



Q&A With Our Research Assistants

How do you feel you have benefited from the UGRA programme?

"I now have a much deeper understanding of public policy in New York City and particularly housing policy... On an organisational level I have learned to work with new software called Aeon Timeline which has been the backbone during the UGRA."

"As the focus of my own independent research so far has also been on the intersection between religion and politics, working on this project provided a fantastic opportunity to experience the mechanics of research within academia and learn from a specialist on a subject in which I hope to continue building broader expertise."

"I think the program and the specific project I was an RA for have definitely cemented my interest in policy and political science research as something I want to pursue long-term."

What was your favourite aspect of the programme?

"I really cherished being able to speak to my project lead about things other than our research, such as university in general and plans for graduate school. It's been invaluable and has helped me narrow down potential interests."

"I enjoyed meeting the other RAs at the mid-way session. This gave a sense of being part of a wider programme, as the research itself is independent. It was interesting to hear about all the other research projects and catch the general feeling about the projects so far."

"I'm grateful for the regular meetings I had with my project lead, both for feedback and updates. These were very valuable parts of my work – they helped guide the scope of my research and were where I learned the most about the area of research."

What are your plans for the future? And do you feel the programme has in any way helped shape them?

"I want to go to grad school next year, and this experience has strengthened that conviction: I really enjoy research and writing. I was initially hesitant about applying to fully research-focused master's programmes but now I'm excited."

"I have plans to continue working in the research area that covers religion, politics, and minority rights. Assisting on this project at the LSE US Centre has contributed to shaping a path into further work in this field through the development of research skills and specialised knowledge."

Is there anything you would like to say to the donor who made the programme possible?

"I'd like to say thank you for making this program possible – it was one of the most rewarding parts of this academic year for me, and I'm grateful for the interests it has helped cement and the skills it has helped build."
