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The Programme

In keeping with LSE traditions, the MSc International Social and Public Policy will bring together academic rigour and in-depth understanding. The programme is designed to provide students with advanced postgraduate education in the theory and practice of social & public policy. The programme enables students to engage in new ways of thinking about how best to meet human needs and increase wellbeing. It equips students with core understanding of central issues of social & public policy development, of the inequalities in policy drivers and outcomes, and of the interrelationship between the state, market, family, NGOs / civil society and international organisations in provision, organisation and funding. It is underpinned by the LSE approach to social and public policy that is explicitly international, interdisciplinary and applied.



You will be joining a class of academically excellent students from across the globe and from a range of backgrounds. The diverse experience and international perspectives which your classmates will bring to the programme will enhance your learning both in and out of the classroom. Some will also bring fascinating insights from their employment experience in public, non-governmental, and private sector organisations.

Subject Specialisms

As a student on the Non-Governmental Organisations stream of the MSc, your core teaching will address a wide range of issues in international social and public policy, as well as providing you with a thorough understanding of the core concepts and debates within social & public policy and NGOs including the policy process, wellbeing, inequality, poverty and exclusion, global institutions and the aid system, sustainability and livelihoods, rights and citizenship. During the programme you will examine the roles and functions of NGOs including service delivery, advocacy, and relief; the organisational, communication, and management challenges facing NGOs; and the role of NGOs in the policy process and their relationship with multiple stakeholders. You will also be able to select from our wide range of optional courses which allow you to explore many other aspects of international social and public policy.
