For undergraduate and most taught postgraduate students, this is normally the equivalent of four full units per year, however you can check your specific programme regulations using the <u>LSE Calendar</u>.

Normally courses will consist of a lecture and a class or seminar group, but this varies depending on the course. Some courses offer practical sessions, group work, workshops, field work, etc.

- You will be able to browse (but not select) courses from 10am on Monday 19 September 2022 until Thursday 22 September 2022.
- Course selection opens officially at **10am Thursday 22 September 2022**. You will be able to select courses from this date.
- Course convenors will review requests and make offers to allow you to join the course by **12pm** on **Friday 23 September**. You must accept your offers within 48 hours.
- You must be registered for all units by the School deadline of **5pm Friday 7 October 2022.**

ONLINE PRE-ENROLMENT

To become a fully enrolled student, new postgraduate students will be required to undertake a two-stage enrolment process: **Online pre-enrolment** and **Campus Enrolment**.

Pre-enrolment online

You should <u>pre-enrol online</u> using the LSE pre-enrolment portal in mid-August. Look out for an LSE email in the coming days, which will give you instructions on what to do next.

Pre-enrolling online will also allow you to set up your LSE network account to access the <u>Student Hub</u>.

Student Hub

The Student Hub app brings together everything that LSE has to offer to make your experience at LSE the best it can be.

Available on the App Store, Google Play and as a web app.

Pre-Arrival Course

Once you complete online pre-enrolment and set up your LSE IT account, you'll be able to access **Prepare to learn at LSE** to help you get off to a good start and make the most of what LSE has to offer.

CAMPUS ENROLMENT

You should campus enrol as soon as possible after your arrival on campus. Please check the <u>Postgraduate Campus Enrolment Schedule</u>, so you know when your programme is due to enrol. **You must campus enrol before attending any in-person teaching, or, if applicable, before taking any in-person exam assessments**.

Campus enrolment will take place in the **Marshall Building**, 44 Lincoln's Inn Fields, London, WC2A 3LY (see <u>map</u> for campus location).

Don't forget to follow our social media channels! Campus enrolment takes place in-person and is where **we will check your** official documents, including passport and visa (if applicable). Documents must be originals.

Once you have completed campus enrolment, you will be issued your <u>LSE Card</u>, giving you access to campus and on-campus teaching and services.

What to bring to campus enrolment

When you campus enrol we are legally required to check your eligibility to study in the UK. We do this by checking various documents. The documents you'll need vary according to your nationality and immigration status. If you do not bring the appropriate identification documents we will not be able to campus enrol you.

For details of what you need to bring with you please visit <u>What to Bring</u> to <u>Campus Enrolment</u>. Please remember to check back regularly as the page may be subject to change.

Please remember that you will not be able to campus enrol unless you bring all the required in-date original documents with you to campus enrolment.

In accordance with UK Home Office requirements, the School is required to take a scan of ALL students' passports and documents verifying immigation status at campus enrolment.

In order to avoid delaying your campus enrolment please ensure that you have submitted all required documents to <u>Graduate Admissions</u>. Graduate Admissions will be available at pre-sessional and main campus enrolment to process any missing documents, but it will slow your enrolment if you need to submit documents to them first. If you do have outstanding documents it would be sensible to bring copies with you as well as the originals. If the documents you bring with you do not meet Admissions' requirements, you will not be able to enrol on time.
