## What Have You Got to Hide?

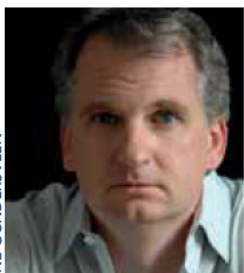
