

Master's programmes summary of actions taken to address matters raised at SSLC meetings

Term	Matter raised	Action
Winter Term 2024-25	1) Marking criteria seems inconsistent across courses when it comes to use of historiography 2) Students would like to see more recent alumni from different countries/job sectors invited to the department's careers events 3) There was a suggestion of organising careers events that would cater to the sectors that are not as represented in the rest of the LSE careers offerings (e.g. journalism, museums, PhD) 4) The School's library access to resources related to Chinese studies is very limited 5) Students reported issues with broken/incorrect links on Moodle reading lists	1) Historiography is important, but some teachers rank it more highly than others in terms of the overall approach of how you go about writing an essay. As a rule, you need to situate your work in relation to the work of other historians, but just how detailed and specific that situation of your work needs to be is subject to some diversity of view between different teachers. 2) The department's pool of potential alumni is quite limited when it comes to careers events as not everyone would be prepared/available to travel to London. There are also cost considerations. The department will explore an opportunity of organising online careers events that would help to engage a wider range of our alumni. 3) The department will consider this suggestion and try to have a specific focus on the kinds of careers our graduates have headed off to do, which are still quite diverse. 4) The department acknowledges that there are some limitations when it comes to resources the library holds or subscribes to. The department will relay this to our library representative, Dr Paul Horsler, who may be able to make a case for getting access to

		more resources. 5) Teachers are responsible for ensuring all reading list links are correct for their course on Moodle. Students should alert their teacher about any issues with the reading lists so that s/he could rectify any errors.
Autumn Term 2024-25	1) There are no courses tailored to specific programmes 2) Disappointment that some courses are not available (i.e. HY459 and HY491) and there are no alternatives offered/available. 3) Frustration about the limit of four units that can be selected on LSE For You 4) Lack of clarity on admission criteria to courses 5) Lack of guidance in class on how to write an essay 6) HY400 reading list is very long and there is too little time to prepare for seminars 7) It is not clear how much IR theory students can use in HY498 dissertation 8) Issues with accessing certain resources, some of which are for purchase only (e.g. Oxford Encyclopaedia) 9) Students would like to see core readings being available digitally 10) Students asked if it would be possible to have a microwave and a kettle in the Common Room	1) The department tried a core course on the MSc Empires programme before, but it did not work very well. It was very difficult to design a course that would encompass all students' interests. 2) The department has a limited budget and replacement teachers are not always easy to find when members of permanent staff go on sabbatical leave/research leave. Course availability also depends on student demand and numbers. 3) The limit is set by the School according to the specific programme regulations. Removing restrictions would mean that students could select lots of different courses and thereby prevent other students from being able to select these courses. 4) Teachers have their own preferences and rationale behind using first come, first serve approach or personal statements. List of capped courses and admission criteria are available on the course selection pages. Different departments run their selection process differently and there is not

		much the department can do about it. 5) There is generic guidance available on each Moodle page and students should use formative essays as a test run or practice for which they will receive feedback. Students should then use this feedback to do better in the summative assessment. 6) It is specified on the reading list which readings are essential and which ones are optional. Students are not expected to read everything. Some teachers prefer to let students choose what to read. Students are welcome to ask teachers for advice on how to approach/manage a specific book/reading. 7) HY498 dissertation should be a case study in history, but students can use elements of IR theory and ideas. Students can use IR theory in their introduction, but dissertation needs to be based on empirical research. 8) If the issue is course-specific, students should get in touch with the teacher responsible for the course in question. If the issue is programme-specific, students should contact their Programme Director or Master's Tutor. Students can use <i>Get It For Me</i> service to access material not currently available at LSE Library. 9) Lack of digitised readings is mainly because some books went out of print, are difficult to find or there are copyright issues (only 10% of each
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		book can be photocopied/digitised). There are limitations on what is possible in terms of digitisation, but the department will continue to try adding more digital resources. 10) The department trialled this in the past (students were given a microwave and a kettle), however it soon became a problem as cleanliness standards were not maintained and there was no practical way of monitoring an appropriate use of equipment.
Winter term 2023-24	1) Not all mentors are equally invested in their mentees (some are not approachable/do not respond to e-mails) 2) Double degree students were not sure when their final results would be released and graduation ceremony would take place – they would like this information to be available on the programme pages before they apply. 3) Lack of clarity and communications regarding e-exams. 4) Interest in research travel grants. 5) Interest in weekly departmental newsletter.	1) All academic mentors in the department are required to e-mail their mentees at the start of academic year to introduce themselves and invite their mentees to the first meeting. There is a set minimum of what is expected of academic mentors but there is no maximum hence a perceived variation in students' experiences. Students are encouraged to reach out to their mentors if they need help/guidance. 2) LSE-CU final results are released in mid-July and graduation ceremony takes place shortly after. LSE-PKU and LSE-NUS final results are released in mid-November and graduation ceremony takes place in mid-December. The department will investigate whether it is possible to add this information to the programme pages for 2025 intake. 3) All HY Spring Term exams will be e-exam enabled. TRCs whose courses have an exam element will inform the students

		that this is the case. MSc Programmes Administrator will send full details on practicalities (including drop-in session dates) to all students in the beginning of March. 4) Currently the department offers 10 travel bursaries sponsored by the department's donor Richard Straus. The department is trying to attract additional funding to offer more opportunities to its students. 5) The department produces a monthly newsletter which covers department's activities, news and events as well as programme-related information. At the moment there is no capacity to produce a weekly newsletter, however if there is anything students would like to pass onto their peers (e.g. an event, competition etc.) in between the newsletters, they are welcome to e-mail the details to Max Smith (ih.events@lse.ac.uk) or Milada Fomina (ih.pgadmin@lse.ac.uk) who will be happy to circulate department-wide.
Autum term 2023-24	1) Students would like to have more lectures alongside seminars 2) Stress over finding dissertation supervisor and lack of guidance 3) Lack of focus in terms of course choices on MSc History of International Relations programme	1) At postgraduate level, it is generally expected that students take more responsibility for their learning of the material therefore teaching is delivered in a seminar form. 2) Students are advised in the beginning of academic year to start thinking about their dissertation topic and approach the relevant faculty members as early as possible in the Autumn Term. This is also discussed during the dissertation workshops and clearly stipulated in the

		dissertation regulations published on Moodle and in the MSc Student Handbook. Faculty members are very flexible, in general, and their expertise is clearly displayed on the department's website. If you are truly set on a certain member of staff, then you should contact them earlier in the year/before you arrive as all their contact details are available online. 3) This programme is for students who want broader options as students had complained about the lack of choice in the past.
Lent term 2022-23	1) Uncertainty about feedback return timeline; students have not received feedback for assessed coursework on HY4B6, HY486 and HY489 2) Not all courses with assessed presentation element have assessment criteria posted on Moodle 3) Need for more careers events targeted at history students in the Michaelmas Term 4) Query about travel bursaries for Master's dissertations 5) Lack of communication from the department regarding strike action	1) Feedback on assessed coursework is returned within 5 term weeks of the submission deadline as stipulated in the LSE Academic Code. Teachers responsible for HY4B6, HY486 and HY489 were contacted and reminded to return feedback to students. Students received feedback within two days of the SSLC meeting. 2) All TRCs whose courses have an assessed presentation element were e-mailed and asked to post assessment criteria on Moodle. 3) This was relayed to Dr Edlira Gjonca who is responsible for the alumni relations and careers programme in the department. 4) 10 Richard Straus Travel Bursaries for up to £400 each will be made available to all Master's students. Application details will be sent by e-mail in the next couple of weeks.

		5) Faculty members are not obliged to inform the department on whether they intend to strike or not. All faculty members have been advised to communicate with their students regarding strike action and their plans.
Michaelmas term 2022-23	1) LSE-CU and LSE-PKU students experienced delays in obtaining visas due to delays in receiving acceptance letters from LSE 2) Lack of Middle Eastern, Asian, African and Caribbean history courses	1) There is not much the department can do as these letters are issued by the Graduate Admissions Office. 2) The department offers courses covering these subject areas but due to sabbatical leave arrangements and Teaching Fellow's visa issues the department has had to suspend some of them.
Michaelmas term 2021-22	1) Earlier and longer course selection period would be preferred 2) Need for Social Representatives for each programme 3) Request to provide feedback on assessed coursework online (Moodle)	1) This will delay courses/teaching starting in earnest as the introductory sessions do not contain any substantive teaching material. If earlier course choices were available, many students would not know what/how to select courses as this information is only available during induction. 2) This will be arranged by the Student Experience and Events Co-ordinator. 3) Online feedback to be released on Moodle once assessed coursework has been marked and moderated.
Summer term 2020-21	1) Need for more Asia-focused courses 2) Assessed essay submission deadlines are too close to each other/overlap 3) LSE-CU students would prefer if HY458 deadline was later in the year, e.g. September	1) The Department will be introducing two new Asia-focused courses in 2021-22. 2) Setting deadlines is a complicated process as the department has tight timelines for marking and sending marks

		to external examiners for review. 3) Setting deadline later in the year could be problematic for U.S students as they would not graduate until November. This could cause visa and work placement issues.
Lent term 2020-21	1) Possibility of accessing exam feedback 2) Expectations for dissertations, particularly in terms of primary sources and how (un)availability of sources will affect marking 3) Difficulties keeping track of events, assessment info etc.	1) The department only provides feedback on assessed essays and dissertations, but not on examinations. Dissertation feedback is available on request from dissertation supervisors. 2) HY498/499 workshops have been brought forward to help students to start thinking about their dissertations earlier in the Michaelmas Term. Students have been already warned about not relying on the possibility of visiting archives and working on the assumption that they will not re-open. TRC for HY498/499 to remind all Master's students that they should focus on digital sources. 3) A lot of events at LSE are recorded and, if students miss any, they can watch/listen to recordings. Assessment information is normally sent via e-mail and is also available on the course Moodle pages. Students are encouraged to use the department's social media handles for keeping up-to-date with the department's events.

Students are encouraged to share books and collaborate with each other. 3) The department has looked into the matter several times and concluded that financially it is not feasible to offer printing allowance to all students. Department will look into a possibility of on-demand requests for printing allowance, although there will be administrative burden involved. For environmental reasons the department also does not allow staff to print much anymore as the department is trying to cut down on the printing generally. 4) The School is aware of the issue and has put more money into the service, however the demand is still outstripping supply. Students are encouraged to seek help elsewhere by using peer to peer support, various hotlines and text-based counselling services all of which are free. Links to such services to be sent to all Master's students. 5) Dr Ron Po (LSE-PKU Programme Director) to relay LSE-PKU students' feedback on course selection to IR department and remind IR colleagues to treat IH students equally. 6) The department has discussed dissertation deadlines for all programmes and decided that a deadline extension will not benefit students as it will fall within exam period and make it more stressful for students. The current deadline was chosen to
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		prevent accumulation of deadlines for students in May. 7) In order to use students' essays the department would need to ask for their permission first. In addition, the department does not want to hand out past essays as students might regard them as something to be adhered to in a very rigid manner, whereas in reality there are many other ways to get a Distinction/Merit.

Lent term 2018-19	1) Lack of access to common room in Sardinia House 2) Status of formative essays on 100% exam courses: compulsory or optional? 3) Possibility of including a session on historiography as part of HY400	1) School's longstanding policy had been not to provide departments with study/common room space for Masters students, however this will be changing from 2019/20. In the meantime, the department can offer the use of the space on the mezzanine floor of Sardinia House, and the SAR 2.09 meeting room, which has limited spaces. 2) There are no formal punitive measures if students do not submit their formative essays, but there can be consequences. Staff may be unable to/refuse to provide references if a student's on-course record is poor, which can impact their employment prospects. Formative essay marks can be used in considering exceptional circumstances cases, which are unpredictable and can befall any student. 3) This will be discussed with the Teacher Responsible for HY400 in 2019-20.
Michaelmas term 2018-19	1) Limited choice of half-unit courses due to requirement to take them in complementary terms 2) Lack of communication from the department regarding Year 2 of LSE-PKU degree 3) Introduction to historiography would be desirable for students without background in history	1) Students were told that they can ask for a suspension of regulations if they have a good reason to take half-unit courses in the same term. Students are also encouraged to take half-unit courses in different departments which would allow for more choice and make complementary term rule easier to adhere to. 2) Dr Ronald Po (LSE-PKU Programme

		Director) will be visiting Peking University in December 2018 and will make an introduction about Year 2 for next year's cohort of LSE-PKU students. 3) Students will receive podcast links to HY119 (UG course on history skills). In addition, formative essays are a good way of practicing writing history essays. Students are also encouraged to meet with their class teachers to discuss essays before they start writing them.
