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Welcome...

Welcome to the first newsletter of the Hellenic Observatory. We aim to keep our friends, associates and contacts informed of our activities concerning Greece and Cyprus.

The Hellenic Observatory is in a unique position and we are keen to realise its full potential. The establishment of the Eleftherios Venizelos Chair on Contemporary Greek Studies in 1996 represented a major ini-

tiative in the academic field. It was the first chair of its kind outside Greece and one funded by a generous endowment of major Greek banks, firms and public institutions. The first holder was Professor Loukas Tsoukalis of the University of Athens (1998-2001). I took up the post of Director just last year (May 2002) and together with my colleagues we have endeavoured to raise its profile and to expand its range of activities. This newsletter is one means of letting you know what we're up to.

We've achieved quite a lot in the recent re-launch. We estimate that some 1,400 guests have attended our public events. We have created three new academic posts and a new PhD scholarship. In June this year we held a new PhD Symposium that attracted some 120 participants. Our teaching has expanded, whilst high quality research has been pursued.

We have an exciting programme of activities planned for 2003-4, able to appeal to a broad spectrum of academics and the public. These include a retrospective on the Greek EU Presidency, a commemoration of the Lambrakis affair, and a conference on pension reform. The Future of European Security After Iraq

A major event was held on March 4 2003, with over 700 guests coming to the Peacock Theatre to hear a debate on the future of the European Union's security policy after the Iraqi war. The topicality of the issue was high, given that war with Iraq was imminent. Yannos Papantoniou, Minister of National Defence in Athens and representative of the Greek EU Presidency, led a series of talks in which he was joined by NATO's Deputy Secretary General, Alessandro Minuto Rizzo, and leading UK defence analyst, Paul Beaver. The text of Mr. Papantoniou's presentation has been placed on the Hellenic Observatory's webpages.

Later the same day, a panel of distinguished experts offered their views on how to develop the European Security and Defence Policy (ESDP). The panel comprised: Prof. Sir Lawrence Freedman (Department of War Studies, King's College London); Prof. Paul Taylor (LSE); Roger Boyes (The Times); and, Quentin Peel (The Financial Times). The panel was chaired by Prof. Arghyrios Fatouros (University of Athens). Some 120 guests participated in the high quality discussion.

Both events marked a new joint initiative by the Institute for Defence Analysis (IAA, Athens) and the Hellenic Observatory. Future collaboration is expected to develop the focus on Greece and regional security.

Greece in the Euro-Zone

The Fifth Annual Lecture of the Hellenic Observatory was given by Professor George Alogoskoufis on June 2, 2003. The title of his lecture was 'Surviving EMU: prospects for the Greek economy', the full text of which can be found on our website.

Prof. Alogoskoufis is himself an alumnus of the LSE, having obtained an MSc and a PhD in economics from the School. He subsequently became a Fellow of the Centre for Economic Policy Research (CEPR) and Reader in Economics at Birkbeck College. Prof. Alogoskoufis has written widely on macro-economics, and monetary policy in particular. He is now Professor of Economics at the University of Athens.

Prof. Alogoskoufis spoke, not only as a major academic authority, but also as the chief economic policy spokesman of Nea Dimokratia, the main opposition party in Greece. A well-informed discussion was followed by an official dinner.

Topical Seminars

This last academic year the Hellenic Observatory held 15 weekly seminars. The seminars were normally held on Tuesday evenings in J116, Cowdray House. They proved very popular with average audiences of around 25-30, including many guests from outside the School.



A MAJOR NEW FORUM FOR RESEARCH STUDENTS

This year saw the launch of a new series of events for PhD students researching on modern Greece. The Observatory initiated 'The 1st LSE Symposium on Modern Greece', which was held at the

School on June 21, 2003. Financial support was provided by the European Commission.

The purpose was to bring together PhD students in the social sciences who are working on Greece or Cyprus. The Symposium was designed to provide a platform for them to present part of their research and to hear senior academics in their field talk of future research challenges.

In the event, some 120 visitors attended the Symposium. Most were current PhD students in the UK and students from various other countries joined them. The plenary sessions were chaired by Prof. Michalis Tsinisizelis (University of Athens) and Prof. Costas Douzinas (Birkbeck). Prof. Kevin Featherstone gave the welcoming address and made the closing remarks.

Both the plenary and the panel discussions proved to be well-focussed and informed. 'Frankly, the feedback from the event has been overwhelming', said the Observatory's Director, Kevin Featherstone. 'Both the research students and the academics were very positive of the value of this venture and many are very keen that we repeat it in the future', he added.

The Hellenic Observatory Expands

One of the top priorities of Professor Kevin Featherstone as he took up the post of Director of the Hellenic Observatory in May 2002 has been to expand its staff numbers and resources. "The Observatory can do so much more with a little extra investment" has been his mantra. "We are uniquely placed to promote public debate, produce high quality independent research, and to train some of tomorrow's leaders", he continued.

One of the first appointments to be made was Dr Dimitris Papadimitriou as Research Fellow working on Greece and EMU. Dr Papadimitriou commented "I have spent twelve wonderful months here at the Observatory. Kevin has introduced a terrific work ethic into the place which combines both an extremely friendly atmosphere and a vigorous academic environment. For all those interested in the study of contemporary Greece, this is *the* place to be".

Professor Featherstone's new drive has attracted increasing confidence and support. The Observatory's own Advisory Board created a new post of 'Research Fellow', which allows senior academics from outside the UK to come to the Observatory and focus on major research projects. Working at the LSE and using its unrivalled Library has proved very worthwhile to the two appointees to date, Dr Peter Bratsis of the City University of New York and Dr Dimitri A. Sotiropoulos of the University of Athens. Dr Sotiropoulos commented 'at the Hellenic Observatory I have found infrastructural support, professional criticism of my work and a very collegial atmosphere'.

Furthermore, the Institute for Defence Analysis (IAA) in Athens has joined with the Observatory to create a new post of Research Fellow on Greece and European Security. This will be an annual appointment, open to all ranks. The first appointee, Dr. Louis Klarevas, arrived in January 2003 to work on European responses to global security challenges under the Greek EU Presidency.

He commented that, "LSE is an idea factory. I have never been more stimulated to conduct research as I have been during my tenure at the Hellenic Observatory.

Without a doubt my fellowship at the Hellenic Observatory has been my most rewarding professional experience to date."

In 2003-4, the fellowship will be held by Dr. Dimitris Triantaphyllou, formerly Senior Research Fellow at the European Union Institute for Security Studies in Paris.

In 2004, it is expected that the Observatory will be able to create a further post: Lecturer in the Political Economy of Greece and South-East Europe. The funding for this post will be drawn from a consortium of public and private sector enterprises in Greece, across different economic sectors. The purpose of the post is to allow the Observatory to better reflect the changing economic position of Greece within the region, both in its teaching and in its research. A continuing dialogue is to be maintained between the Observatory and the new donors.

"It has been a major effort for us, but we're making very good progress", comments Prof. Featherstone. "I have been very fortunate in having the backing of the School – from Tony Giddens downwards – to realise these plans. The Development Office has put in an enormous amount of time on our behalf".
