Download the Student Hub app before you arrive on campus

The Student Hub is LSE's app, designed to help you navigate your day-to-day life at LSE.

You can download the Student Hub now to start connecting with your department and get information to help find out about everything that LSE has to offer.

With the Student Hub, you can view your timetable and upcoming deadlines, get help finding your way around with the campus map, and make bookings with academics and support services. Plus, see who's in your programme using the programme directory, and view your personalised Welcome calendar.

ONLINE PRE-ENROLMENT

To become a fully enrolled student, new postgraduate students will be required to undertake a two-stage enrolment process:

Online pre-enrolment and **Campus Enrolment**.

Pre-enrolment online

You should [pre-enrol online](#) using the LSE pre-enrolment portal when you receive your email invitation to do so. Look out for an LSE email, which you will receive at least 2 weeks before you are due to enrol in person, which will give you instructions on what to do next. Remember to check your junk/spam folder regularly in case the invite ends up there.

Pre-enrolling online will also allow you to set up your LSE network account to access the [Student Hub](#).

If you are not planning to join during this academic cycle, and are instead intending to reinstate your application for 2027 entry, please do not pre-enrol online. This will prevent you being able to reinstate your application, and you would instead need to complete a full new application.

Complete your mandatory Consent.Ed training

Consent.Ed is LSE's mandatory programme on consent and active bystander intervention.

Consent.Ed ensures all students understand LSE's expectations, policies, support services and reporting options. It's a requirement that all postgraduate students complete the programme, regardless of previous training or experience.

All students must complete both levels of Consent.Ed:

- **Level 1:** [take the online training](#) before you arrive on campus.
- **Level 2:** attend a 90-minute workshop with your department peers.

Attendance and completion of Level 1 and Level 2 will be monitored.

Level 2 forms part of your departmental induction and you will attend alongside your department peers. Your Level 2 session has been added to your Student Hub calendar. Please make sure you have completed the Level 1 training before you attend the Level 2 workshop.

If you miss your allocated Level 2 session, or one has not been added to your induction timetable, you must sign-up for a catch-up session on the [Consent.Ed webpage](#).

Survivor-only training and support

As we recognise the sensitive nature of Consent.Ed, the school will be offering survivor-only workshops, to create a carefully tailored space for discussion. This is an alternative to attending your department session.

CAMPUS ENROLMENT

You should complete campus enrolment in your scheduled slot, or as soon as possible after your arrival on campus if arriving late. Please check the [Postgraduate Campus Enrolment Schedule](#), so you know when your programme is due to enrol. **You must complete campus enrolment before attending any in-person teaching, or, if applicable, before taking any in-person exam assessments.**

Main campus enrolment will take place in the **Marshall Building**, 44 Lincoln's Inn Fields, London, WC2A 3LY (see [map](#) for campus location). If you are enrolling early on a pre-sessional programme please see the [pre-sessional enrolment schedule](#) for dates, times and locations.

Campus enrolment takes place in-person and is where **we will check your official documents, including passport and visa (if applicable). Documents must be originals.**

What to bring to campus enrolment

When you complete campus enrolment we are legally required to check your eligibility to study in the UK. We do this by checking various documents. The documents you'll need vary according to your nationality and immigration status. If you do not bring the required in-date original identification documents we will not be able to complete your enrolment.

In accordance with UK Home Office requirements, the School is required to take a scan of ALL students' passports and documents verifying immigration status at campus enrolment, including those who are home students.

Once you have completed campus enrolment, you will be issued your [LSE Student Card](#), giving you access to campus and on-campus teaching and services.



SELECTING YOUR COURSES

If you follow a taught programme you are required to take a certain number of courses each year as prescribed by your programme regulations. For undergraduate and most taught postgraduate students, this is normally the equivalent of four full units per year, however you can check your specific programme regulations using the [LSE Calendar](#).

Normally courses will consist of a lecture and a class or seminar group, but this varies depending on the course. Some courses offer practical sessions, group work, workshops, field work, etc.

- You can browse (but not select) courses from 10am on Monday 21 September 2026.
- You can select courses from **10am on Thursday 24 September 2026** until **5pm on Friday 9 October 2026**.
- Course convenors will review requests and make offers to allow you to join the course. **You must accept your offers within 48 hours.**
- You must be registered for all units by the School deadline of **5pm Friday 9 October 2026**.

Graduate Admissions support at enrolment

In order to avoid delaying your campus enrolment please ensure that you have submitted all required documents to Graduate Admissions. If you have already submitted them, or your previous institution has sent them to Graduate Admissions, we will usually have processed them by the time you arrive to complete campus enrolment.

Graduate Admissions staff will be available at pre-sessional and main campus enrolment to process any missing documents, but it will slow your enrolment if you need to submit documents to them first. If you do have outstanding documents it would be sensible to bring copies with you as well as the originals. If the documents you bring with you do not meet Admissions' requirements, you will not be able to enrol on time. Admissions staff will do all they can to help you to enrol, but occasionally you may need to come back to another session with the correct documentation.
