



Conference Speakers

Keynote speaker and Chair - Rethinking market capitalism: Innovation and the Path to Shared Prosperity

Daron Acemoglu, Institute Professor, MIT

<u>Daron Acemoglu</u> is an Institute Professor at MIT and an elected fellow of the National Academy of Sciences, American Philosophical Society, the British Academy of Sciences, the Turkish Academy of Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the Econometric Society, the European Economic Association, and the Society of Labor Economists. His academic work covers a wide range of areas, including political economy, economic development, economic growth, technological change, inequality, labor economics and economics of networks.

Peter Trubowitz, London School of Economics and Chatham House, London

<u>Peter Trubowitz</u> is Professor of International Relations and Director of the Phelan United States Centre at the London School of Economics and Associate Fellow at Chatham House. He writes and comments frequently on international affairs and American politics.

Michael Mastanduno, Dartmouth College

<u>Michael Mastanduno</u> is the Nelson A. Rockefeller Professor of Government at Dartmouth College. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and has received fellowships from the Brookings Institution, the East-West Center, and the Salzburg Seminar. During 2017, he was the inaugural Susan Strange Visiting Professor at the London School of Economics.

C. Raja Mohan, Asia Society

<u>C. Raja Mohan</u> is a senior fellow at the Asia Society Policy Institute in Delhi and a visiting professor at the Institute of South Asian Studies, National University of Singapore. His current research interests include Indian foreign policy, Asian security, and global governance.

Anne-Marie Slaughter, New America

Currently CEO of the think and action tank New America, <u>Anne-Marie Slaughter</u> is a global leader, scholar and public intellectual. She was the J. Sinclair Armstrong Professor of International, Foreign, and Comparative Law at Harvard Law School and served as President of the American Society of International Law.

Stephanie Rickard, LSE Government

<u>Stephanie Rickard</u> is a Professor at the London School of Economics in the Department of Government. Her research examines issues at the intersection of politics and international economics, including trade agreements, subsidies, industrial policy and international financial rescues.

Sheri Berman, Barnard College, Columbia University

<u>Sheri Berman</u> is a Professor of Political Science at Barnard College, Columbia University. Her research interests include the development of democracy and dictatorship, European politics, populism and fascism, and the history of the left.

Ian Shapiro, Yale University

<u>lan Shapiro</u> is Sterling Professor of Political Science at Yale University. He has written widely and influentially on democracy, justice, and the methods of social inquiry. His current research concerns the relations between democracy and the distribution of income and wealth.

Luigi Zingales, Booth School of Business, University of Chicago

<u>Luigi Zingales</u> is the Robert C. McCormack Distinguished Service Professor of Entrepreneurship and Finance at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business. In 2014 he served as President of the American Finance Association. His interests span from corporate governance and financial development to political economy and the economic effects of culture.

Leslie Vinjamuri, SOAS University of London

Dr <u>Leslie Vinjamuri</u> is Director of the US and the Americas programme and Dean of the Queen Elizabeth II Academy for Leadership in International Affairs at Chatham House. She is also Reader in International Relations at SOAS University of London, Deputy Chair of the Marshall Aid Commemoration Commission, a Member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and on the Advisory Board of LSE IDEAS.

G. John Ikenberry, Princeton University

<u>G. John Ikenberry</u> is the Albert G. Milbank Professor of Politics and International Affairs at Princeton University in the Department of Politics and the Princeton School of Public and International Affairs. He is also Co-Director of Princeton's Center for International Security Studies. Ikenberry is also a Global Eminence Scholar at Kyung Hee University in Seoul, Korea.

David Luke, LSE Firoz Lalji Institute for Africa

<u>David Luke</u> is professor in practice and strategic director at the Firoz Lalji Institute for Africa at the London School of Economics. Specialising in African trade policy and trade negotiations, Professor Luke has decades of experience in policy advisory services, managing and catalysing research, building partnerships, training and capacity development for private sector and government.

Nita Rudra, Georgetown University

<u>Nita Rudra</u> is a Professor of Government and Business at Georgetown University. Her research interests include the politics of globalization, international development, democracy, inequality, taxation and redistribution. Her work appears in the British Journal of Political Science, Journal of Politics, American Journal of Political Science, and Comparative Political Studies, International Organization and International Studies Quarterly.
