What is economic history?

- Distinct discipline from economics and history.
- Own methodological approaches.
- Study the success and failure of economic actors in the past, both large-scale macro-level units such as national economies and large enterprises, as well as households and individuals at the micro-level.
- Collect and analyse quantitative and qualitative primary source evidence.

The PhD

3-4 years long

First year engage with specific courses:

General: methodology, ethics, academic research

Courses relevant to your own research

Second year, and subsequent

Assessment

First year review – specific research question
Outline of research and a literature review
Main review (GRC) – end of second year
one core chapter with original contribution
Final year – viva with examiners, job market
3 Paper for Quantitative method, or a monograph
manuscript for qualitative methods (100,000 words)

- Previous education and employment
- Personal statement motivation for undertaking PhD
- Research statement discuss with prospective supervisor if possible
- Example of previous written work
- References (academic work)

Research proposal

- Defines clear question and approach to answering it
- Highlights originality and / or significance
- Explains how it adds to existing literature in the field
- Persuades others of importance of work and why you are the right person to do this research

3-4 pages in length

Process

Application considered by Department committee
Those considering for offers interviewed:
 research proposal, resources needed, further training
Offers of place made
Offers of funding made

Deadlines

Funding deadline for first round of PhD studentships and ESRC funding for 2023 entry:

13 January 2023

Second round of PhD admissions (few studentships available in this second round):

27 April 2023
