Welcome from the Department of Statistics

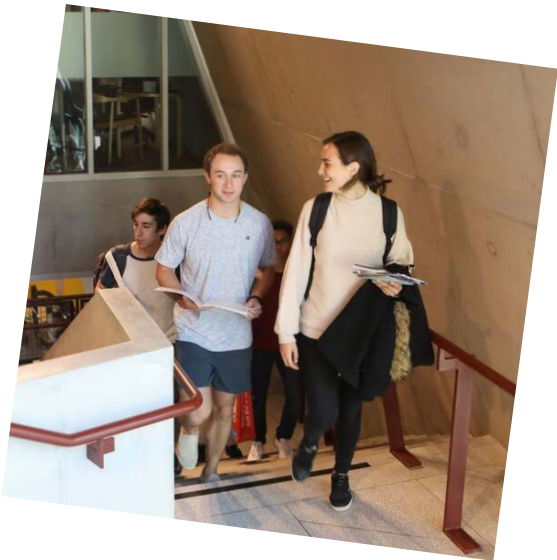
I would like to extend a warm welcome to all students joining the Department of Statistics to undertake undergraduate and postgraduate study.

Applications Day

On the first Saturday in October, we run sessions throughout the day to help you prepare for job applications. Topics usually include CVs, cover letters, application forms, LinkedIn, preparing for numeracy tests, and part-time work.

If you are applying to internship and graduate programmes in the banking and finance and consultancy industries, we advise you attend this event due to the rolling applications within those sectors. Employers with rolling applications suggest students apply early, as they review applications as and when they are submitted, instead of waiting for the deadline date.

Rolling deadlines and what they mean for you

Internship and graduate recruitment in the banking and finance and consulting industries often uses rolling deadlines. Employers give you a deadline date but check applications as they come in, inviting successful applicants through to the next stage immediately. Look up 'recruitment timelines' in the employment sectors you are interested in, on our website.

You should get your application in as soon as you can but don't rush it; make sure it's of a high standard to be in with a good chance of proceeding. If you book an appointment with LSE Careers, one of our careers consultants can also provide feedback on your CV, cover letter and application form.
