WELCOME

I would like to introduce myself as the Director of the LSE Middle East Centre. I started my tenure in September 2025, at the tail end of the year covered in the present report. I am an associate professor in International Relations at LSE with a focus, since the start of my career, on Middle Eastern international politics. My research in the last ten years has centred on Islamic international thought in Turkey and I am finalising a monograph for Cambridge University Press on the subject.

My association with the Middle East Centre dates back to its beginnings through my relationship with my mentor and friend Fred Halliday, who was the driving force behind the start of the campaign for its establishment. Since then, I have followed the work of the Centre and contributed to it in various tangible ways. It was an honour to be asked to serve as Director in place of Professor Michael Mason, whose term was coming to an end. I am grateful for Michael's successful stewardship of the Centre and for his support and guidance in the hand-over period. I am looking forward to working with the excellent staff that has made the Centre what it is over the years.

The annual report before you speaks for itself in presenting the many activities and achievements of the Middle East Centre. It covers a longer time period than usual because it has shifted from an academic to a calendar year format: it therefore includes autumn 2024 as well as 2025 in its totality. But it is quality rather than volume that matters most when it comes to research. We very much hope you will be tempted, through this report, to delve into our publications and past events, many of which are also available as podcasts. The report also proudly presents the Centre's other activities and a list of the many individuals associated with it in various roles, which make it the vibrant intellectual hub that it is.

My own goal and ambition for the Centre is to build on what has been achieved thus far and take it further. We are inaugurating an ambitious new project on secularity in the Middle East. It is envisaged as a multi-pronged, five-year project, involving multiple researchers and outputs, some

academic and others more policy-oriented or for a broader audience. The aim of the project will be to investigate secularity in the twin sense of secularisation as a sociological process and secularism as policy. It will cover the areas of law and constitutional arrangements; government policy; foreign policy; religiosity; popular preferences; and state institution building. We will study the entire region, beyond its Arab core, including North Africa, Iran, Turkey and Israel. Secularity and secularism are closely linked with democracy and good governance in the Middle East and the project will therefore align with one of the LSE's five world challenges for the social sciences: popular government.

Flawed humans tend to exaggerate the importance of the moment in history in which they find themselves but the past year was, in actual fact, a major turning point for the Middle East. In terms of geopolitics, foreign policy and the balance of power in the region, the events of 7 October 2023 and the Gaza War that followed constitute a milestone unprecedented in many decades. More widely, the political economy of the region is being revolutionised by new technologies and processes. The Centre seeks to set the tone in interpreting this new phase and capturing its core characteristics and elements.

Established in 2007, the Kuwait Programme is a world-leading hub for research and expertise on Kuwait. The Programme is funded by the Kuwait Foundation for the Advancement of Sciences and headed by Professor Alistair McGuire, Kuwait Chair. LSE–Kuwait Fellowships allow Kuwait-based researchers to visit LSE and conduct research related to the Programme’s thematic research interests. LSE–Kuwait Academic Collaboration projects enable Kuwait and LSE academics to run collaborative research.



Social Media and Food-Consumption in Contemporary Kuwait: Implications for Public Health Policies

Aims to address the knowledge gap concerning the influence of social media on food-consumption behaviours in Kuwait by consolidating existing data on food consumption and disordered eating behaviours in Kuwait, developing a comprehensive data collection instrument tailored to this context, and generating new survey data, including survey experiments, to build evidence-based insights that can inform public health policies and awareness campaigns.

determine which approach provides more precise, region-specific predictions. In doing so, this demonstrates the need for improved datasets for long-term forecasting, enabling a better understanding of the complex spatial-temporal patterns of air pollution.




ARABIC PUBLICATIONS

KURDISH STUDIES CONFERENCE 2025

Our third Kurdish Studies Conference in June 2025, hosted again at LSE, built on its successful predecessor at the University of Sheffield in 2024. It was organised by the Kurdish Studies Series at the LSE Middle East Centre and the Department of Politics and International Relations at the University of Sheffield. This year, this interdisciplinary event was pleased to host Professor Hamit Bozarslan as keynote speaker.




