SUBMITTING REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

As an offer holder, you will be required to submit original or certified copies of your documents (unless you have already provided them). The earlier you can supply these, the better. Your application tracker shows which documents are currently outstanding. These must be submitted prior to your registration with us.

Sending documents digitally

Please remember that **scanned/electronic** copies of documents **submitted directly by you**, are not "original" or "official", except if submitting your GRE/GMAT scores via ETS or GMAC.

Transcripts sent via a secure verification portal such as <u>HEAR</u> or <u>Digitary</u>, to <u>graduate.references@lse.ac.uk</u> will be treated as original/official.

Scanned copies of documents sent directly to the above email **from your institution** will also be treated as original/official, if they have been sent by their central administration service and include the name and position of the relevant staff member.

If you have been asked to supply your transcript and proof of degree from studies undertaken at a Chinese university, you should do so via CHESICC.

Our <u>postal address</u> can be found on our website. We do not return documents. If you are unable to send the original document, please send a copy certified by your institution, British Council, or public

notary. If your documents are not in English, we will also need a translation bearing the stamp and seal of an official translator.

For official proof of qualifications, you may use the proof of degree form included in your <u>offer pack</u> (also available to <u>download online</u>), rather than sending the original, unless you have graduated from a Chinese university (see note on CHESICC above).

Providing documents in person

If you live locally, or are visiting London, you are welcome to come to the <u>Student Services Centre</u>, where your documents can be stamped and certified. To do so, please <u>check our opening hours</u> and ensure you bring the original documents AND photocopies of each page.

<u>Capitalism</u> Hosted by The Forum

For much of the early part of the twentieth century, political theorists debated the moral and economic merits of capitalism in competition with communism. With the collapse of the Soviet Union and its satellites, and the triumph of the market economy, those on the political left briefly flirted with the idea of market socialism. But critics of capitalism are running out of alternative ideas, to the point that a placard at an anti-capitalism march proclaimed 'Replace Capitalism with Something Nice!'. In this year's Ralph Oppenheimer Memorial Lecture Professor Jonathan Wolff will ask: Are we stuck with capitalism? How far can it be modified? How far should it be modified?

MODULE/COURSES NOT AVAILABLE IN 2017/8

Each year there are some courses that do not run due to being temporarily suspended or permanently withdrawn. In many cases this is due to the adjustment of teaching allocations so that other existing courses can be enhanced or new courses can be offered in light of developments in the discipline, path-breaking research, or on the basis of student feedback; these changes are intended to enhance the overall student learning experience. Other adjustments to the teaching portfolio may be required to accommodate sabbatical leave for academic staff, or due to unforeseen staff illness or resignation for example.
