This event is organised by the Centre for Trust, Peace and Social Relations, Coventry University in partnership with the Association of Southeast Asian Studies UK (ASEASUK).



Dr Joseph Scalice to give an online public lecture

On 3rd March 2021 (17.00 PST), ECR Network member Dr Joseph Scalice will be giving an online public lecture, sponsored by UC Berkeley's Center for Southeast Asian Studies, entitled <u>"Three Grenades in August: the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Bombing of Plaza Miranda."</u> The talk will examine the political and social context of the bombing of the Liberal Party election rally in 1971, the heated disputes over culpability, and the continuing historical relevance of the event.
