

EU Kids Online III: A research project listening to the views of children



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The research is about...

how children use the internet and what they think about it.

How will we do this?

By having a group discussion and some interviews at your school.

Who are we?

EU Kids Online is an international network of researchers that includes 33 European countries. In the UK the research is carried out by our team from the London School of Economics



Questions you might want to ask:

What will the group discussion be like?

There will be around 5 people sitting around a table in a room in your school with Leslie Haddon. You will discuss the internet and how you use it. The discussion will last about 1.5 hours, with a short break in the middle. We will record the discussion.

What will the interview be like?

You will speak only with Leslie Haddon and discuss things about the internet in details. It will be similar to the group discussion, but only with one person. We will record the discussion.

What will you do with the tape?

We will listen to the tape from your discussions and those from other schools, and then we'll write a book or report about the experiences of young people with the internet.

Will my name be used?

No, we'll give you a different name in the book or the report, so we can describe what you think without anyone knowing it's you. We will also change the name of your school and anyone else you talk about, so that no-one reading the book or report knows who you really are.

Is it confidential?

Yes. You can tell anyone you like about the research, but we will treat what you say as confidential. That means we won't tell anybody else about what you said in the discussion.

Will I see the report you write?

It is a lot of work to write a report and it takes us a long time to finish it, but we will send a copy of the report to your school when it is finished.
