Prospectus and entry requirements

- Taught master's degree with 65 or above
- Competition is high
- If you are coming from outside the UK, check information for international students regarding fees, language requirements, visa requirements
- <u>ACE Initiative</u> (Attaining Comprehensive Equality in Postgraduate Research)
 - Contextualised admissions for UK BAME students (self-identified)
 - Pre-interview session with an academic staff member
 - Tailored feedback on your application if unsuccessful



How much does a PhD at LSE cost?

- Course fees
 - Home students: £4,704 for the first year (provisional)
 - Overseas students: £21,768 for the first year

The fee is likely to rise over subsequent years of the programme

- Maintenance (living costs): Allow £16 17,000 per year in London
- **Research costs:** Allow £500 per year although this can be much higher if the costs of fieldwork are high.



Funding

- LSE or ESRC Studentships (4 years, covers fees and stipend)
- **External:** Commonwealth Scholarships, Rhodes Scholarships, etc.
 - Country/nationality specific, subject specific, or other criteria
 - UK Government Loan (postgraduate doctoral loan) or loan schemes from other countries.

When? Deadline to apply this year: 13 January 2023

Overview	When
1. Choose topic and write research proposal	As early as possible
2. Gather documents and prepare the rest of your application	November, December
3. Apply by the deadline	Mid January
4. Shortlisting of applications by the department. Interviews held.	January – February
5. Find out whether you've been offered a place	Early March
 6. Offer-holders considered for internal funding. Two main types: LSE PhD studentships ESRC studentships 	Late March



How?

1. Choose topic and write research proposal

Research proposal pointers are on the Graduate Admissions website

- Research proposal length approximately 2000 words.
- Consider a prospective supervisor you would like to work with.
- <u>Academic staff</u> who can't supervise PhD students: Fellows, Visiting Fellows, affiliated staff, guest lecturers.
- Assistant Professors can co-supervise as part of a team with a more experienced supervisor.

2. Gather documents and prepare the rest of your application

We look at your:

- Existing and pending qualifications
- CV
- Statement of academic purpose
- Research proposal
- Sample of written work (3000 word essay, or an extract from a longer piece)
- Any relevant supplementary application materials (GRE/GMAT where relevant)
- References
- Familiarise yourself with the <u>online application system</u> early
- Contact referees in good time and make them aware of the deadline
- Read up about the <u>Supporting documents</u> you'll need to submit
- Read the guidance on what to include in your 'statement of academic purpose' and under 'programme specific information'.



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3. Deadlines and Application Processing

- The deadline is 13 January. Complete applications received by this date will be given full consideration for i) a place on the programme and ii) funding.
- Applications are received by the Graduate Admissions office who check that they're complete, and pass them on to the department.
- Incomplete applications are held in Graduate Admissions and only passed to the Department when they're complete (including reference letters).
- Interviews will be held for shortlisted candidates. These can be in person or via Zoom or Teams.



4 & 5. Find out whether you've been offered a place

- Department aims to consider all candidates within 6-8 weeks.
- The decision will be communicated by Graduate Admissions. You can also check the status of your application at any time via the online application system.
- If you've been successful, you will receive an email from the department around the same time explaining the next steps.
- Offer types: Conditional / Unconditional
- Funding decision-making process and release of funding award news: LSE and ESRC Studentships
