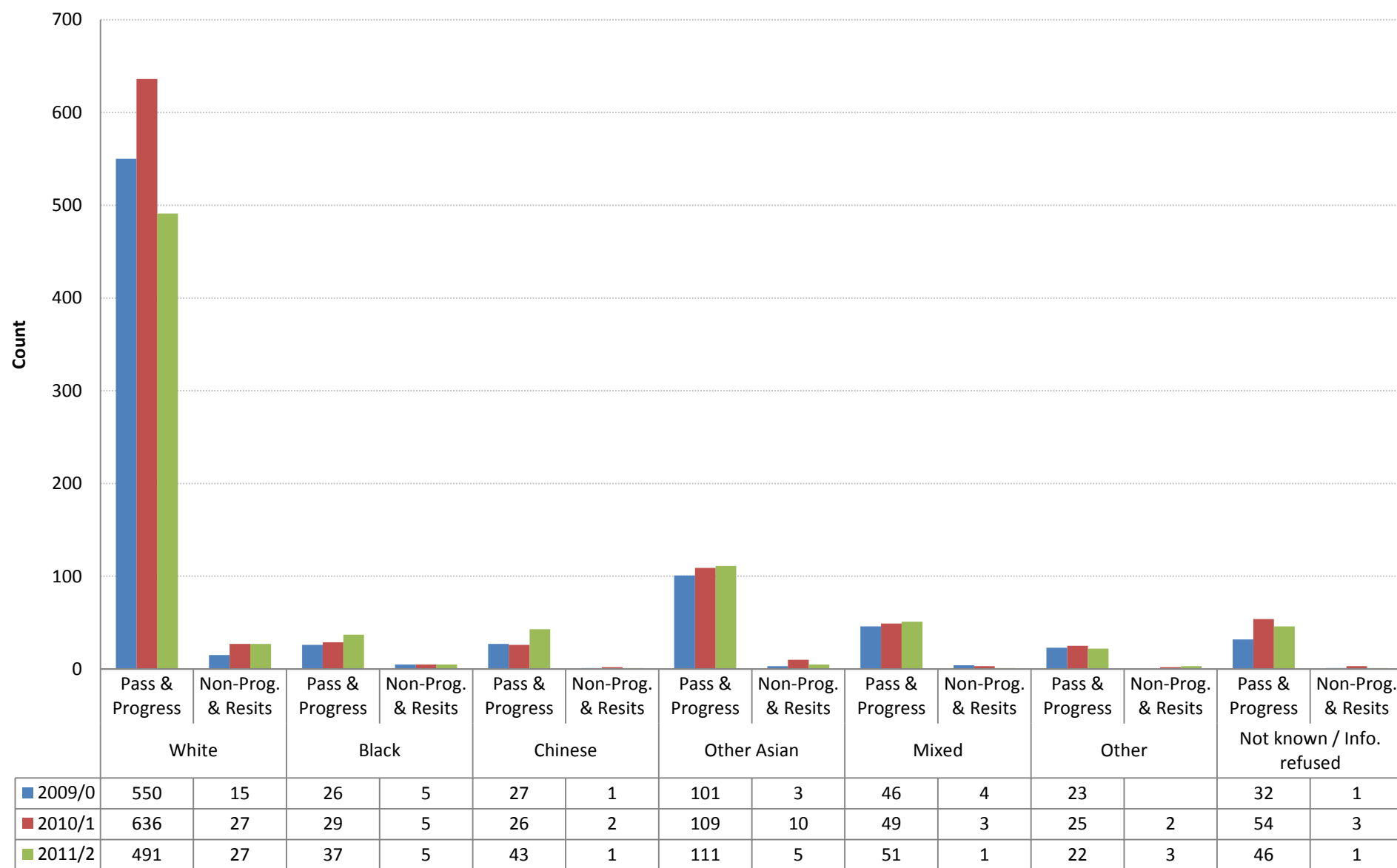

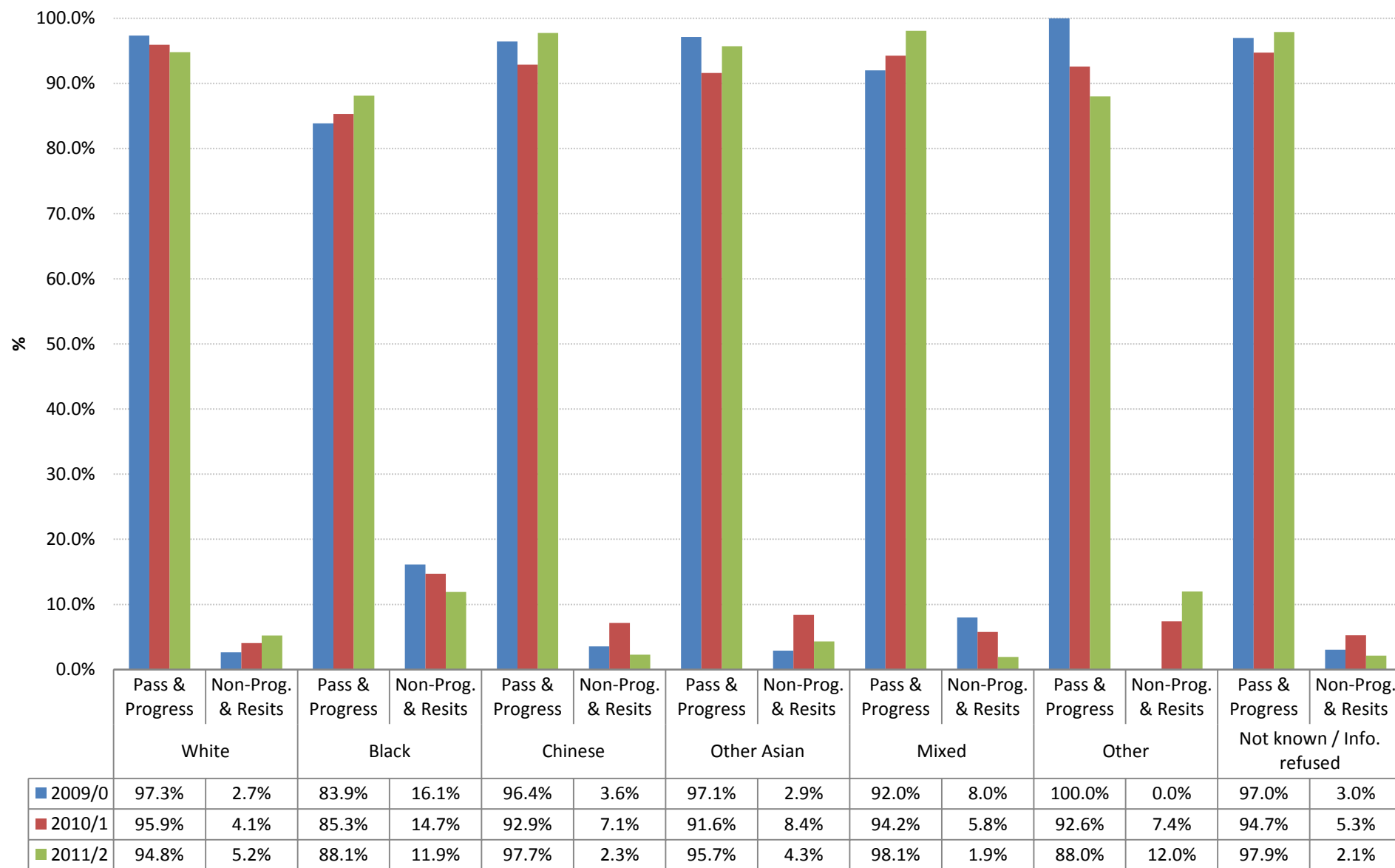

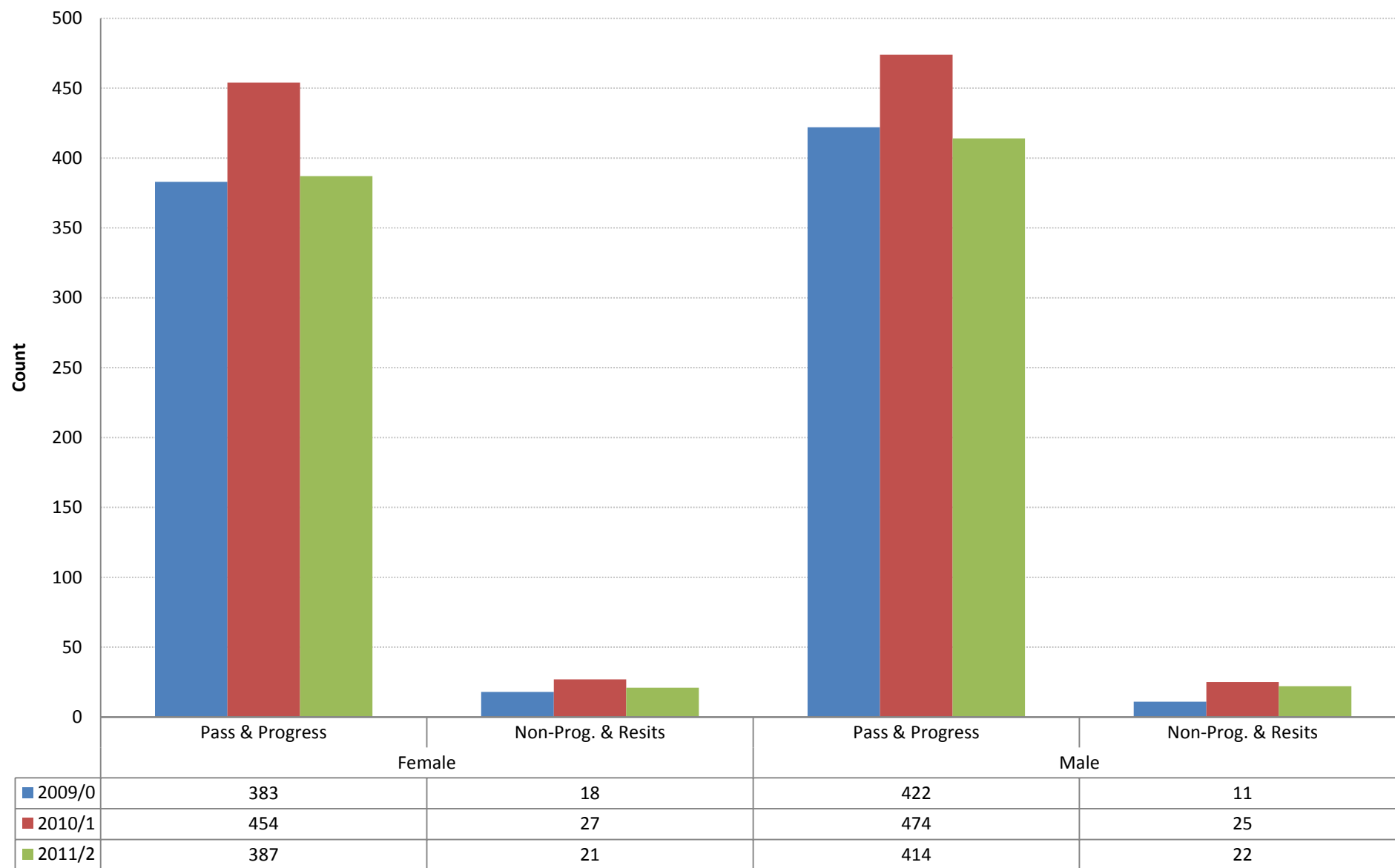

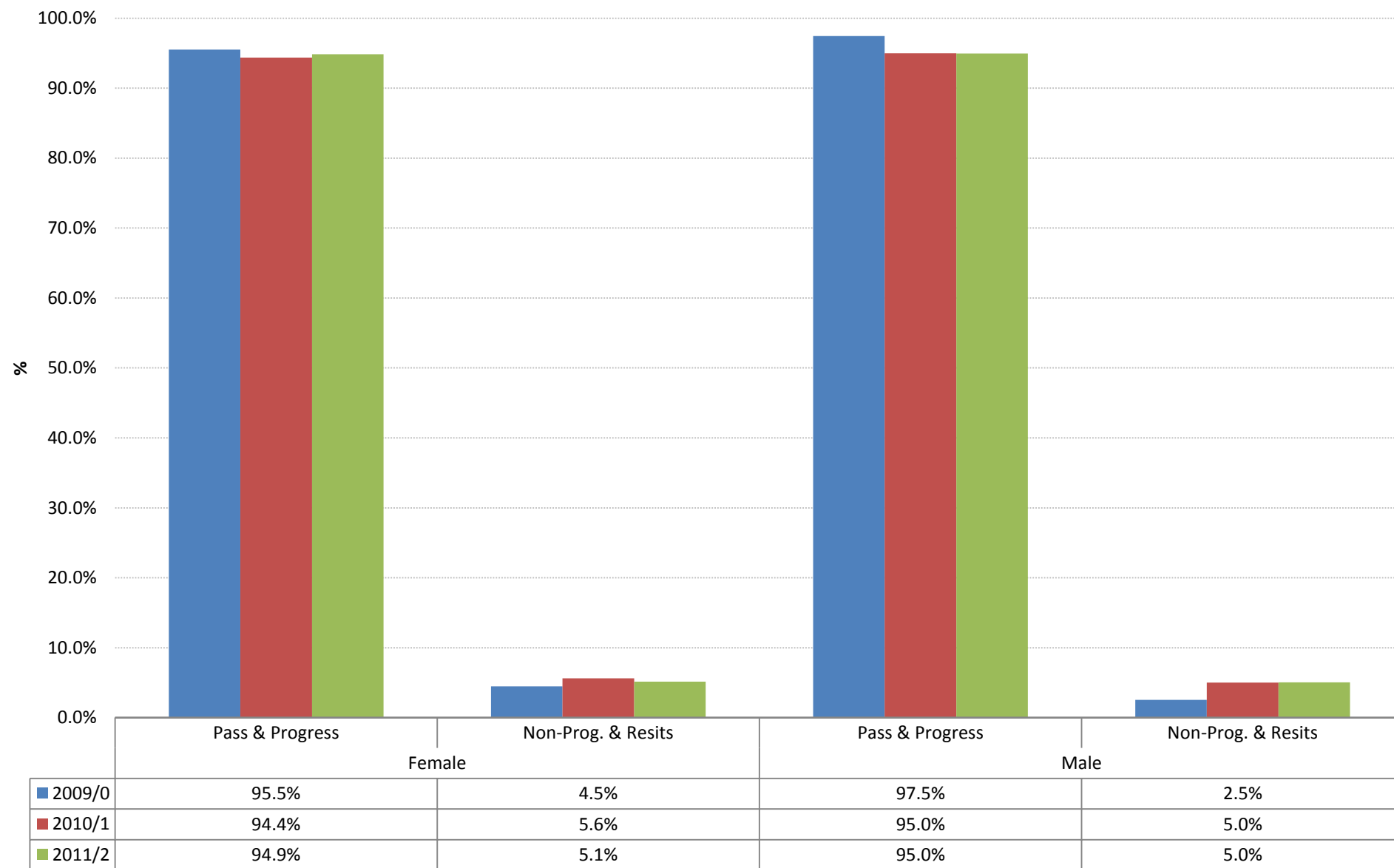

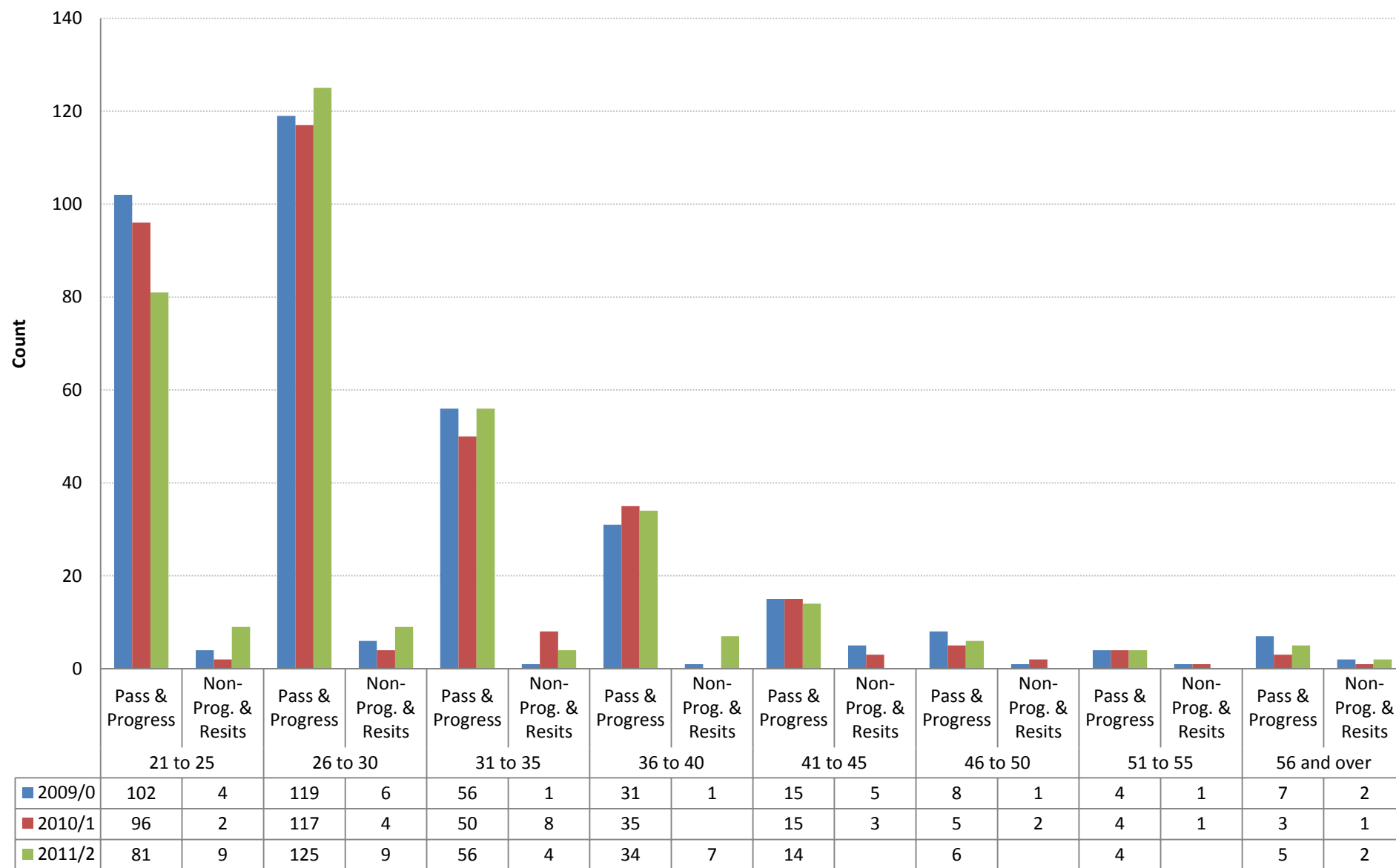

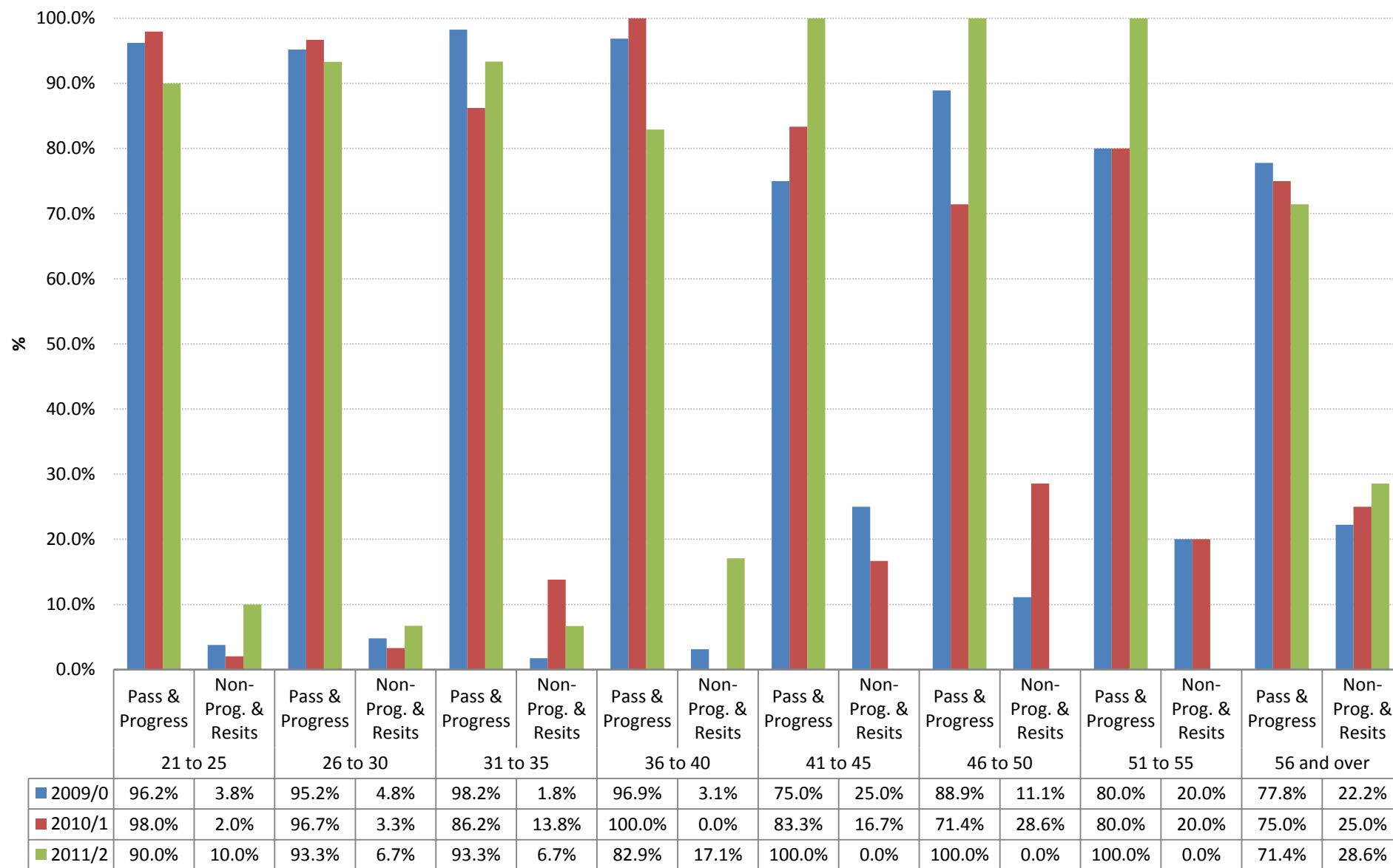

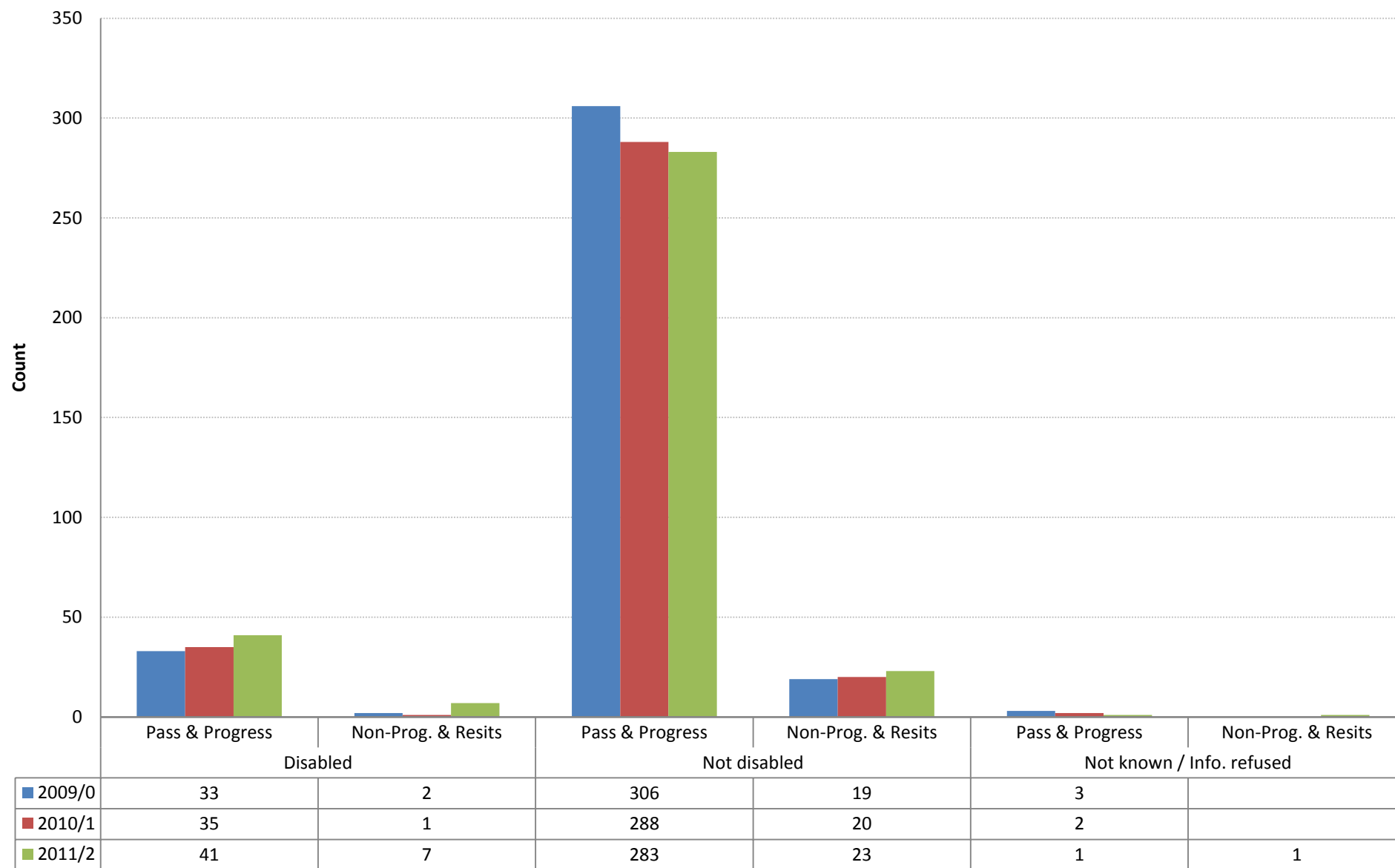

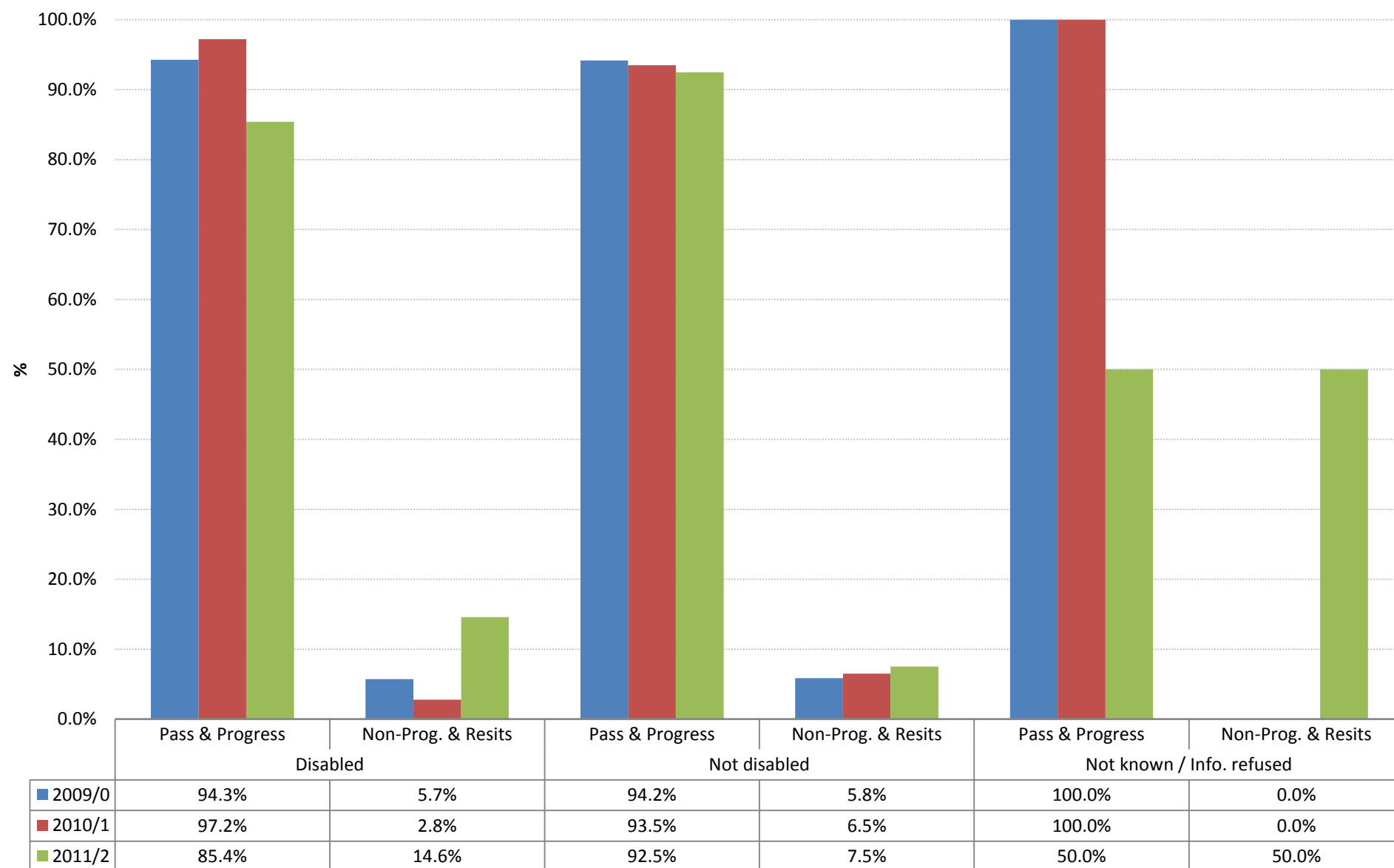

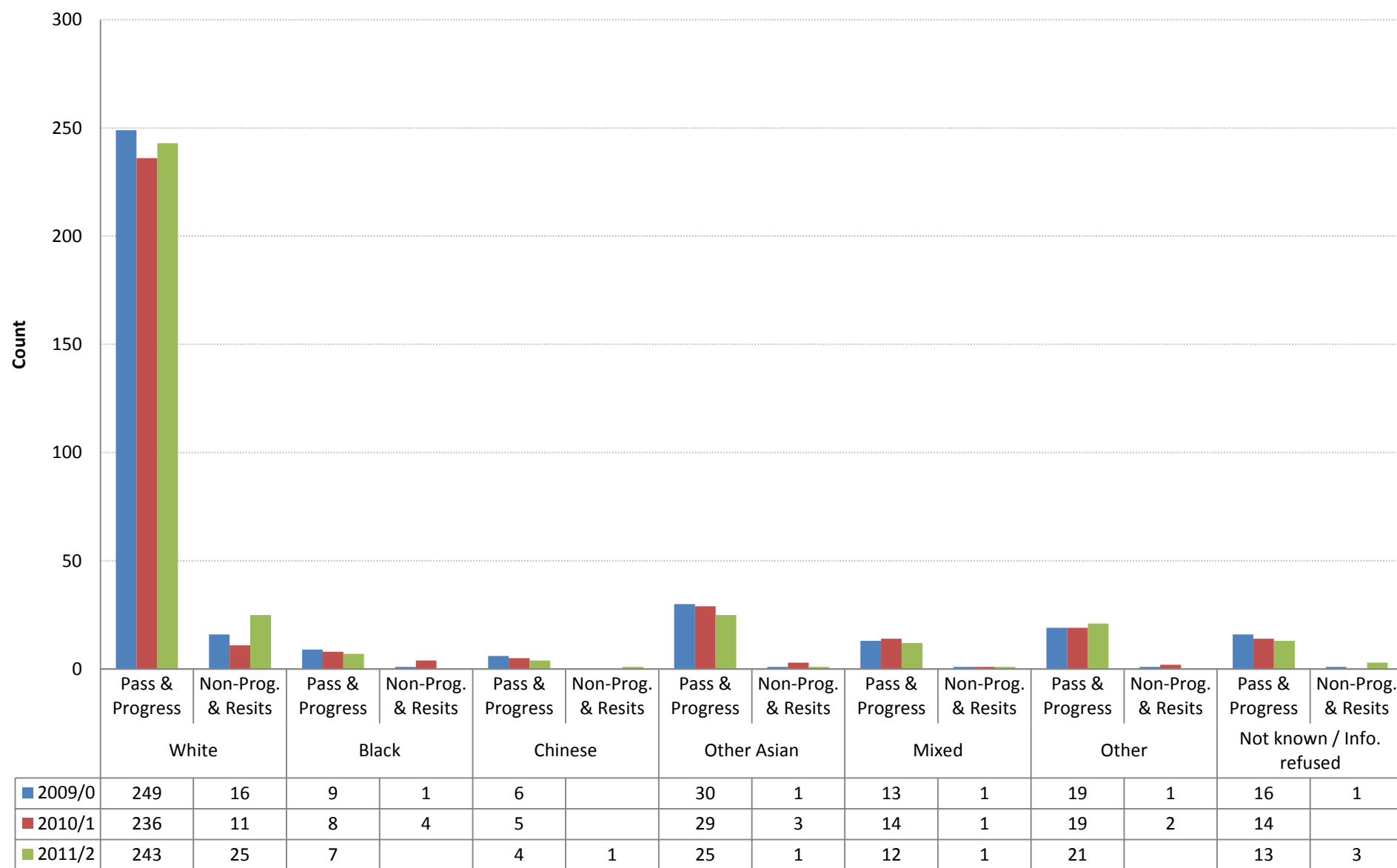

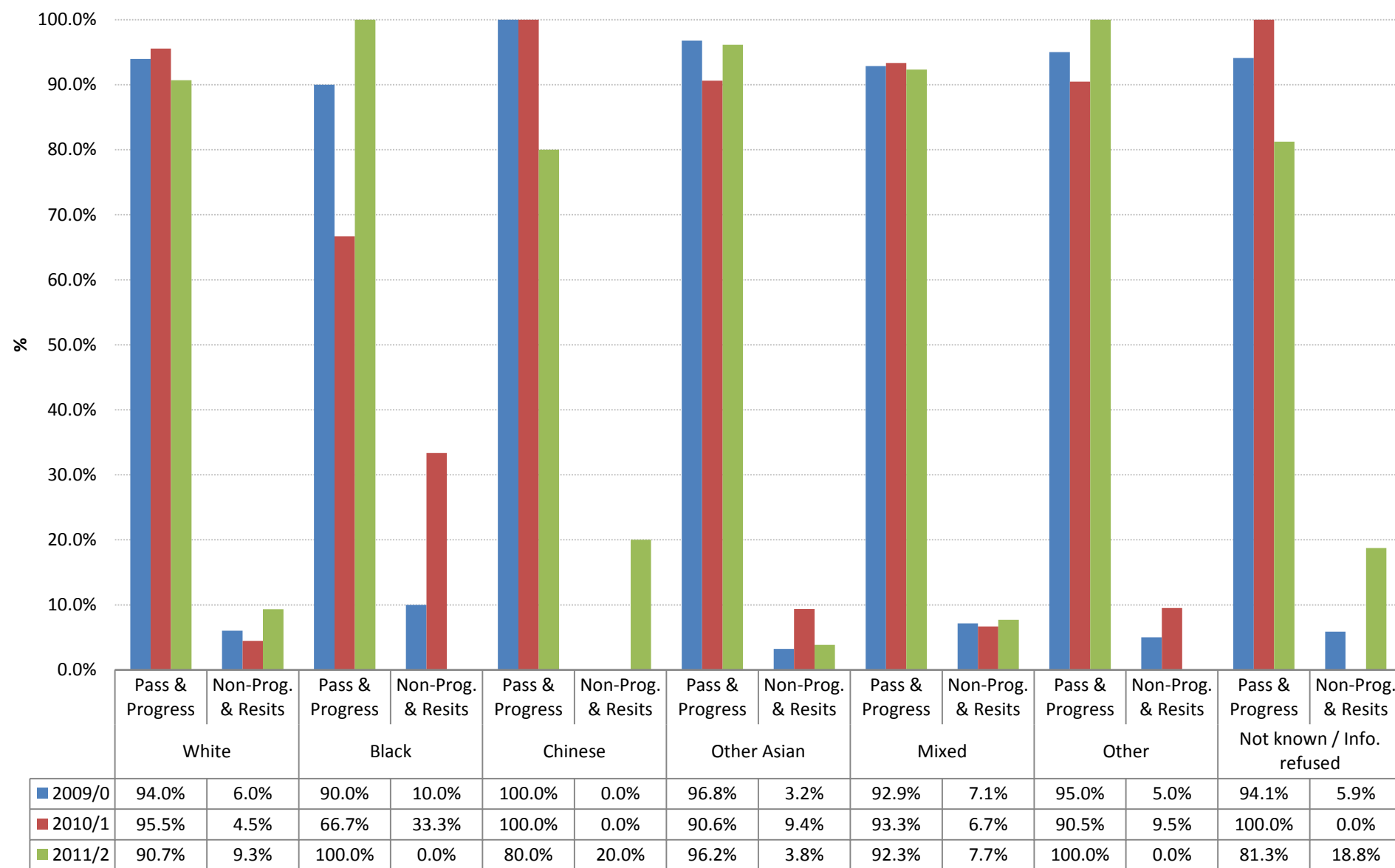

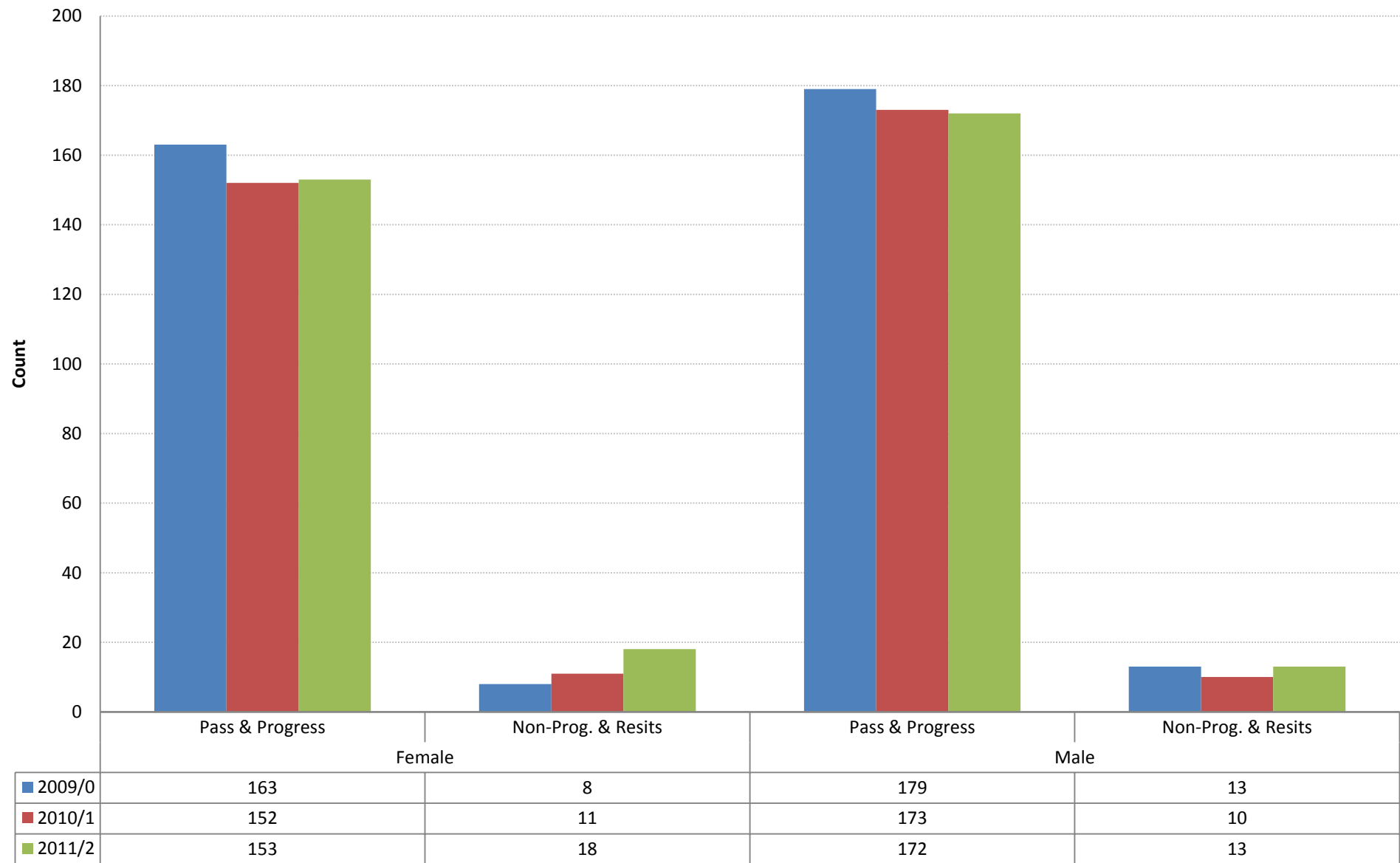

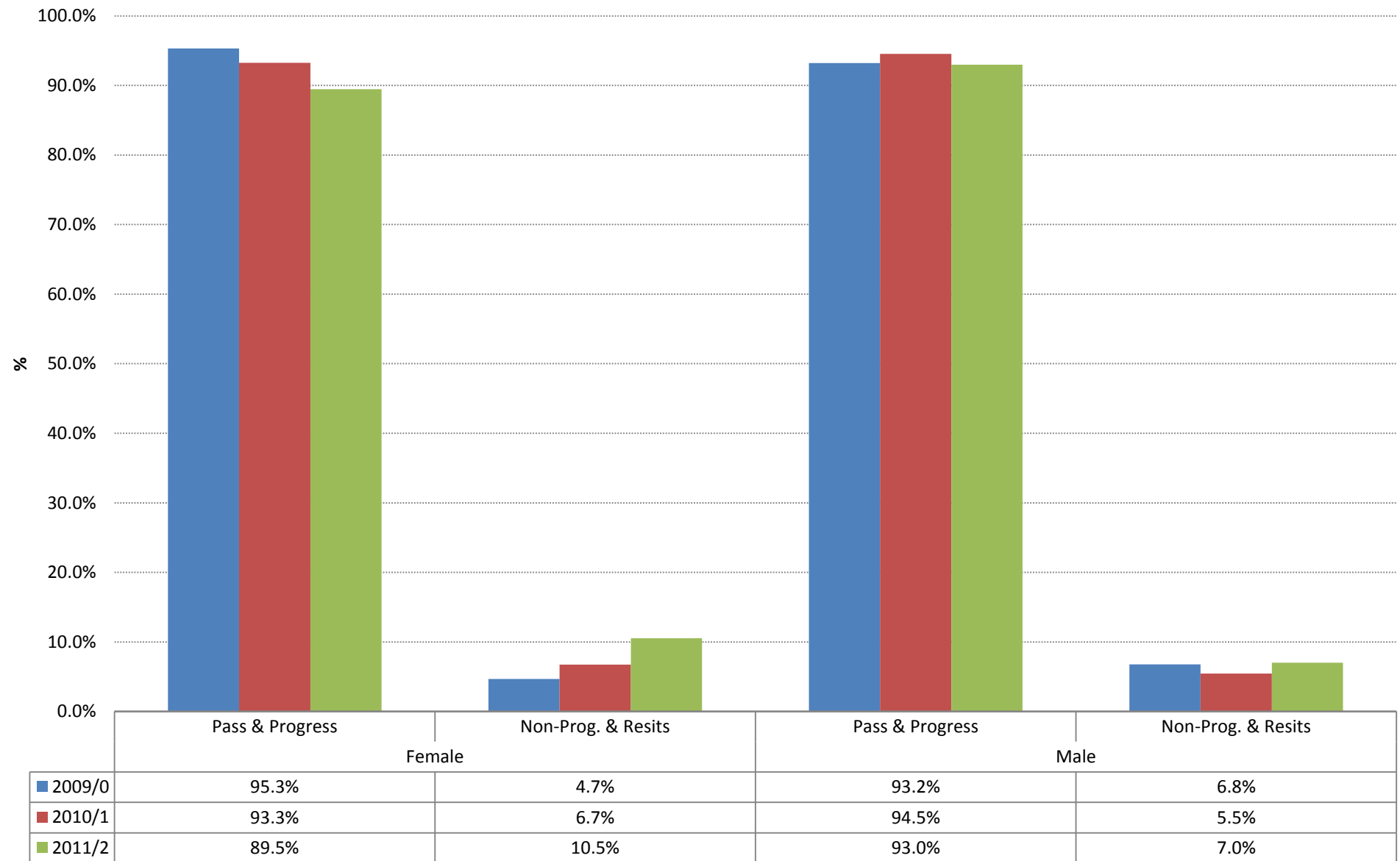

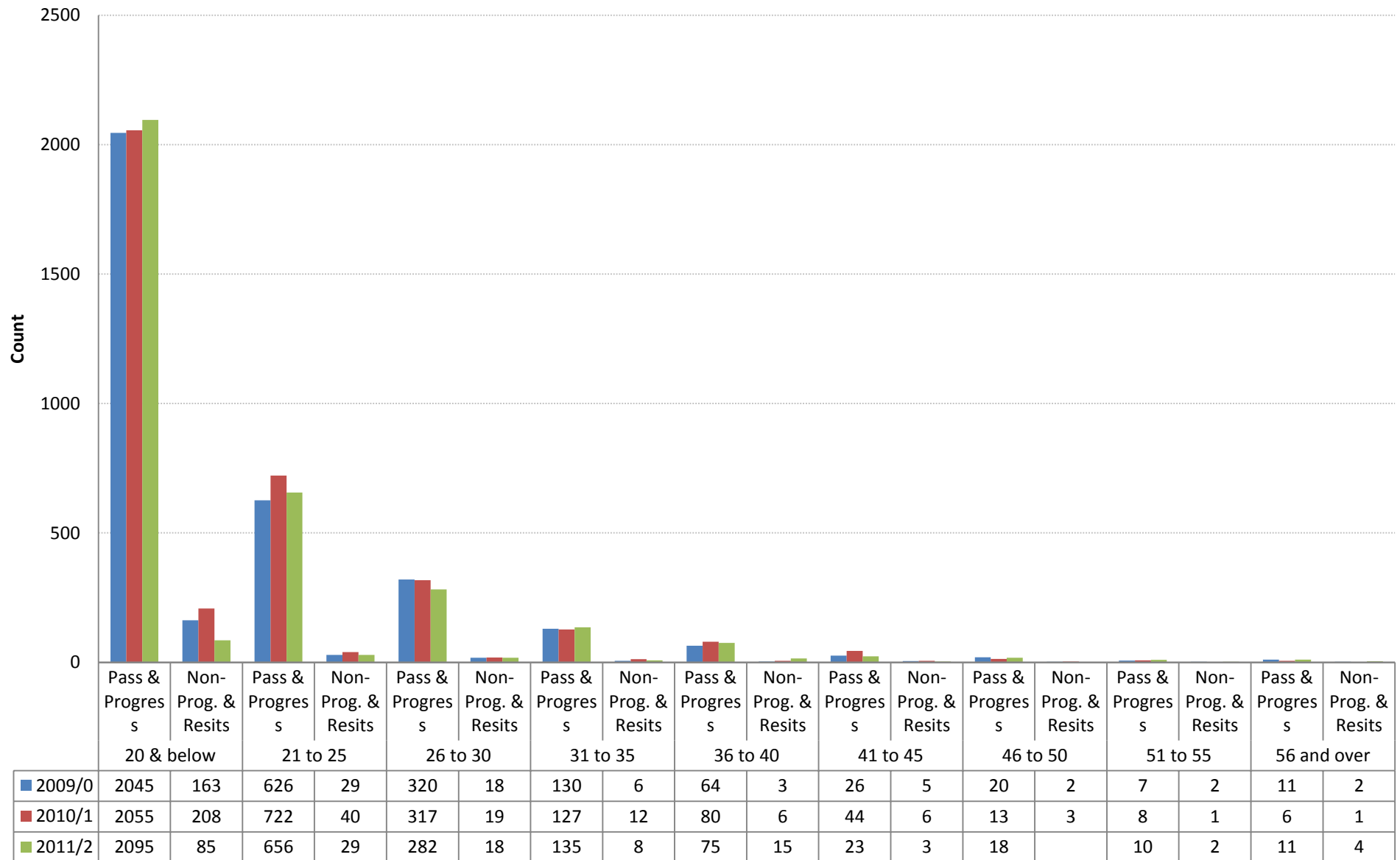

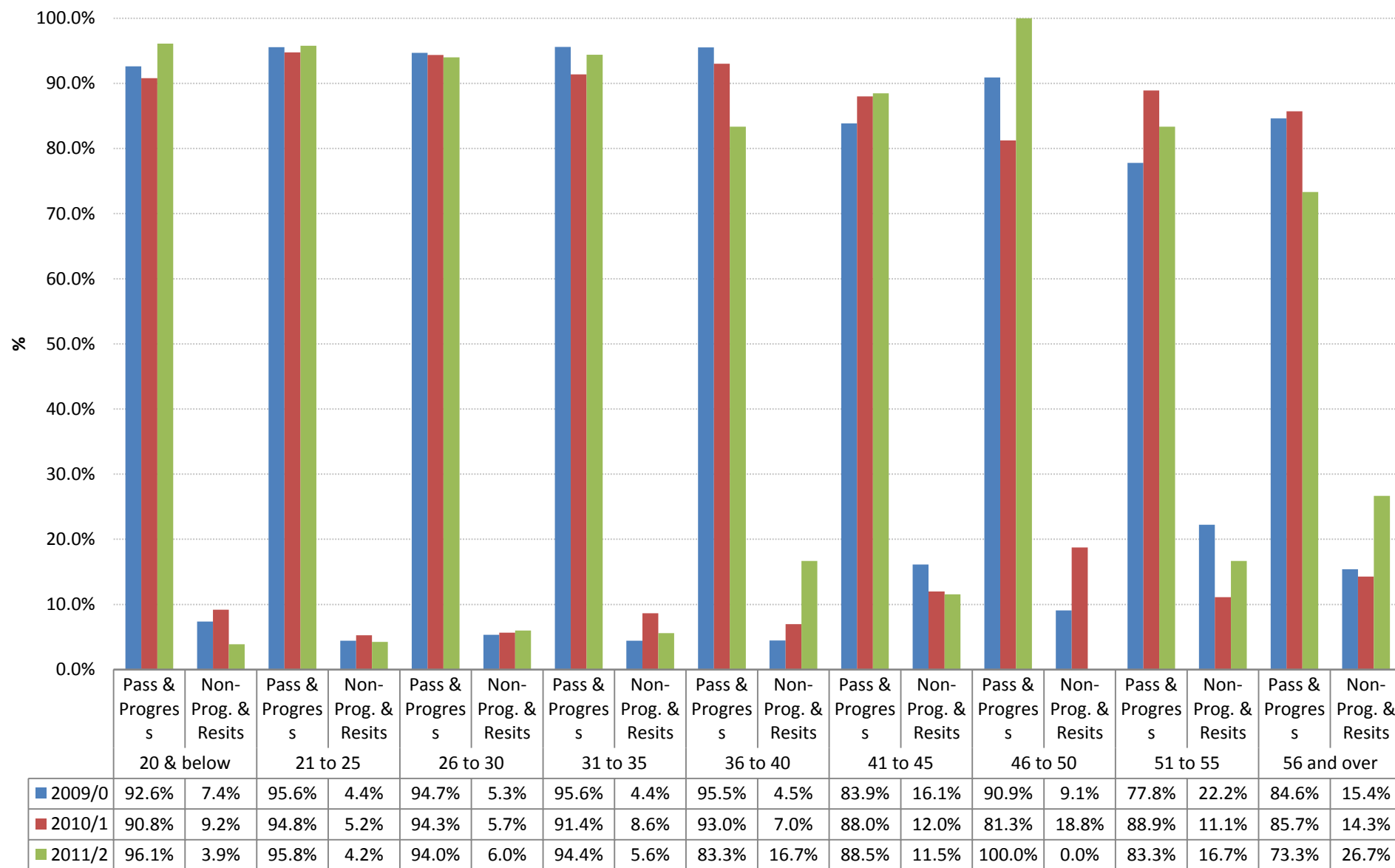

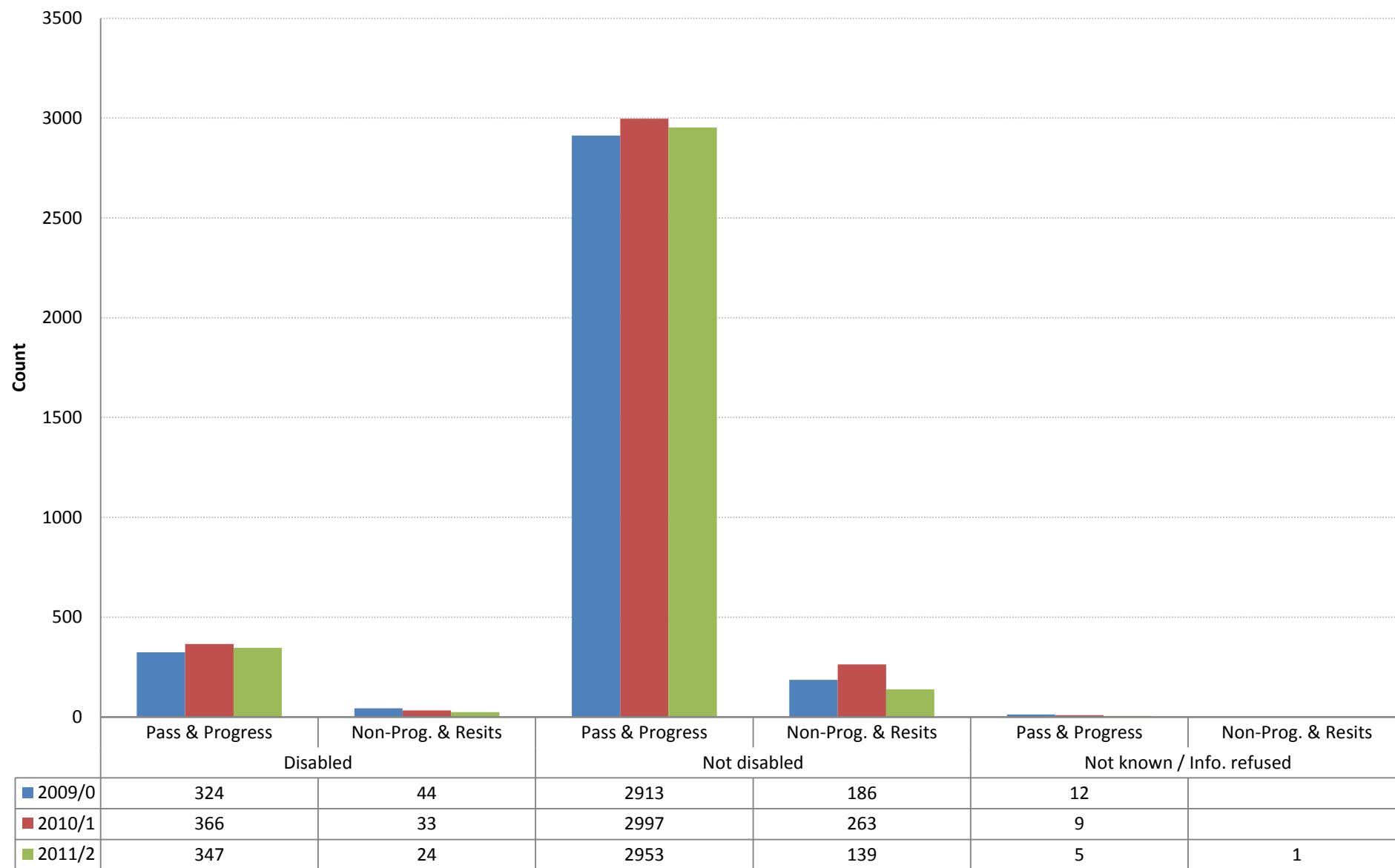

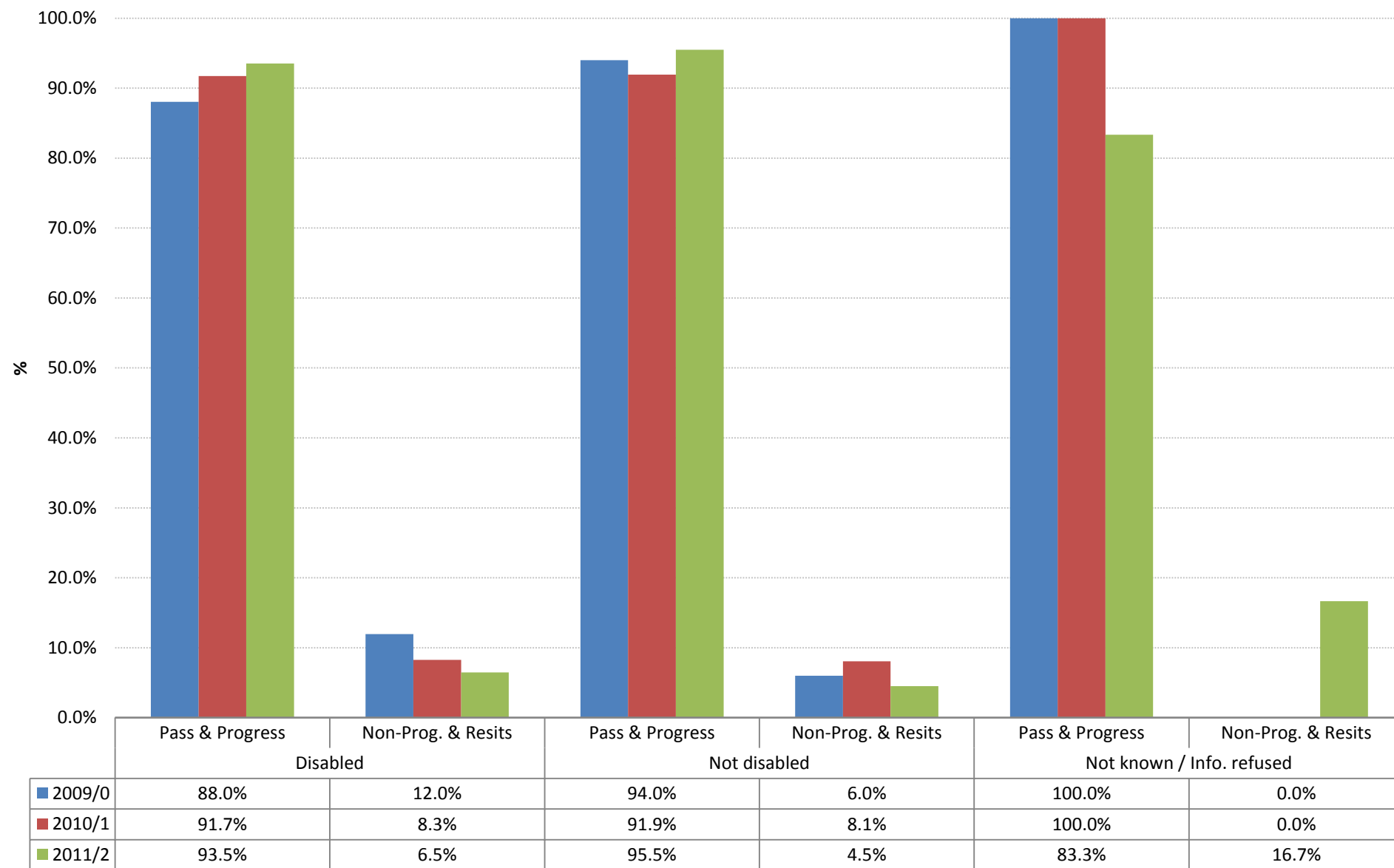
Progression: Age Group, All UK (%)



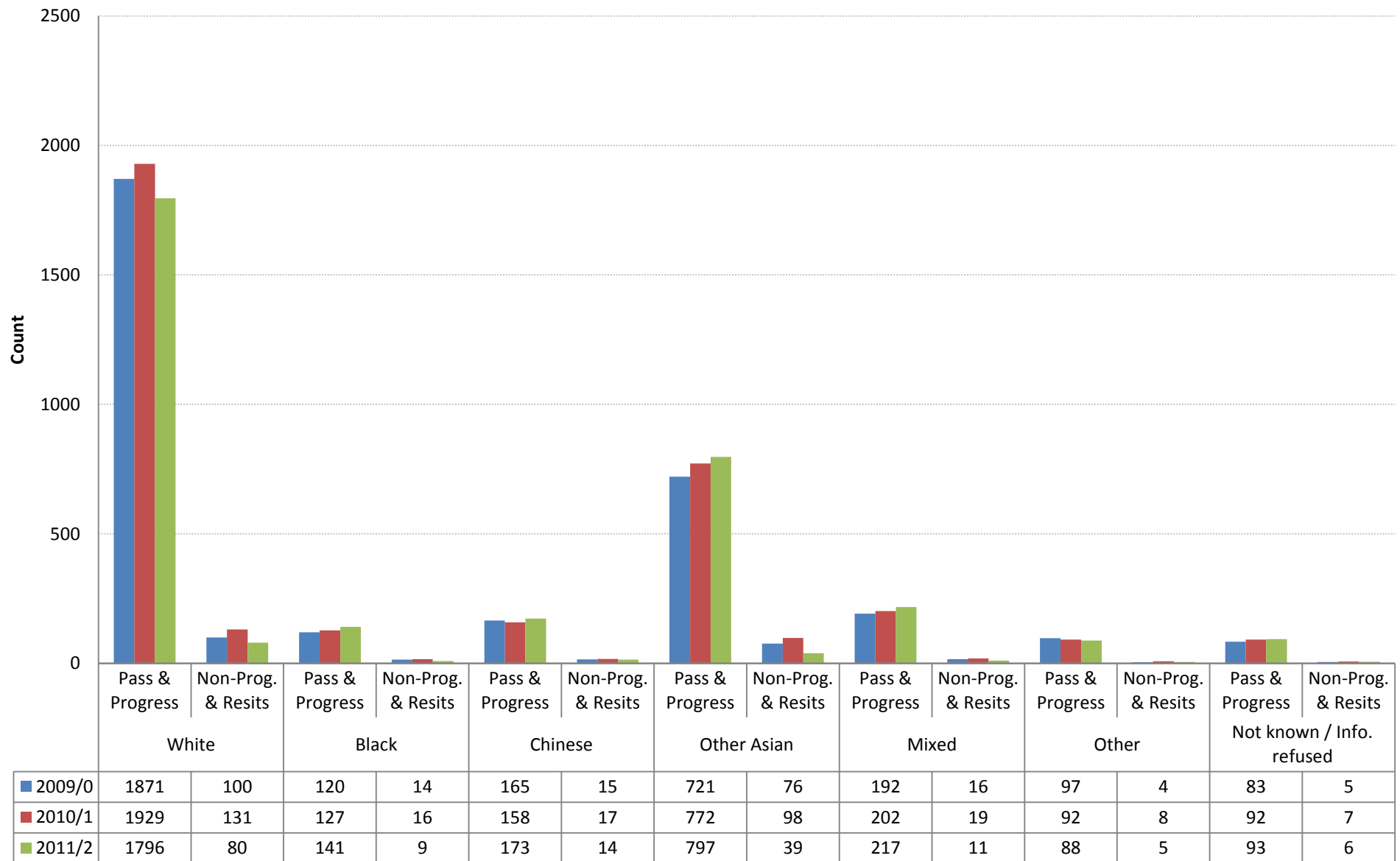

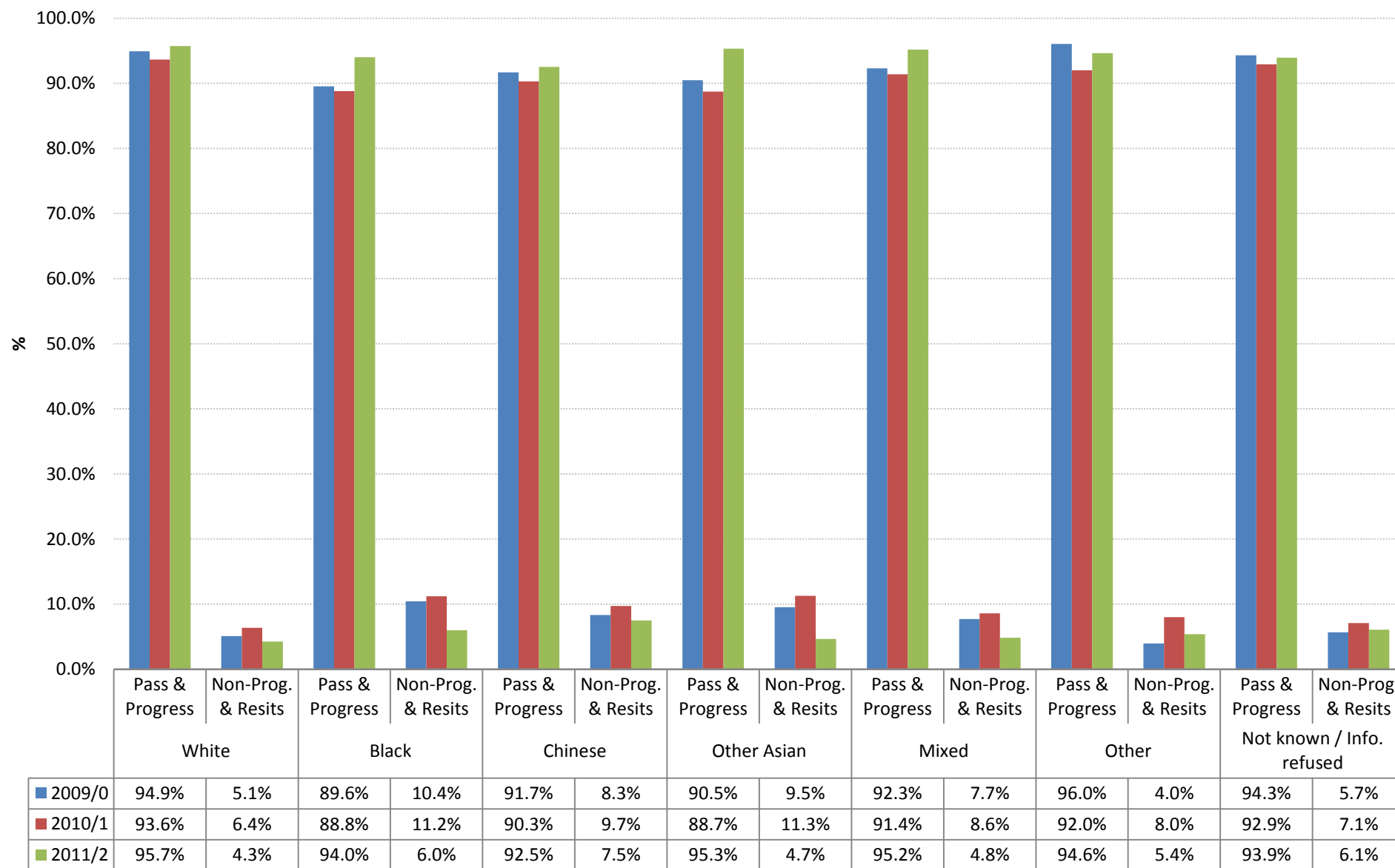

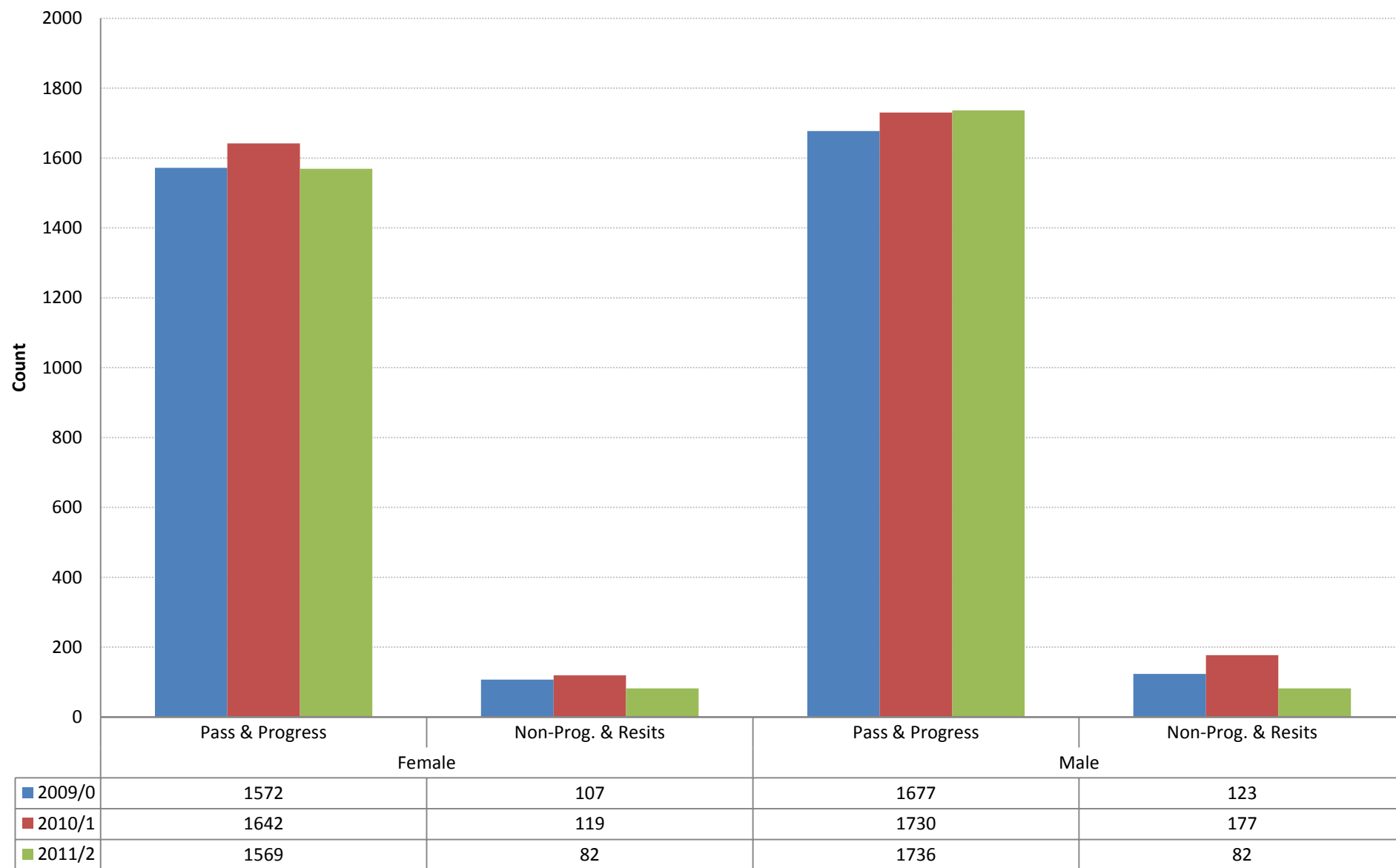

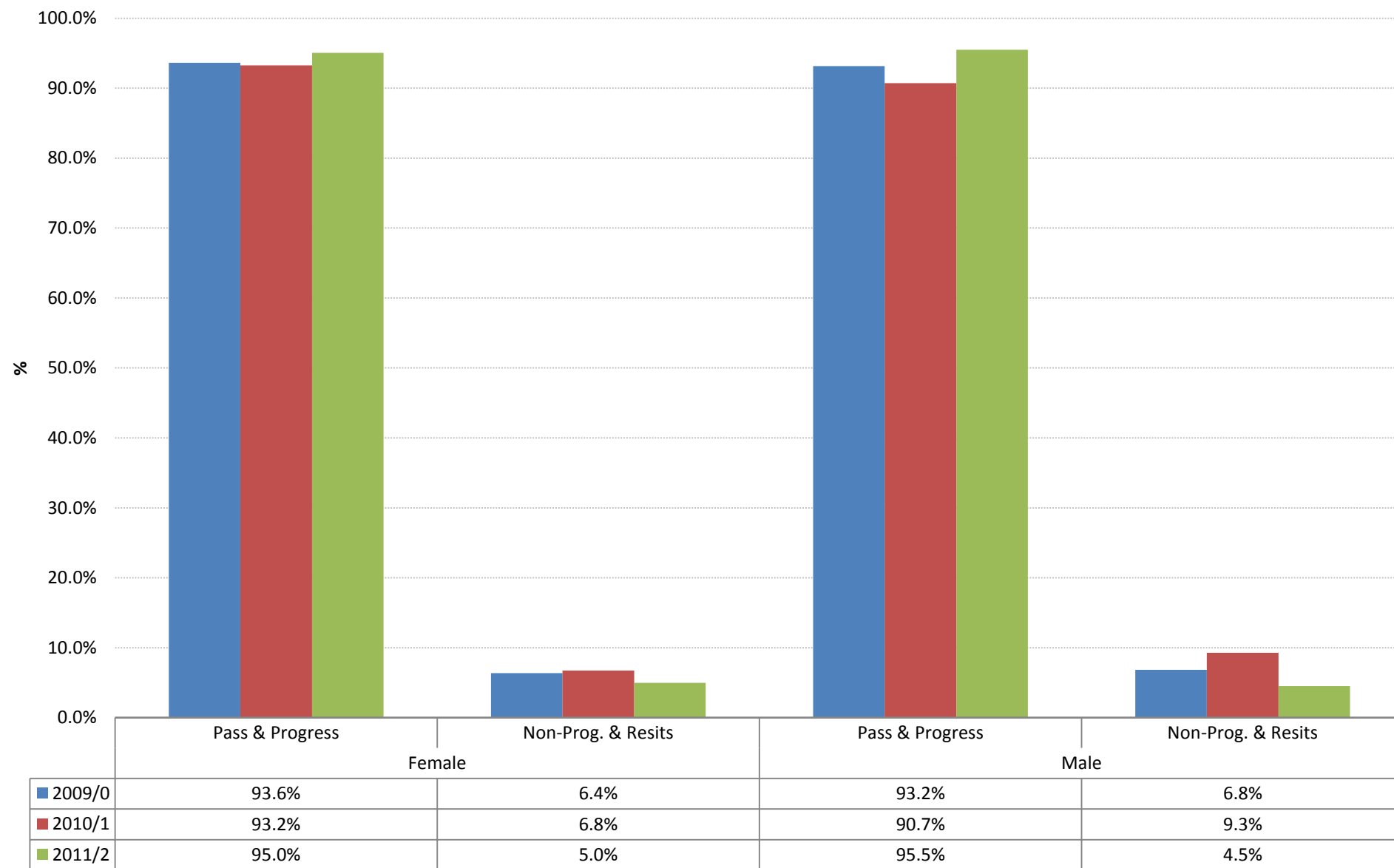

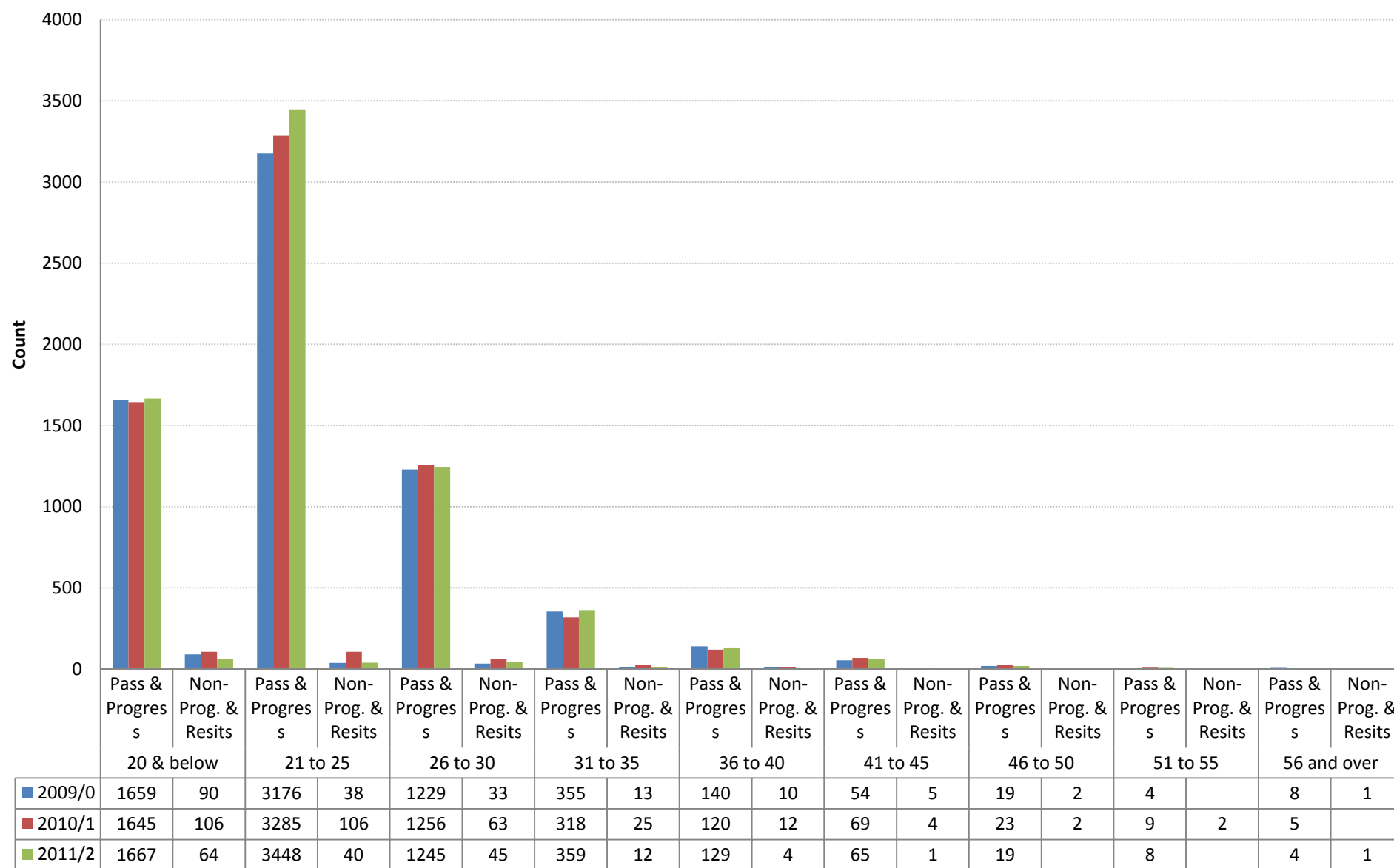

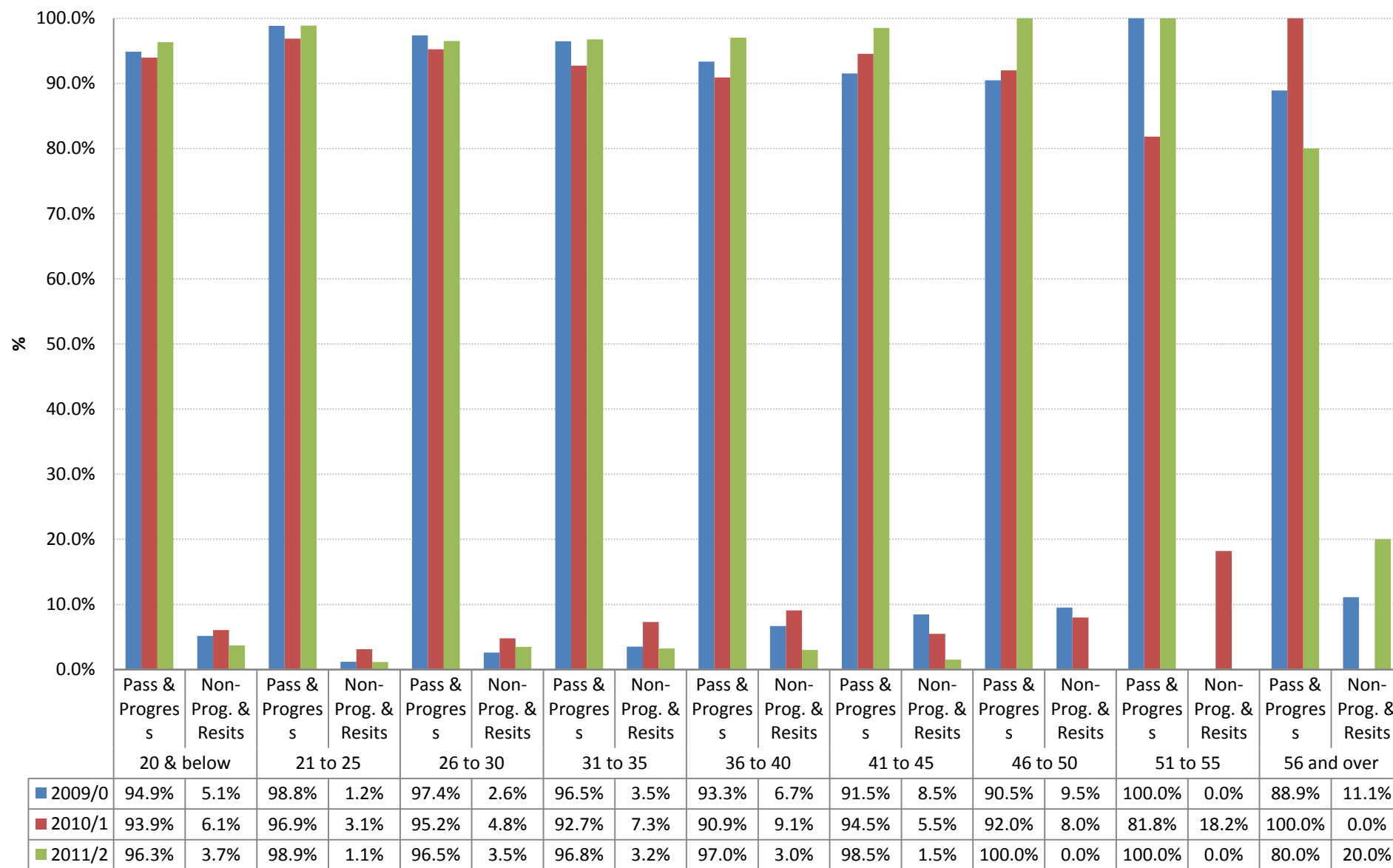

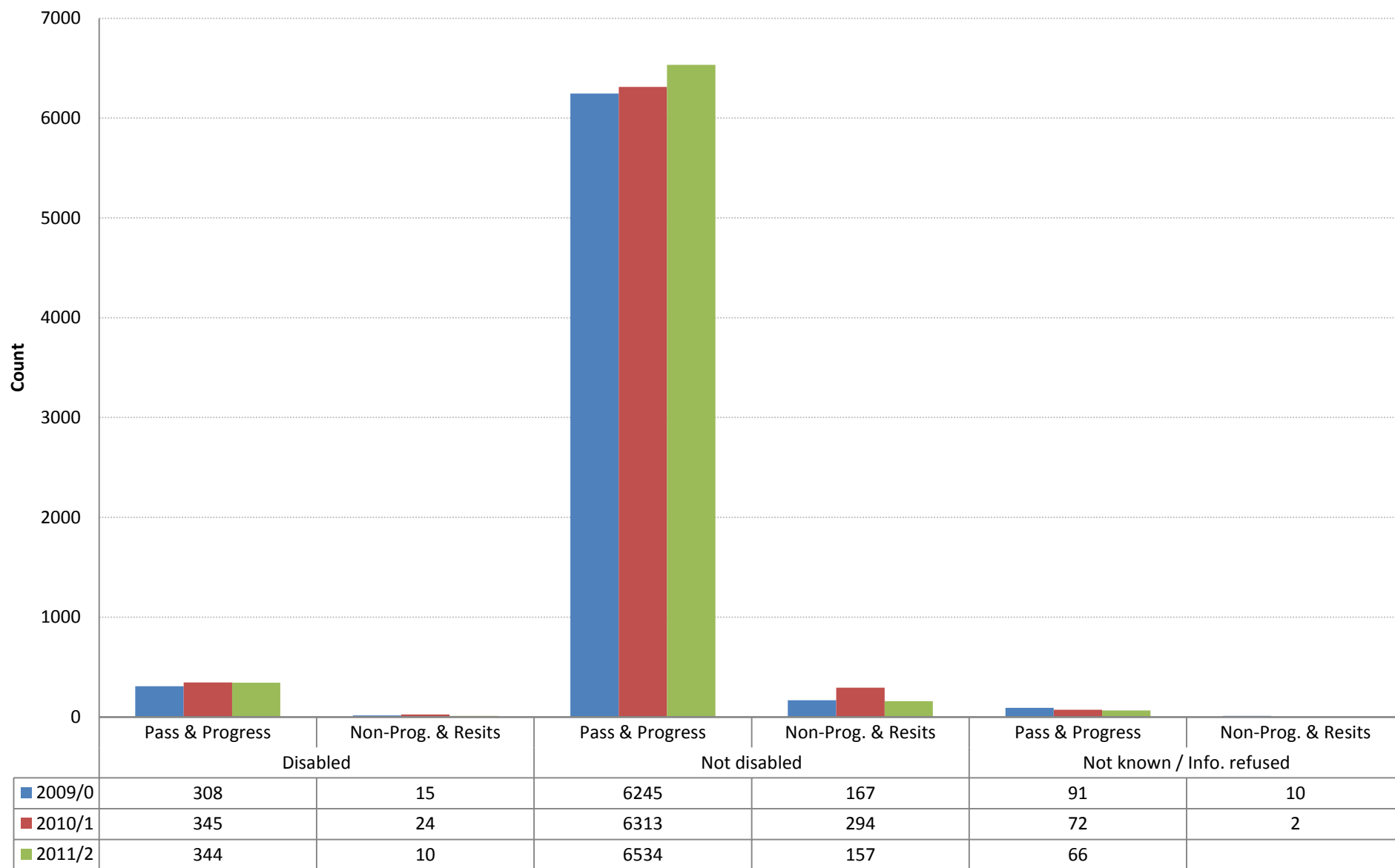

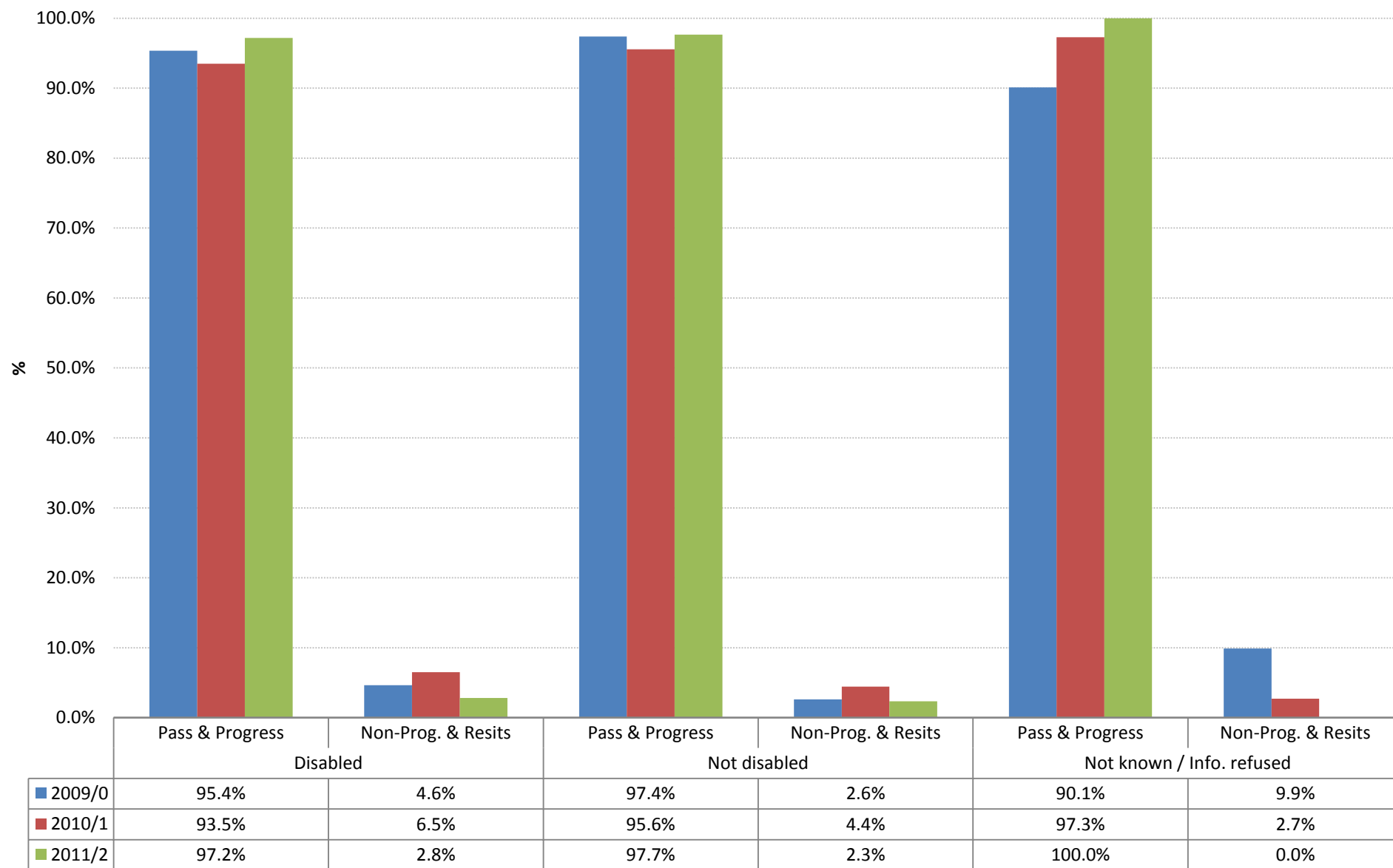

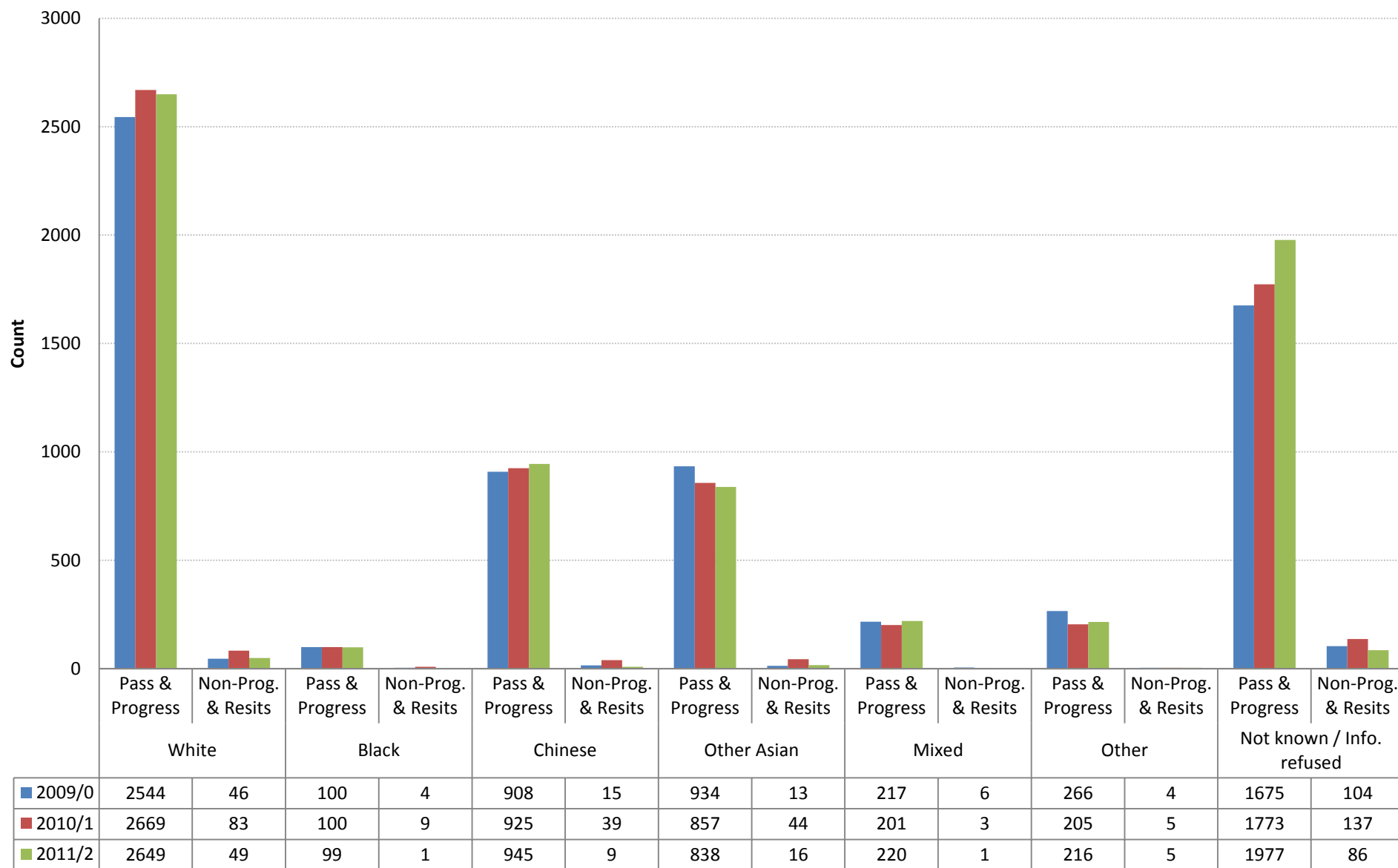

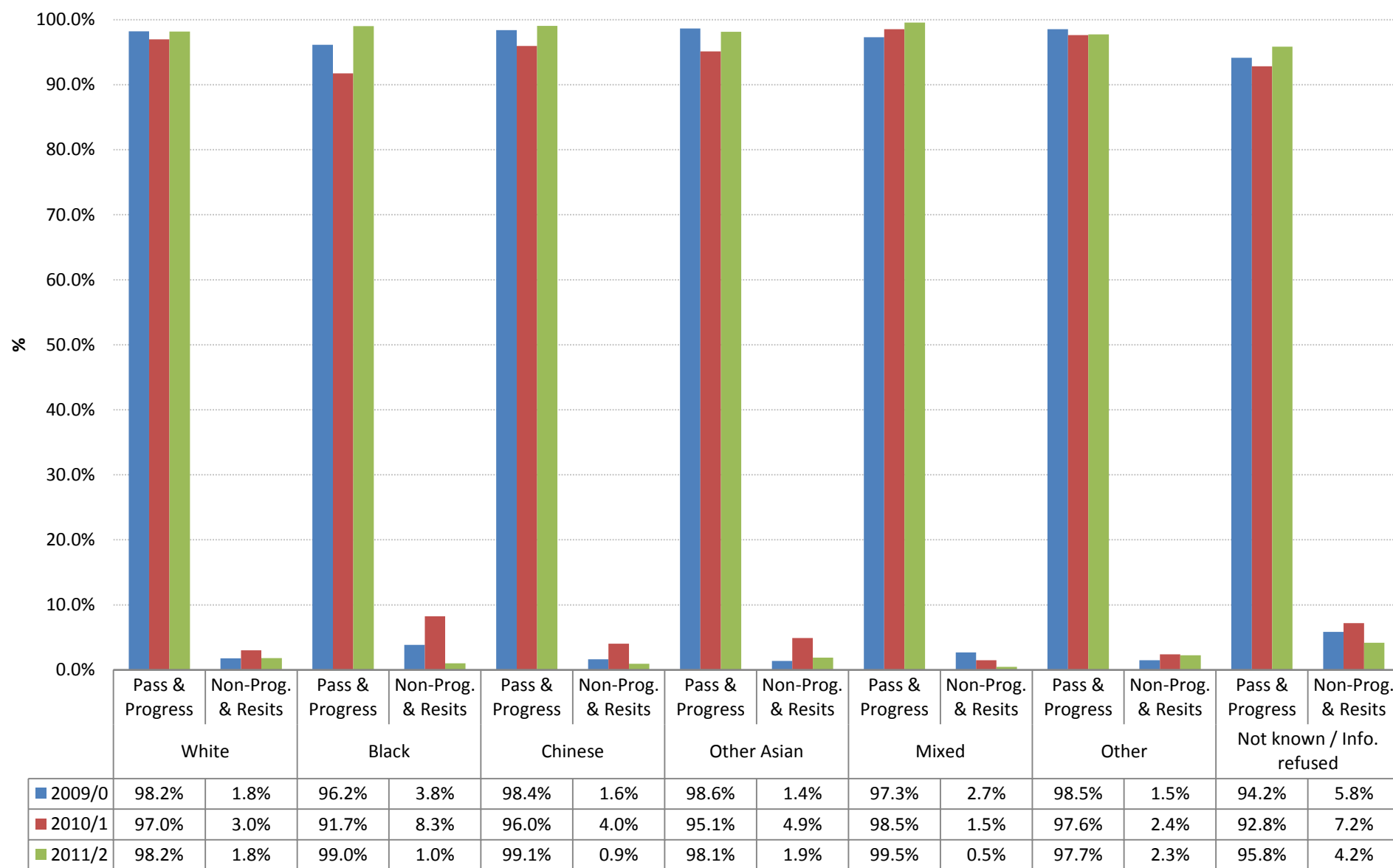

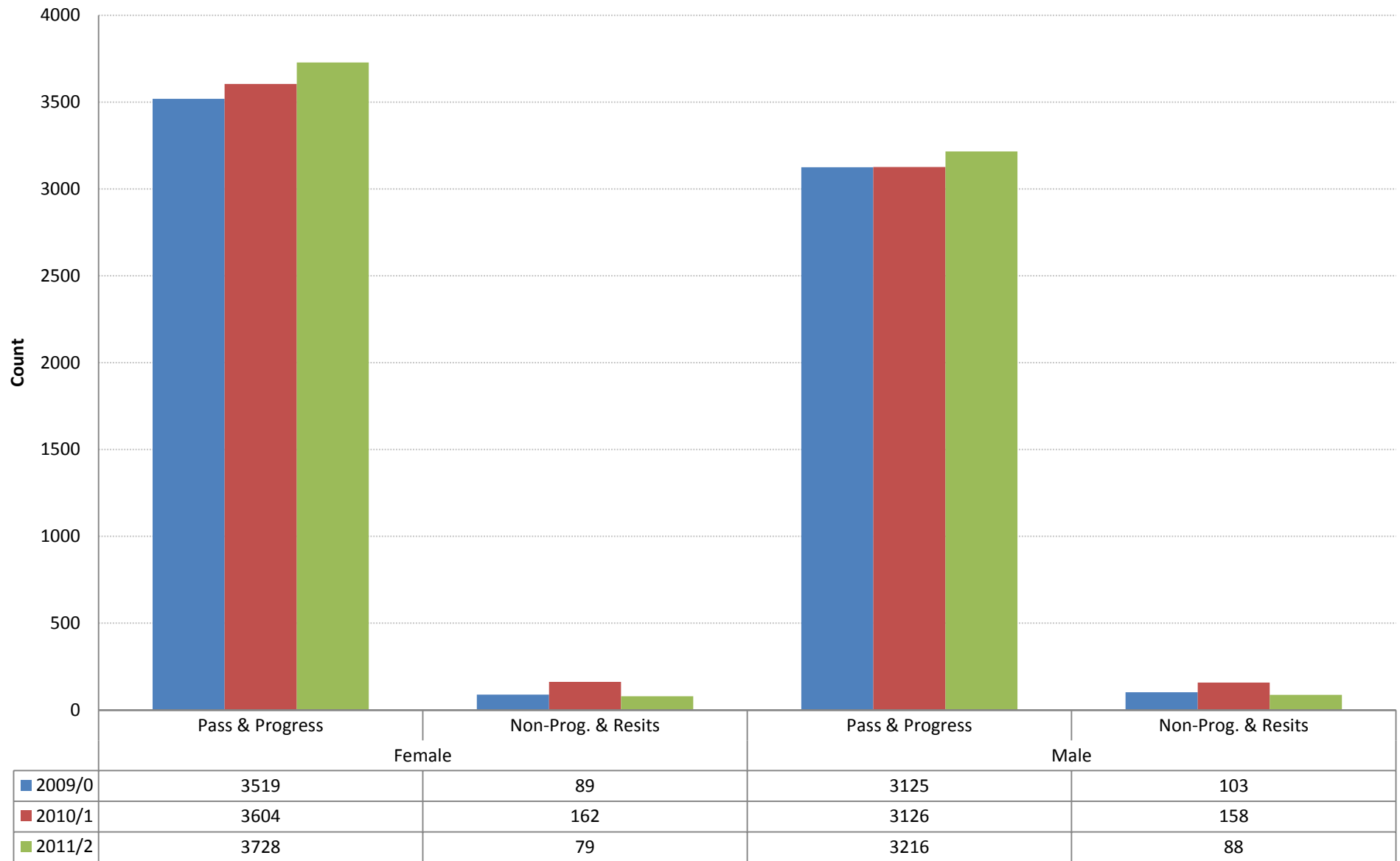
