RECYCLING/REUSING



Did you know you can recycle **batteries** in the 32LIF Reception?

There are also plenty of other places in the campus. Find out more <u>here</u>.

Why recycle batteries?

They contain dangers chemicals that when leak into the ground in landfill sites, they cause soil and water pollution.

When recycling them, the materials of each battery will be used to make something new.



Unused or 'boring' **stationery** can be recycled=reused by placing it in the allocated box in the post room.

There is also another box in the post room if you would like to donate your **plastic bags** for reuse. If you prefer to keep them because you will reuse them, have a look here at how to <u>fold</u> them into tiny triangles and save up space!
