



WHY DOES IT MATTER?

People care about fairness - but what feels fair can vary a lot. Many support reducing inequality and reject unfair privilege. But often they don't see the true scale and the sources of inequality.

The disconnect between concern about inequality and support for redistribution can be rooted in other things: trust in government, thoughts on social mobility, whether inequality is seen as fair. These beliefs shape how people vote and the policies they support.

Investigating these perceptions provides insights that can shape effective communication, engagement, and policymaking to truly address inequality.
