

EU in Practice: Politics and Power in the Brussels System

In this innovative seminar series, now in its tenth year, policy practitioners talk about their experience of working with and within EU institutions.

The series is organised and co-chaired by Visiting Professors in Practice <u>Anthony Teasdale</u>, Director General, European Parliamentary Research Service, and <u>Dr Martin Westlake</u>, former Secretary General, European Economic and Social Committee. A typical line-up of speakers will include former ministers and Commissioners, ambassadors and permanent representatives, Secretaries-General and Directors-General, journalists, commentators and experts.

The seminar is held on Friday afternoons. These seminars offer you an excellent opportunity to gain insights from insiders of various sorts as to how politics and power really work within the EU system, as well as to meet and enter into exchanges with the guest speakers.

This autumn's 'EU in Practice' seminar series starts off with **Emily O'Reilly**, the European Union's Ombudsman since 2013, talking about the concept and practice of good administration in the EU context and ends with **Robert Zoellik**, former President of the World Bank and former US Trade Representative, talking about lessons from the past for today's Transatlantic relationship. In between, six further seminars will include: former European Commission Director General **Sir Jonathan Faull** on the impact of Brexit on the EU's financial services, **Susan Danger**, Managing Director of the American Chamber of Commerce in Brussels, and **Catherine Stewart**, President of the European Government Relations Roundtable, on representing a third country in Brussels; former Financial Times Berlin bureau chief **Quentin Peel** on the ramifications for the EU of the September 2021 Bundestag elections; and political philosopher **Luuk van Middelaar** on what the Covid 16 pandemic has revealed about the European Union.
