Dear,

Welcome to our March newsletter! here we explain the ways in which you can confirm your offer and meet any conditions which have been set. Some of you may have a **Conditional offer**, with conditions relating to achieving a certain grade on your current degree and/or Summer School or English Language test, and providing documents; whereas some of you may have an **Unconditional offer** and just need to provide verified versions of documents you supplied online with your application.

If you have an unconditional offer but we have asked you for versions via a university verification service, please send them in now! For the selection process we were able to use scanned documents that you previously uploaded with your application, but we now need to confirm the validity of these documents through a digital service offered by your university. In the Summer when current students graduate, we get sent a mountain of documents which result in longer processing times, so avoid getting caught up in this traffic and send us everything now!

The <u>Graduate Applicant Portal</u> will let you know what it is that you still need to provide to us. When you send your documents, make sure you check our <u>current processing times</u>, so you have an idea of how long it may be before you hear from us.

We hope that you enjoy this month's issue, and look forward to welcoming you later this year.

Official Documents

The documents you supplied within your application are not considered official documents because they are not supplied directly from the issuing institution. This is why after you have been made an offer, we require you to get the same documents submitted to us electronically officially from the issuing authority.

If your offer is unconditional, you may still be required to supply additional, official, documentation. Any such requirement is stipulated in your offer letter and on the <u>Graduate Applicant</u> <u>Portal</u>.

These documents must be received before you will be allowed to enrol with LSE. Full guidance on what constitutes an "official" document, or how to get a document certified, is detailed on pages 30 to 35 of the <u>Offer Pack</u>.

You need to send documents electronically, i.e. via an electronic transcript transfer service, such as Digitary, Gradintelligence, eSCRIP-SAFE, Parchment, CHESICC etc. or via an institutional email account (for example results@youruniversity.ac.uk) to graduate.documents@lse.ac.uk.

if there are exceptional reasons why you can't send documents electronically, please contact Graduate Admissions. We will then liaise with your previous institution.

Meeting your conditions

If you have received a <u>conditional offer</u> from us, we will need you to provide official proof that you have fulfilled these conditions before you enrol, and we advise that you act as early as possible to avoid running short of time later in the summer. You also need to have met your conditions before you can apply for a student visa.

If you have received your results and find that they fall just short of meeting your offer condition, still send them to us, as they will be sent to your selector for a final decision.

Apply for the Graduate Support Scheme as soon as possible. The application process will close on **25th April 2024** (applications close at 5pm UK time).

News from around LSE

If your offer is conditional on obtaining a particular mark in your current degree studies, you need to provide formal evidence to prove that you have met the degree condition(s).

You can do this by sending us an official transcript or asking your university to send us a written statement. You can send this to Graduate Admissions via an electronic transcript transfer service, such as Digitary, Gradintelligence, eSCRIP-SAFE, Parchment, CHSI etc. or ask your previous institution to send via an institutional email account (for example results@youruniversity.ac.uk). The LSE email address to send your results to is graduate.documents@lse.ac.uk.

Check pages 30 to 35 of your <u>Offer pack</u> for full details on what is acceptable evidence.

English language conditions

If you are required to meet an IELTS (or equivalent) score as part of an English language condition, you should arrange to take the test as soon as possible. Once you have your results, <u>please</u> <u>submit them online</u>, including the ID number detailed on your results certificate, or ensure that you tell your provider to allow LSE access to your score. We also accept other tests to meet your <u>English language conditions</u>. Please take a look at our <u>English language entry requirements page</u> for more details.

Please remember that if you require a student visa to study at LSE, you will not be able to apply for this visa until:

- your offer is unconditional
- you have submitted your Financial Undertaking Form
- you have accepted your offer

We intend to begin issuing CAS statements from May, so it is in your best interests to send us your documents early to allow sufficient time to receive your CAS and for your local visa office to process your student visa.

Summer School conditions

If you have been set a summer school condition as part of your offer, you should apply to the Summer School via their <u>online</u> <u>form</u>. Results from Summer School are automatically sent to the Graduate Admissions team for your offer to be updated.

To request approval of an alternative programme to meet the summer school condition, please submit a request to waiver of a
