REMINDER ABOUT ADMISSIONS PROCESSING

We appreciate that many of you are keen to prepare for your arrival, and are working hard to provide us with information we have requested.

Please refer to our [News page](#) to see our updates around standard processes, such as English language waivers, and also refer to our [current processing times](#) to see what date we are up to for confirming offers and processing CAS.

We would ask that you do not send multiple emails with the same query or document, as this drastically slows down our processes, and we want to continue working through in order to get CAS letters out to those who need them, and to confirm offers. Please check you understand the requirements you must have met to be eligible to receive a CAS, often people chase up their CAS but have not yet submitted their Financial Undertaking Form and/or accepted their offer.

It is usual for there to be a delay in processing at this time of the year, so please be patient with us. We have added extra staff to the team, and are hopeful to be reaching much faster turnaround times soon. We are also prioritising documents which fulfil the academic requirements of conditional offer holders for pre-sessional programmes, and for those who register in late August and early September.

IMPORTANT: Confirmations of conditional offers are double checked by the senior staff in Graduate Admissions, and although your LSE For You may show an update to the status of an offer, the update can only be considered official once an email has been sent to you from the Graduate Admissions Office.



Courses Not Available in 2022/23

Each year there are some courses that do not run due to being temporarily suspended or permanently withdrawn. In many cases this is due to the adjustment of teaching allocations so that other existing courses can be enhanced or new courses can be offered in light of developments in the discipline, path-breaking research, or on the basis of student feedback; these changes are intended to enhance the overall student learning experience. Other adjustments to the teaching portfolio may be required to accommodate sabbatical leave for academic staff, or due to unforeseen staff illness or resignation for example. We will have emailed you directly, already, if any of the **core** courses on your chosen programme have been suspended. However, you may also want to view optional course changes across all programmes as you prepare to join us in Autumn.

Featured Research:

Net zero transition to mean significant change for 1.3 million workers

The UK's experience of structural change through deindustrialisation during the 1970s and 1980s drove up unemployment, concentrated among particular parts of the population, and left deep scars on some parts of the country. However, the net zero transition will have impact on jobs across the economy but is unlikely to follow the same path as these previous episodes of change. Molly Broome, Stefano Cellini, Kathleen Henehan, Charlie McCurdy, Capucine Riom, Anna Valero, and Guglielmo Ventura assess the likely scale – and nature – of labour market change brought on by the net zero transition over the next decade.

Changes to Summative Assessment for 2022/23

Each year all courses undergo a review of their course content, assessment and availability. Sometimes, this leads to a change to the summative assessment tasks which students are required to complete. A course's summative assessment may be reviewed and enhanced in light of developments in the discipline, changes to course content, or on the basis of student feedback. These changes are intended to improve the quality of the overall student learning experience.

Some variation to mode of delivery and/or format of assessments may be required to respond to changes in public health advice and/or to account for the situation of students in attendance on campus and those studying online during the early part of the academic year. Students will be notified of any changes to assessment plans at the start of their course.
