Call for Papers: Social movements: Shaping the Future in Diverse Societies

A research networking conference with Keynote speakers: Lesley Wood (York University) Doug McAdam (Stanford University)

Date: 27-28 April 2020

Conference theme

In the absence of institutional will and solutions to effectively address global collective action problems such as climate change and forced migration, how do activists shape the future of post-migrant, post-secular societies? What forms of social movements do we need to prevent environmental disasters or rebuild solidarity in the face of deepening polarization, and authoritarian tendencies worldwide? How do social movements create awareness for diversity and inequality, how do they influence and shape the future of our planet through collective action, protest, dialogue, or disruption? Inspired by these questions, the conference theme is the role of social movements in taking decisions, mobilizing protest, imagining (prefiguring) alternative futures, and thus preparing societies for radical social and demographic change in the context of continuing climate change and unpredictability. This workshop is the inaugural event for the newly established Copenhagen Center for Research on Social Movements and Political Mobilization at the University of Copenhagen. The workshop provides an opportunity for scholars to develop and discuss shared themes and questions with inputs from world-leading academics in the field.

Participants are encouraged to give papers on different themes including among others:

- Pro-democracy protests, climate activism and coalitions, comparison, Global North/South
- Citizenship, migrants' and refugees' struggles, solidarity, search and rescue, criminalization
- Culture, diversity and inequality, race/ethnicity, gender, intersectionality, social class
- Democracy in movements, prefigurative practices, disruption, political translation
- Populism, movement-parties, far-right wing extremist mobilization and nationalism
- Labor organizing, civic volunteering in the context of neoliberal states

- Social movements and time, memory and movements
- Digital media, visual communication, framing, storytelling, translation
- Learning, education and social change
