Family, reproductive health and global violence: Demographic perspectives beyond the immediate consequences of human conflict

Chair: Nicola Shelton. Auditorium.

This plenary examines the status of demographic research on how armed conflict influences population processes, with particular attention to the indirect and long-term effects on family and reproductive dynamics. While this area of research has traditionally concentrated on immediate outcomes such as mortality and migration, conflict also produces enormous consequences for 'slower' demographic processes, including fertility, union formation, and intimate partner relations. Drawing on evidence from a variety of contexts, I show that exposure to conflict and violence does not produce uniform responses: fertility may rise, decline, or remain unchanged, while impacts on marriage and contraceptive practices often reflect the timing of exposure, local institutions, and the specific dynamics of violence. These findings underscore the value of a life-course perspective and the heterogeneity of mechanisms linking violence to reproductive health and family change. I conclude by advocating for a plural Demography of Conflicts and Violence that embraces complexity, prioritises ethics, and illuminates the less immediate yet profound consequences of violence for populations and individual well-being.
