Do not send multiple emails with the same query or document. **If your documents are sent to us by your institution, or via a digital transfer service, you do not need to send the same documents via the GAP.**

Please check you understand the requirements you must fulfil to be eligible to receive a CAS (see above), often people chase up their CAS but have not yet submitted their Financial Undertaking Form and/or accepted their offer.

We are prioritising documents which fulfil the academic requirements of conditional offer holders for pre-sessional programmes, and for those who register in late August and early September.

IMPORTANT: Confirmations of conditional offers are double-checked by the senior staff in Graduate Admissions, and although your Graduate Applicant Portal (GAP) may show an update to the status of an offer, there will be a lag before you receive the official email from the Graduate Admissions Office.

Information on Courses Not Available during 2026/27

Each year there are some courses that do not run due to being temporarily suspended or permanently withdrawn. In many cases this is due to the adjustment of teaching allocations so that other existing courses can be enhanced or new courses can be offered in light of developments in the discipline, path-breaking research, or on the basis of student feedback; these changes are intended to enhance the overall student learning experience. Other adjustments to the teaching portfolio may be required to accommodate sabbatical leave for academic staff, or due to unforeseen staff illness or resignation for example.

Changes to Summative Assessment for 2026/27

Each year all courses undergo a review of their course content, assessment and availability. Sometimes, this leads to a change to the summative (at the end of your course) assessment tasks which students are required to complete. A course's summative assessment may be reviewed and enhanced in light of developments in the discipline, changes to course content, or on the basis of student feedback. These changes are intended to improve the quality of the overall student learning experience.

LSE LIFE

- **LIFE Conversations** are one-to-one appointments providing personalised guidance about student life, settling into London, or making the most of what's on offer. LSE LIFE advisers can help clarify your goals, make a plan for your next steps, and help you find the teams and programmes that best fit your interests.
- The **LSE LIFE space** is a bright, open space located right on the ground floor of the Library. Perfect to study by yourself or with friends, attend a workshop or event, or drop by at the reception with any questions you might have.

Academic mentors

All students are allocated an academic member of staff as their academic mentor. Their role is to monitor your academic progress and overall wellbeing during your studies and they can help with any academic, administrative or personal questions you may have.

Class teachers and seminar leaders

Class teaching is an integral feature of teaching and learning at the School and is performed by a mixture of faculty as well as graduate teaching assistants (GTAs) and guest teachers. In addition to running classes, they also hold office hours, mark your work and provide feedback on it. Class teachers and seminar leaders will be available to assist with queries relating to a specific course you are taking.

Student Wellbeing Service

The Student Wellbeing Service is a collection of services dedicated to helping you improve your wellbeing whilst studying at LSE.
