- You'll examine issues such as levels of social security benefits and their eligibility conditions, the nature of private-public partnerships in health service provision, or the effectiveness of different schooling systems in reducing educational inequalities.
- You can also choose to take a specialism in Development, which focuses on middle and low-income countries and the way in which social and public policy are discussed, produced and implemented to deal with inequalities and to increase wellbeing.
