Sweta graduated from LSE with a BSc Management in 2023 and now works for GE Aerospace. She shared this about her experience at LSE:

***As well as careers appointments, I also took part in various other careers activities while at LSE, from working with the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund through LSE Volunteer Centre to getting a Virgin Experience flying lesson sponsored as a part of the Department of Management's Careers, Alumni and Employer Relations programme. I was able to work part-time, volunteer, lead societies and pursue an exchange year to HEC Paris with LSE Careers being the backbone of all my preparations."***

### Alumni spotlight: Jamie Wace, CEO and EdTech entrepreneur

Jamie graduated with an MSc China in Comparative Perspective, and went on to work in consultancy, as well founding EdTech start-up Talamo, inspired by his own experience with dyslexia. This is how he described his experience with LSE Careers, particularly working with one of LSE's disability career consultants, Viki:
