Jon Formella has arrived in Hanoi, Vietnam to continue the Blakemore Freeman Fellowship for Advanced Vietnamese Studies based at the Faculty of Vietnamese Studies and Language (VSL) at Vietnam National University, Hanoi. Funded through the Seattle-based Blakemore Foundation, Blakemore Freeman Fellowships fund an academic year of advanced language study abroad of Chinese, Japanese, Korean and selected Southeast Asian languages. Summer School in Venice calls for scholarship applications

The Department of Asian and North African Studies at Ca' Foscari University of Venice with the support of the Marco Polo Center for Global Europe-Asia Connections invites scholarship applications for a week-long Summer School on the theme of **Social Movements in Southeast Asia**.

The Summer School supports the professional development of **20 selected** MA and PhD students who wish to develop a research paper exploring contemporary Southeast Asian social movements through the lenses of **age/generation**, **gender**, and **religion**.

MA students and PhD students (humanities and social sciences) who are researching about social movements in the region are encouraged to apply. Southeast Asian candidates (all ASEAN countries except Singapore and Brunei) are eligible for scholarships that will cover round trip airfare and visa costs.

The event will be held in person in Venice from **September 18 to 24, 2022**.
