PROGRAMME DIRECTOR

Professor Chris Alden teaches International Relations at the London School of Economics and Political Science and is a Senior Research Associate at the South African Institute of International Affairs (SAIIA).



Professor Christopher Coker is

Director of LSE IDEAS and Professor of International Relations. He is a former twice serving member of the Council of the Royal United Services Institute, a former NATO Fellow and a regular lecturer at Defence Colleges in the UK, US, Rome, Singapore and Tokyo.



Dr Nikhil Kalyanpur is an Assistant Professor at LSE's International Relations department. He researches topics at the intersection of business-government relations, global governance, and economic statecraft.



Professor Michael Cox is Emeritus Professor of International Relations and Senior Academic Programme Advisor for the Executive MSc International Strategy and Diplomacy programme. He is a renowned international lecturer who has published extensively on the United States, transatlantic relations, Asia's rise, and the problems facing the EU.



Professor Robert Falkner is Associate Professor of International Relations at LSE and the Research Director of the Grantham Research Institute on Climate Change and the Environment.



Professor Tomila Lankina

is Professor of International Relations at LSE. Her expertise is on democratization, subnational governance, Russia, Central Europe, Eurasia, India, and legacies of colonialism.



Professor Karen E. Smith

is Professor of International Relations at the LSE. Her area of expertise includes foreign policy analysis, international organisations (particularly the EU and the UN), and human rights policies.



Professor Linda Yueh is Visiting Professor at LSE IDEAS, Fellow in Economics at St Edmund Hall, Oxford University, and Adjunct Professor of Economics at London Business School.

The Practitioners

The team of practitioners is formed by experienced strategists, diplomats and civil servants. Their strategic and diplomatic experience ranges from the Foreign Office and Number 10 to NATO and the EU, GCHQ and the UK National Security Council, and international business and finance. Through sharing their invaluable first-hand experience, they enable participants to develop a practical approach to the issues covered by the programme.



HEAD OF PRACTITIONERS

Hugh Sandeman leads the team of practitioners. He is a Visiting Senior Fellow at LSE IDEAS and Project Head of Global Strategies. He was an international banker for 30 years, based in New York, Tokyo, London and Frankfurt, and for the past decade has focused on India. He was previously Tokyo correspondent, international business editor and New York correspondent of The Economist.



Sir Robert Cooper is a British diplomat and adviser. He was Head of the Policy Planning Staff at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and UK's Special Representative in Afghanistan, before taking up a post in the European Union in 2002.



Dame Judith MacGregor was

the British High Commissioner to South Africa from September 2013 until March 2017. She was FCO Director for Migration in 2007, Ambassador to Mexico in 2009, and President of the FCO Women's Association from 2006, overseeing a significant increase in the number of women who became senior British diplomats.



Baroness Ashton of Upholland

Catherine Margaret Ashton is a British Labour politician and former Leader of the House of Lords. In 2009, she became the European Union's first High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy and won praise for her work as a negotiator.



John Everard was the British Ambassador to Belarus, Uruguay and North Korea. Subsequently, John held the Pantech Fellowship at Stanford University. He was for some 18 months the Co-ordinator of the UN Security Council's Panel of Experts on sanctions on North Korea established by United Nations Security Council Resolution 1874 in March 2011.



Sir Richard Mottram is an expert on defence, security, strategy and planning. He was one of Britain's top civil servants, heading several departments, including the Ministry of Defence, and Security and Intelligence in the Cabinet Office. His current roles include Chairman of the Defence Science and Technology Laboratory.



Sir Emyr Jones Parry

is a former Permanent Representative of the United Kingdom to the United Nations, former UK Permanent Representative on the North Atlantic Council. From 2015-2017, he was Chancellor of Aberystwyth University. In 2014, he was President, Learned Society of Wales.






Sir Malcolm Rifkind was a Conservative Member of Parliament from 1974-1997 and 2010-2015. Sir Malcolm has been a member of the British Cabinet as Secretary of State for Scotland and for Defence. He was Foreign Secretary from 1995-1997, and between 2010 and 2015, he was Chairman of Parliament's Intelligence and Security Committee.







Application Process and Fees

Programme Team

Entry requirements

The programme is designed for senior and mid-level diplomats, civil servants, military officials, international NGO employees as well as executives from international firms and corporations (finance, consultancy, manufacturing, technology). You will be required to have:

- A 2:1 degree or equivalent in any discipline (preferably in politics, history, international relations or a similar discipline)
- A minimum four years' professional experience

If English is not your first language, you should possess an English language qualification such as IELTS or TOEFL, awarded within the last two years. Minimum scores required are:

- IELTS-overall score of 7.0 (7.0 in reading and 6.5 in listening, writing, and speaking), or
- TOEFL—overall score of 100 (25 in reading, 24 in writing and 22 in listening and speaking).

Note: if English is the language of instruction of your previous degree, you may be exempt from this requirement.

How to apply

Candidates are considered on a rolling admissions basis, as early as November for the following September intake. However, we recommend applying as early as possible as there is high competition for places.

To be considered for this programme, you will need to apply using the online application form. You will be asked to write a personal statement, setting out why you are interested in the programme, highlighting your relevant experience and suitability for the programme and your future plans. In addition, you will need to attach your university degree certificates and transcripts, and two professional or academic references.
