



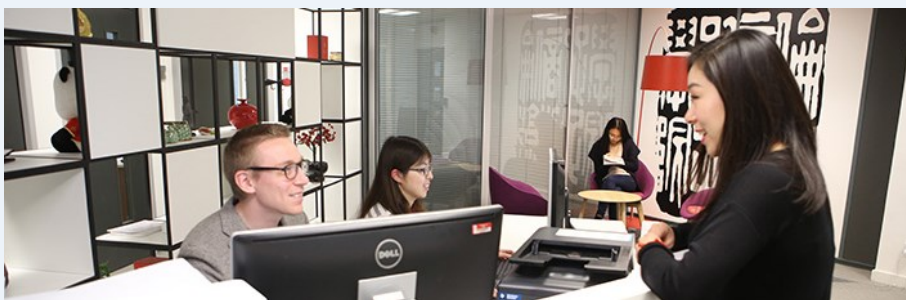
ISSUE 4: CAREERS

Once you have officially registered as a student and have been given your LSE IT Account username and password, you will be able to access the [LSE CareerHub](#) to book one-to-one appointments and events, and search for jobs and opportunities advertised exclusively to LSE students. You can also update your profile with your career preferences to receive relevant information and job vacancies.

The [Career Builder](#) tool is designed to help you navigate the career planning process and to find the most appropriate information and resources for your situation. You can also [book](#) one-to-one advice appointments with a careers consultant to help you decide which career path to take and for more specific guidance on preparing a job application.

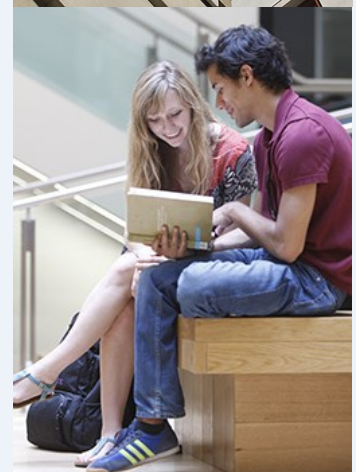
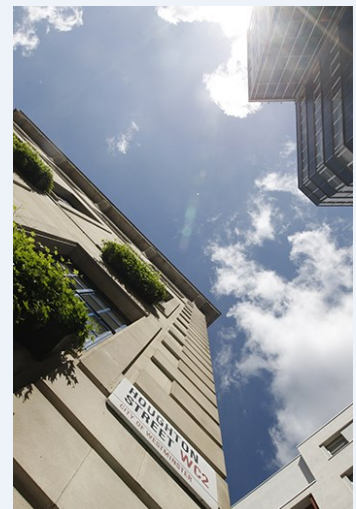

FINDING A JOB

LSE Careers work with thousands of employers to give you a huge range of career opportunities in the UK and internationally which are listed on the LSE CareerHub. They advertise full-time, part-time, graduate, internship, and experienced hire opportunities. The team also run sector-specific [careers fairs](#) and hundreds of employer networking events and presentations where you can talk to recruiters and company representatives.

If you want to start your own business, [LSE Generate](#) offers a skills development programme and networking events where you can market ideas, and identify key relationships within the immediate and wider entrepreneurial community.

APPLICATIONS AND INTERVIEWS

When you begin applying for jobs, the careers team can provide information on completing the application, give you an idea of what to expect at interviews and assessment centres, as well as how to approach psychometric tests. They also run mock assessment centres and have a team of career consultants who can check your CV, cover letters, and applications. GRADUATE DESTINATIONS

UPDATE: EU STUDENTS AND BREXIT



LSE is pleased to announce that the UK Government has confirmed EU students will remain eligible for undergraduate financial support if they are due to commence their studies in September 2018. This decision means that EU students starting their undergraduate studies in September 2018 will continue to have access to student loans and grants, even if the course concludes after the UK has left the EU.

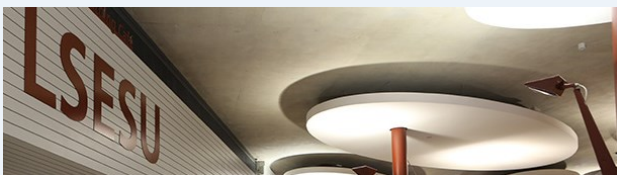
