Welcome to the first edition of LSE's Scholarships newsletter, which aims to provide an annual round up of the School's scholarship programme to the people whose support enables it to happen.

For many students, the letter that they receive from the School's Financial Support Office (FSO) informing them that they will receive a scholarship is the difference between them being able to accept their place to study at LSE or not. Thanks to your support, last year LSE was able to award philanthropically-funded scholarships to 270 talented and deserving students, and is set to award a similar number in the coming academic year.

Since the end of the Summer Term, FSO and the School's Scholarships Awards Panels have been working hard to allocate scholarship awards to the best possible candidates. In addition to around 250 philanthropically-funded scholarships for new and continuing students, FSO are also responsible for awarding around £10 million of scholarships and awards that are funded by other sources. As we write, the FSO has managed to identify deserving students for all but a handful of the available awards and the School keenly awaits the arrival of all of these new and continuing scholars in October.

There are occasionally circumstances, most often outside of the School's or the scholar's control, that can prevent a student arriving at the School to commence their studies. The new UK Border Agency visa restrictions introduced at the beginning of the 2009-10 academic year was a factor for some students experiencing problems last year, unexpected illness or other personal reasons can also be reasons for this happening. That said, once a scholarship award has been confirmed, the vast majority of students register and commence their studies at the School without any problem, and we expect this to be the case in the coming academic year.

In the autumn new and continuing scholars will write to the donors of their scholarships to introduce or reacquire themselves, and the Donors and Scholars event later in the academic year provides an opportunity for donors and scholars to meet face-to-face. The School would also be happy to facilitate other opportunities for contact and meetings for individuals as the academic year progresses.

Through your support of the School's scholarship programme, you have presented talented and deserving students with the gift of an LSE education. Thank you for your life-changing generosity.

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A scholarly view

Allen Azemia was working as a software architect in the Seychelles when he became aware of LSE's Jones Markham Seychelles Scholarship. The year before he had been forced to turn down the opportunity to undertake his final honours at Edith Cowan University in Perth because he didn't have the financial means to support himself through an extra year of study.

After successfully applying for the scholarship, Allen arrived at the School in September 2009 to begin his MSc in Analysis, Design and Management of Information Systems (ADMIS) programme.

Here he describes his LSE experience. 'I thought the ADMIS MSc would be a really good opportunity to learn about the management of information systems. My experience of the programme has been really good because I arrived at LSE with a purely technological outlook and I have

subsequently learnt that you need to understand the social environment and the management issues before you can really implement the technology in an organisation. It has transformed my mindset.

The course has provoked an interest in mobile healthcare, and the role of technology in improving the provision of healthcare. This is the direction that I want to go in when I finish my studies. A lot of people in the Seychelles live in the mountains so having a good mobile infrastructure would enable doctors to help people remotely, particularly elderly patients who normally need to be visited at home but who are difficult to get to.

I have met one of the donors of my scholarship, Peter Jones, and his wife Liz a few times. As an LSE alumnus himself, Peter explained how the School works and helped me to blend in. They made me and my wife feel really welcome.

Overall the scholarship has given me an opportunity to learn more, to study at a really good university and to develop a new perspective and a different mindset. As a scholarship recipient myself I know that there are a lot of people out there who are bright and would really benefit from a chance to study at LSE so I think that scholarships and other ways of providing support, such as the Annual Fund, are an extremely positive thing.'
